



THE DARING SKY-SCRAPER.

Chat With the Celebrated Aeronaut William Hogan.

Ascensions This Season and 570 Altogether — Inter-esting Statements.

W. M. Hogan, who made the pretty balloon ascension and parachute drop at the Fair Grounds Wednesday, and intends doing the same to-day, is an experienced man at his business. He is as cool as a cucumber while making preparations for his aerial flights and says he has never met with a serious accident.

"I have been 23 years in my line, and I have made 26 ascensions this season already," he remarked in a conversation with an ADVERTISER reporter. "In the last two years I have lost two brothers. One of them went up in the 'camel air ship' at Brooklyn—he was a fine aeronaut, too. It was blown to sea and nothing ever since heard of the inmates. The other, as everybody knows, was killed at the Detroit Exposition this year. He was physically disabled before he ascended and should not have gone up."

"How do you account for so many accidents?"

cidents?"

"There have been 36 of us killed this year already. I have the newspaper clippings with the accounts of about all the fatalities, and in nearly every instance you'll find that it was because they didn't go high enough to let their parachutes open on the descent. The result is they dropped like rocks."

"How did you like your performance yesterday?"

"How did you like your performance yesterday?"

"It was very good; there was little wind and I sailed straight and easy. The only thing that bothered me was the heat. Generally we strike cold air currents, but yesterday it was stifling."

"Did you alight on terra firma all right?"

"I came down on some telegraph wires but reached the ground without much trouble. At Holyoke, Massachusetts, I once fell on an electric wire. It was pretty not so I didn't stay long," said Hogan, with a laugh. "I generally make my calculations as to where I shall alight before I leave the balloon. Yesterday I had my eye on a desirable lot and sailed straight to one side."

"Do you fear falling into the water?"

"Not as much as we used to. In years gone by people came miles to see an exhibition. We got \$800 and \$1,000 a jump then, but now we've got to make five or six for that sum. My dates are all filled in until November. I go south from here." "Not a bit. If I did I would go out of the business. I always go up with the intention of coming down all right."

"To what altitude do you generally go?"
"It depends a good deal on the weather and on the Ground beneath you. Yesterday I went 3,500 feet. I always carry a barometer with me to guage my height; in a fog, for instance, it's absolutely necessary, as you can't see the earth. I want a sufficient distance to insure the opening of my parachute."
