An account was also asked in moneys that came into the hands of Chatham applicable to the construc-tion. The plaintiff (Sombra) alleges in this action that the drain was still incompleted when the action was begun, and for some time after. It was npleted when the action came for trial, but Sombra proceeded to protect itself from assessment for a portion of the cost, of which notice had been given by Chatham. The trial judge held that it was still not completed, and gave judgment for the plaintiff township. The Court of Apeal reversed this judgment, holding hat the bylaw was in reality for completion, and not for repair, and dismissed the action. From that deci-
