





In his official capacity Mayor Judd vesterday attempted to equal the record of City Engineer Graydon as a letter writer.

But he failed miserably. All he nanaged to dictate was a brace of them one to the street railway about the Wellington street bridge, and the other to the Grand Trunk about the blocking of trolley cars at the Richmond street crossing. Here is what the mayor had to say, the letter being addressed to Assistant Superintendent Gillen:

"Last evening I boarded a Ridout street south car at the corner of Dundas and Richmond streets at 10:03, arriving at the Grand Trunk Railway crossing at 10:04. At that time an oil train was blocking the crossing and I am informed it had been blocking it for some minutes. It remained in that position until 10:35, when the blockade of the street was opened and the street cars allowed to pass. There were twelve cars blocked south of the track on Richmond and Horton streets, and six cars blocked north of the track on Richmond street. So far as I could see there was no cause or justification for the train being allowed to remain for half an hour blocking the street, and I desire to ask whether you were aware of the train remaining in that position.
