BUSINESS GIRLS

Housing Accommodation and Increasing Rents Make Situation Acute.

Montreal, April 16 .- The problem of finding living accommodation within their means for the vast army of business girls of Montreal, who are without homes in the city, is becoming every day more acute, owing to the scarcity of houses, the increase in rent coming into force with the first of next month, and the constant upward trend in the cost of food, and other living necessities. The problem is more acute for the girls of the Protestant faith, as the Y. W. C. A. is at present the only the girls of the Protestant faith, as the Y. W. C. A. is at present the only agency which is attempting to deal with it on their behalf, and the secretary in charge of that work, in discussing it yesterday, said that in spite of greatly increased housing accommodation in 1919, and the addition of 200 supervised boarding houses to the former list of 150, there were still girls being turned away daily for whom it was impossible. 150, there were still girls being turned away daily for whom it was impossible to provide permanent accommodation. In all, 1,100 girls were provided with permanent homes by the association last year, only 200 of whom could be housed in the central buildings.

The difficulty of making the salary paid to the majority of these workers paid to the majority of these workers cover living expenses was explained, as the average wage of the girl clerk in the stores and offices ranges from \$50 to \$80 per month, while some, it was stated, receive even less. On the average a suitable room cannot be obtained under \$15 or \$20 a month, food is reckoned at \$1 per day, as the least possible expenditure, so that the margin is very narrow in most cases. The association finds it possible to supply a room and two meals per day at association finds it possible to supply a room and two meals per day at rates varying from \$20 to \$34 per month, the residents of the central homes hav-ing the advartage of the lounge rooms, gymnasium and libraries. The assoiation also has limited accommoda ion for the more highly-paid women, whose case is scarcely any better, al-hough they may have a little more



TURKISH TREATY IS FIRST PROBLEM ON LIST AT SAN REMO

Supreme Council Meets Today -- United States Absent.

SAN REMO, April 18 .- (By the As sociated Press.)-Questions in connection with the peace treaty with Turkey will comprise the first business to be taken up by the supreme council of the Allies at its first formal session here tomorrow. This was decided upon at a conference today in the Duvachan Palace, where the sessions are to be held, attended by Premiers Lloyd George of Great Britain, Nitti of Italy and Millerand of France, for the arrangement of the ordicial procedure. With the premiers were Foreign Minister Scialoia of Italy, Earl Curzon, the British foreign secretary, and General Berthelot, the French chief of staff. It was agreed that daily communiques should be issued, as upon the occasion of previous sessions of the council.

United States Absent,

It developed definitely today that the United States would not be represented at the conference. For the present the premiers, foreigner ministers and ambassadors of Great British, France, Italy, Japan, Belgium and Greece at the meeting are occupied with problems particularly affecting themselves, and there is no disposition to dwell unduly upon the lack of American participation. on at a conference today in the Du-

The first meting of the conference will be opened at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Sessions will be held mornings and afternoons, with the possibility that evening sittings may even be arranged for.

On his way to San Remo, Premier Millerand made a statement to the correspendents, in which he said that he entirely approved of the declaration of Mr. Lloyd George, at Marseilles, where the British premier spoke of the necessity for the Allies remaining united

united.
"Unity and co-operation between France and England," said M. Millerand "are necessary to reap the fruits of the victory we gained together. I am sure that after the viewpoints of the two Governments are clearly made known, we will find ourselves equally devoted to the maintenance of the Entente Cordiale, which previous to the victory united us so efficaciously."

LLOYD GEORGE MURDERER, SAYS JURY'S VERDICT

Charge of Wilfully Slaying Mayor MacCurtain of Cork.

INCLUDES LORD FRENCH

Lord Lieutenant and Ian Mac-Pherson Also Charged With Killing.

CORK, Ireland, April 17 .- Charges of wilful murder against Premier Lloyd George were brought in in the verdict of the jury in the inquest into the death of Mayor MacCurtain of this city, as-sassinated last month, which was rendered today.

The verdict also charges Viscount French, lord lieutenant of Ireland; Ian MacPherson, former chief secretary, and several police inspectors with murder. The text of the verdict reads:

'We find that the late Alderman Thomas MacCurtain, lord mayor of WALLACEBURG SETS Cork, died from shock and hemorrhage caused by bullet wounds; that he was wilfully murdered under circumstances of the most callous brutality; that the murder was organized and carried out by the Royal Irish Constabulatory ET by the Royal Irish Constabulary, officially directed by the British Government, and we return a verdict of wilful murder against David Lloyd George, prime minister of England; Lord French, lord lieutenant of Ireland; Ian MacPherson, late secretary for Ireland; Acting General Smith of the Royal Irish Constabulary; Divisional Inspector Clayton of the Royal Irish Constabulary; District Inspector Swansey and some unpresent at the Constabulary. trict Inspector Swansey and some un-known members of the Royal Irish Constabulary.

Caused No Surprise.

That part of the verdict laying the crime to the hands of the police caused no surprise here, but few thought the jury would go so far as to charge the premier, Viscount French and Mr. Mac-Pherson with the murder, even though the charge is likely to mean little more than an expression of sentiment against these officials. It is different, however, with the police officers, who, in the usual course would be expected to be placed under arrest immediately.

The verdict charging the constabulary The verdict charging the constabulary

with the murder was a foregone con-clusion. It is known that some of the Sinn Fein leaders believed two weeks ago that the verdict would simply charge the police as a body without mentioning names. This doubtless in-fluenced Viscount French and Sir John Teylor under secretary for Ireland to Taylor, under-secretary for Ireland, to ignore summonses to appear as witnesses. Elaborate military precautions and the counsel of cooler heads among the Sinn Fein leaders, it is believed, will forestall serious trouble here.

It would be a wanton scandal, he de-clared, if that charge were persevered in to the end. The maintenance of triendly relations between the police and the public was a matter that con-cerned everyone. Alluding to the groups of men seen on the night of the murder, he said that if the suggestion was to be made, and if they were dealing with forty or fifty policemen, then this was a charge the murder against every policemen.

Attorney Lynch, for the next of kin of the deceased, also addressed the jury and told them he was sure they would try the case upon the evidence alone. He made that observation, he said, as he would not be doing his duty to the memory of the dead if he did

Occupied Christian Country.

The case was unique, he added, as all the resources of the authorities had not been directed to detect the perpetrator of the murder, but in making the defence that it was not done by the constabulary. It was without precedent when a Christian power occupied a Christian country with discipilined troops and forces, that the lives and liberty of the civilized world were upon the trial and its result.

The people of Ireland, the attorney said, must wait patiently the divine will to determine when the reign of torror which at present prevails in the land will come to an end.

"We will vatiently suffer," he continued, "confident that right and justice will ultimately relieve the burden of oppression under which we are at present."
