Brilliant indeed was the reception which was last night accorded Monsignor Sbaretti, the papel delegate to Canada, in St. Peter's Cathedral. (The splendid edifice was a blaze of light, and the handsome marble altar was resplendent with myriads of tapers. The cathedral, long before the hour designated for the appearance his excellency, was crowded to doors with many hundreds of faithful, who were eager to catch a glimpse of the distinguished prelate. and equally as eager to pay homage to the papal representative in the Dominion. As has already been announced, the visit of his excellency is directly connected with the celebra-tion of the promulgation of the docof the Immaculate Conception, as laid down by Pope Pius IX. in 1854. 

THE BREAKWATER. To the Editor of The Advertiser: I notice that our aldermen have put through a bylaw to raise \$15,000 for that purpose. No doubt something is wanted to protect West London. There seems to be a difference of opinion as to the cost and also the durability of an earth embankment, but as all the engineers agree to its being all right as to both cost and durability, I presume they know. But even engineers are sometimes mistaken. If it was clay soil I would have more faith in it. Where are they going to get the quantity of earth required? Is it not the fact of the main stream not being branches (each of which is about as large as the main stream), there will together. It looks like running two 4-inch tile, 8 inches, into one 4-inch tile. It can't be done satisfactorily If the current was reversed there would be no trouble. Would it not be a good idea to make a cut-off by diverting a part of the north branch. commencing about Oxford street and running westerly, following the bed of an old channel of the river, and emptying in main river west of the village? The work could be done with dredge, the cut to be 40 or 50 feet wide. The dredging would not cost than \$4,000 or \$5,000; that would be the end of floods in London West. I have

had considerable experience in cutoffs and diverting streams, and always with satisfaction. I once (as reeve of a township) had a dredge cut a drain 32 feet wide, 4 to 7 feet deep, five miles through a heavy timbered bush, which they had to clear 100 feet wide. The whole cost was \$14,000. It may not be feasible, but I would like the engineer's opinion on it. The dredging could be done during the winter, and be ready for the floods (if any) next spring. FREEHOLDER.



Toronto, Dec. 7.-At this afternoon's session of the Grand Divisions Sons of Temperance, the report of the legislaion committee on temperance legisation was adopted. The report regretted that the prospect of getting all that they desired in the way of ad-

vanced temperance legislation was not bright at the present time, although one of the political parties had adopted plank that was in advance of anything that had hitherto been obtained from a political convention. The Scott act was not now in force in any county in Ontario. There was no good reason, however, why in some counties, especially where local option is now in possession of most of the ground, temperance people should not look to the Scott act as a means of extending the area of local prohibition. A useful improvement upon it should be the allowing of two or three counties being joined in the voting. The committee could not look with any great favor upon mere amendments to the license law, and the Grand Division should ice more declare in unmistakable terms for the suppression of the bar and the treating system. In conclusion, temperance people of both parties were urged to attend all political con-

ventions and do everything in their power to nominate men for the Legisature, men who are in favor of temerance legislation. It was decided to establish a sick nd funeral benefit fund, and a board of six members was appointed to carry out the scheme.
