



"I remember one day when there were thirteen fires inside of the 24 hours," continued Mr. McBride. was on the 24th of May. Three alarms were rung in before breakfast.' In those days, of course, the brigade did not have much distance to cover in going to fires, so limited was the city's extent. For a long time there were only 25 alarm boxes. Carling's brewery was number 25. Half the time the fire alarm was given by word of mouth, and the glare from a fire of any size could be seen from the station. When finally the waterworks system was put in, the fire brigade considered that they had just about reached the acme of perfection. One feature of the early fire brigade must not be overlooked. Before the regular brigade was instituted, the portant consideration was to get the men together. To supplement the work of the fire bell, the branch station on Carling street had a bugler. His name was Frank Church, and he had seen active service in the British army. When a fire started, the notes of his trumpet could be heard by everyone of the 400 volunteer firemen in the town. How strange it seems to the younger generation to think of scores of citizens, roused by a bugle, turning out with hand engines to save the property of a less fortunate fellow-citizen. Now, citizens look on with interest while trained men with the best apparatus do the work. And, perhaps, citizens today feel less sympathy with the man who is suffering by the fire
