CENT TO GET THREE MEMBERS-CONSERVATIVE MEMBERS PROTEST.

It Out.

Ottawa; May 20 .- Sir Wilfrid Laurie resterday afternoon introduced the re-histribution bill. He claimed that the measure provided for a return , to county boundaries. It provides that division of counties into ridings be nade by a commission of judges. Bothwell, Cardwell and West Ontario dis-appear and the representation of Middlesex is reduced from four to titee. The representation thus wiped out will be given to Dufferin, Parry Sound, and two more members in Kent. London will consist of the city Kent. London will consist of the city of London, with one member; Hamilton, two members; Toronto divided into four, with one member each. Sir Czarles Tupper's speech was a telling arraignment of the government, who, by means of an inquitous franchise act, the gravest corruption, such as Zas been seen in West-Huron, West Eigin and elsewhere recently, and the present measure, Eape to retain the power they secured under false presences.

SIR WILFRID'S SPEECH.

S'r Wilfrid said, among other things. I may say at once, that the object we have in view in presenting this bill is not to make a total redistribution of the electoral districts under which the house of commons is now constituted. We deem that it would not be expedient at this time to do more than ando so far as we can the most daring violations of a principle which we have always held and which has always been universally held by public opinion in this exactly to be a fundamental principle of representation in this country. We think it is a principle which will comment itself universally to public opinion that the basis of representation in this house should be the municipal country organization.

I cannot do better upon this point than to quote the tanguage of Sir John A Macdonald, when the first redistributions net of Confederation was introduced in 1872.

The language which he made use of on that occasion read as follows—

"It is desired, as mapt as possible, to keep the representation within the county, so that each county that is a municipality of Ontario should be represented, and if it becomes large enough, that it should be divided into ridings. That principle is carried out in the suggestion I am about to make. That rule was broken in 1867 in three constituencies. namely, Bothwell, Cardwell and Monak, and I do not think on the whole that the experiment has proved a successful one. I do not think it was unsuccessful, so far as the representatives of these new constituencies thusmelves are concerned by the guileums who now hold seats for these constituencies, and L hope that if I am returned again to the representative of the search that there is a great advantage in inving counties elect men whom they work in the search of the county of the search of the sear

All that great advantage is lost by cutting off a portion of two counties and adding them to gettler for electoral purposes only. These portions so cut off have no common interest; they do not meet together, and they have no common feet together and the policient purposes to counter to the policient of the propert for them. So that as much as poissible, from any point of view, it is advisable that counties should refuse new which they do not know, and scheduling principle in 1872.

three members the division should take 
place by judicial decision and authority. This is the principle upon which 
we base the bill that we introduce to 
this house now. (Cheers.)

BOTHWELL WIPED OUT.

After these preliminary observations

After these preliminary observations as to the guiding principles upon which we have acted, I will now proceed to give to the House-the-character of the bill which we have introduced. I may say at first, keeping in view the main observations with which. I started, that it is not our intention to have a general redistribution, but simply to unido certain wrongs that we think were done to the people and certain of the more glaring violations which took place in regard to the principle we hold as sacred. (Ministrial cheers.) It is not the intention to have any disturbance at the intention to have any disturbance at the intention to have any disturbance at present in the following constituencies:—Ottawa, Carleton, Addington, Durham, Froatence, Glengarry, Grenville, Halton, Hastings, Kingston, Lanark, Leeds, Lennox, Nipissing, Northumterland, Peterboro, Prince Edward, Renfrew, Russell, Stormont and Cornwall, Victoria and Waterloo. There remain undisturbed, In the remarks which I quoted a moment ago, Sir John Macdonald said that county lines had been interfered with in three i instances at Confederation—that is to say, in the cases of Cardwell, Monck and Bothwell. The House it seems, agreeing with Sir John Macdonald, has already caused Monck to be redistributed. It is proposed on this oreasion that Bothwell and Cardwell should disappear and West Ontario also. It is proposed also that Middlesex, which now returns four members, shall only return three for the four existing constituencies, and vespessnitation, will be given to the county of Dufferin and to the electoral district of Parry Sound, and two additional members to Kent, Ontario, Mr. Bergeron—That will be three members for Kent!

HOUSES OF REFUGE.

A good deal of valuable and interest-ing information is to be gleaned from the twenty-ninth annual report of the Ontario Government Inspector of the Ontario Government Inspector of houses of refuge and kindred instituhouses of refuge and thouses of Refuge tions. The number of Houses of Refuge in the Province is 35, which are situated in the cities and towns, and ap plication is now made to have a House of Refuge in the town of Cornwal placed upon the list of charities en-titled to receive aid. This class of institutions has shown the usual im-provement during the past year, and much good is being done in providing shelter, food and clothing for their in-mates. As a rule, they are cheermates. As a rule, they are cheer-ful and happy; when helpless and con-fined to their beds, they are a great care to those in charge. The Govern-ment grant to these Homes is 7 cents per day for each immate. There are per day for each the Province and the 31 Orphanages in the Province and the aggregate number of children providfor is 4,480. The inmates are cared bed for is a dec. The indicates a supplied with clothing, taught house work, sewing, knitting, etc., they also attend school and are placed in suitable homes from time to time. Much good is being done in the Province for or-phans and the children of poor peolpe. These Homes are mostly managed by

These Homes are mostly managed by ladies of the locality in which they are placed. The Government grant is two cents per day per inmate.

One more fixtitution has been added, the Home for Incurables, at Ottawa. The aid which the Homes receive is the same as paid to the Re-

There are two Convalescent Homes

same grant as Homes for Incurables.

There has been established in the western portion of the Province five County Houses, of Industry, or Refuges for the poor, viz., County of Peel House of Industry, County of Kent House of Industry, County of Surce House of Industry, County of Simcoe House of Industry.

The county Homes in operation are

The county Homes in operation are all west of Toronto, with one excep-tion which is the Home provided by ton which is the Home provided by the counties of Leeds and Grenville. The Government has done much to en-courage the establishment of these Homes by making a grant to each courage the establishment of these Homes by making a grant to each county, or union of counties, where such an institution is in operation. The minimum quantity of land re-quired with each county Home is fortyfive acres, and the location and plans of building+must be approved of by the Government Inspector in order to enable the county to receive the grant

There has feen no increase in the number of Magdalen Asylums during the year. In these institutions two classes are provided for, viz., adult females and infants and children. The mates are employed at industrial ork of various kinds, and they go out to service and support hemselve as opportunities occur.

Brum and Miss Flagler quarrelled the night before over a trivial affair. She wanted to go over to a neighbor's house. He objected, and a quarrel followed. 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





# Jail Anxieties Shown by Prisoners While Awaiting Sentence Day

Some Curious Observations by a Man Who Had Been "Pinched" Himself.

Some had waited nearly a year, oth- up the stairs of their cells and began up the stairs of their cells and began to overhaul their scanty raiment.

They discussed the merits of a patched vest and a frayed necktic as women do the most exquisite garments. "How day you think the old man'll-like this" one would say, and run to a neighboring cell with a shoe or a coat for a companion's opinion. By noon they had all put on their best, and the distraction of exercise had made them so jovial that they came down to the corridor for the approval of us, for whom "the old man" had no terrors. A dress rehearst was suggested, and one of the old prisoners was elected judge. A facetious elerk of the mock court called out the names of the men to be sentenced, and they stood up in front of the judge. oners cooked-their own meals., inceeds were above the corridor, and at night the sheriff came and looked us in till morning. We numbered 19 men and toys, 16 of whom had had their trials and were waiting for their sentences. The remaining three, including myself, had received their punish. myself, had received their punishment at the hands of, a local magis-rate, and were serving it out then and there. We had been unfortunate nough to fall asleep in a box-car in s railway yards of the town, where jail was situated, and the magis-te, before whom we were brought

called out the names of the men to be sentenced, and they stood up in front of the judge.

I have never seen men suffer more for want of stimulants. Young and old seemed to lose all control of their tempers, and for the next-few days it was one continuous quarrel. Men who for almost a twelvemonth had shown one another little favors and been pais in true prison fashion, drifted apart as if they were sworn enemies, and the shariff, who had been kindness itself, was scolded and berated to a point that a less tool man could never have allowed prisoners to go.

The young men commenced work on January 3rd, being employed by Hugh Mann and J. D. Kennedy, whose contract was 80 miles west of the 7th siding, or a little over 150 miles from Lethbridge. The men worked 11 days, when both were taken ill with what eventually developed into diphheria. On January 15th Macdonald omplained of sore throat, and as the complained of sore throat, and as the cottor passed through his camp that day he gave him some cough mixture, but which was spilled by the carelessness of one of the men in camp.
