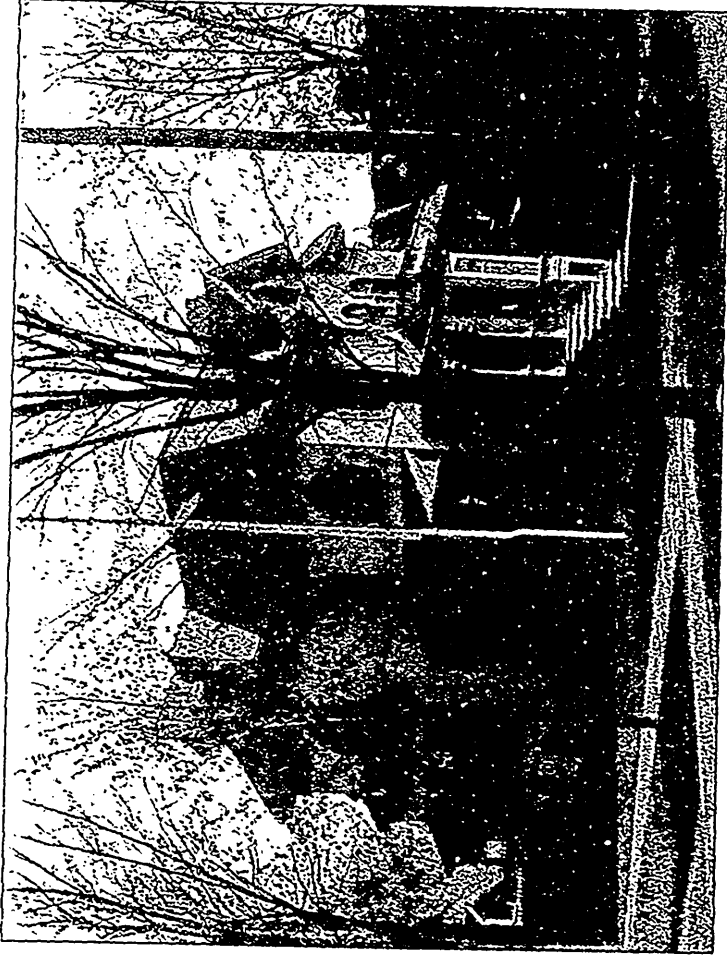

ASHBURY COLLEGE.

70 ARGYLE AVE. OTTAWA.

THE School was founded in Ottawa in 1891, and in June, 1900, obtained incorporation from the Ontario Government under the title of The Ashbury College Company, Limited.

The School is situated in one of the healthiest and most picturesque suburbs of Ottawa, and possesses the advantages of country air as well as those attaching to city life.

The School building is a large and handsome edifice standing in its own grounds and receiving abundance of light and sunshine. The sanitary arrangements are of the best and most modern character, the class rooms are large, lofty and well ventilated, and are equipped with the most approved school furniture. In the Residence Department every effort has been made to provide a bright and comfortable Home for the boys. The bedrooms are large, airy and very comfortably furnished, and are in close proximity to the masters' rooms.

The Building is heated throughout by steam, lighted by electricity, and is provided with ample Fire Escape facilities.

A large playground attached to the School and a newly erected gymnasium afford excellent facilities for recreation.

The School is under the personal management of Mr. Geo. P. Woolcombe, assisted by an efficient staff of Resident and Visiting Masters.

The aim constantly in view in the teaching and general administration of the School, is the development in each pupil, not only of a high standard of scholarship, but also of an upright, manly and Christian character.

Especial stress is laid on the importance of *Honour* in the relations of the boys towards their Masters, and also among themselves.

Particular attention is paid to the manners and deportment of the boys ; politeness in speech, and deference in behavior towards seniors and superiors, being especially emphasized.

A careful and thorough education is given to each pupil ; special attention being devoted to boys who are backward.

Religious Instruction forms an important part of the School curriculum. The work of each day begins with Prayers and Bible Reading ; and the first lesson in the morning session is devoted to the study of Scripture History. Resident Pupils in company with a Master attend the Church of England service twice on Sunday ; but in the case of boys who belong to other denominations, arrangements are made for them to attend their own Church.

No Boy is admitted into the School, or after admission is retained in it, whose character is considered to be detrimental to the moral interests of the other pupils.

All boys are encouraged to take part in the School Sports: Cricket, Football and Hockey being played according to the season of the year. Regular classes in Gymnastics and Calisthenics are held under the direction of a properly qualified Instructor, and every effort is made to produce in each boy a strong and vigorous physique.

A large and well equipped carpenter's shop (for resident pupils only) under the direction of a thoroughly qualified carpenter, affords excellent *Manual Training*, a form of recreation much enjoyed by the pupils.

Boys are prepared for the *Universities, the Royal Military College and Business Life*.

In the *Preparatory* class for very young boys, the early elements of Reading, Writing and Arithmetic are taught under the direction of a Lady Instructor. This Class, which meets in the morning only, is intended as a preparation for the regular classes of the school.

RESIDENT PUPILS

The Resident Pupils, of whom only a limited number are received, are under the personal care and direction of the Principal and his Assistant Masters. It is sought to combine the influences of a refined Home with the discipline and regularity of School life. Resident Pupils take all meals with the Principal and Masters.

Satisfactory references are required in the case of Parents, who, not being personally known to the Principal, make application for the admission of their sons as Resident Pupils.

No Resident Pupil is allowed to go to the city without special permission. Junior Boys are only so allowed when in company with a Master.

TERMS

The School year is divided into *Four* terms of about ten weeks each.

Michaelmas Term, commencing about September 10.

Christmas Term, commencing about November 21.

Easter Term, commencing about February 1.

Summer Term, commencing about April 10.

HOLIDAYS.

Two weeks at Christmas and ten days at Easter.

N.B.—Resident Pupils may remain at the School for these holidays for an extra charge of Five Dollars a week.

DETENTION.

A Detention Class is held three afternoons in each week from 4.00 to 4.45, also on Saturday mornings from 9.30 to 11.30. Boys whose conduct or work has not been satisfactory remain for the whole or a portion of these hours as their case may deserve. No other form of "Imposition" is given.

N.B.—The sports of the School are supported entirely by the Terminal subscriptions of pupils. Parents and guardians are earnestly requested to include the sports subscriptions in the Term's Fees and thus to actively aid this very important branch of School Life.

In the case of brothers attending the School at the same time, a discount of five per cent. is allowed on the fees of the second boy and ten per cent. on those of the third.

A term's notice is required before the removal of a pupil or a term's fees will be charged.

No deduction is made for absence from School or withdrawal before the end of term, except in cases of protracted illness.

Pupils entering the School after a half term has commenced are charged half rates for that term,

A deposit of Ten Dollars is required in the case of all Resident Pupils to cover extra expenses. An itemized account of expenditure is rendered each term, when the deposit must be made up to its original amount. Any balance in a pupil's favour is returned when his name is taken off the books.
