



A most valuable contribution to the Science of Anthropology. Its specialty is the fulness of information which it gives with regard to the early inhabitants of Canada. Information gleaned partly from the account handed down by the early explorer, Cartier, but especially from the close examination of remains. After showing the traces of human life, and of primitive manners and customs, found round the site of the ancient Canadian City, Hochelaga, and in other parts of America, the author proceeds to compare these with the early remains found in the lake-towns of Switzerland, and in the well-known French caves, and it is certainly striking to note the correspondence between them.—*British Quarterly Review*.

The History of Canada under French Regime. 1535–1763, With Maps, Plans, and Illustrative Notes, by II. II. Miles, L.L.D., D.C.L., Secretary of the Quebec Council of Public Instruction. 8vo, Cloth, p.p. 521. \$2.50. Second Edition.

Commencing with the discovery of the country, the author narrates the early struggles under Champlain, the rising fortunes of the colony under Frontenac, and the disastrous but heroic close of the early regime under Montcalm and De Levis. The story of the campaign of the winter and spring of 1759-60, which has not generally received due attention, is narrated in full. The author has availed himself of the recently published archives of Nova Scotia, and has given in the Appendix many valuable documents. A copious Index of Reference is added.

This book is not only a Treatise on Railway Engineering, but it contains the only extant full and detailed account of the process, extending over many years, by which a large territory was taken from Canada, and finally handed over by the Ashburton Treaty to the State of Maine. All accessary illustrative matter in the shape of maps and extracts from treaties is given, so that the work is really a valuable contribution to Canadian History, showing how the distortion of the Canadian frontier was effected, and how the present unitelligible frontier was evolved.

British Columbia is also given in its whole extent.

This Map is an engraved Map, and has the merit of clearness which engraved Maps must possess over photo-lithographed ones. It is based on the maps of Arrowsmith, and is corrected by the latest results of recent surveys. The scale is large enough to show the localities clearly, and bring out the whole geograpical relations between the new and old Provinces of Canada. It should be in the hands of all interested in the vast regions now being opened up.
