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

Little Ying, or Blossom, as we will translate her name, for she had pink cheeks as pretty as any flower, lives in a funny Chinese house inside a very ancient city. The house is funny because the different rooms are scattered all around the yard, instead of being within four walls as our houses are.

The reception or drawing room is next the street, but has neither door nor windows showing from the street; you have to enter a gate at the side of it, and go down a passage. to find the door of the root... on the other side. Then across a small yard are the bedrooms, and on either side still more rooms, one being the black smoky kitchen, where the funny stove without any chimney is used every day to cook the meals.

When Blossom was about eight years old, her mother became very ill, and after they found the Chinese doctors could not make her well, she was brought to the mission hospital and lived there some months, for she had to have an operation. Blossom and her little sister came, too, as well as a servant, and sometimes the nurse brought baby out to see his mother.

Although Blossom's brothers had been to

school and could read, she had never been taught, but when she saw that the women and girls in the hospital all had books to study, she must have her own, too, and in a very short time could read it all, and was ready to help some who had been studying much longer. Little sister, although she could not recognize the letters, learned by heart from hearing Blossom repeat hers every day. They loved best of all the children's sweet hymns just as we sing them here, "Jesus loves me," "When He cometh," "There is no name so sweet on earth."

Blossom and her sister learned a great many of these and learned to sing the tunes so correctly that we would have them sing in mother's room to let the other patients, who gathered together there, hear the hymns. But no little girl can study all day long, so Blossom learned to knit and made nice little mufflers for herself, sister and baby brother.

Our Girls' School was about to be opened, and these little sisters were very keen to attend. The mother had shown a deep interest in the gospel and expressed the desire to become a Christian, but relatives prevented her joining the church. However, on the day school opened little Blossom was found standing outside the gate looking in so wistfully that she could not be turned away.

Her father would not allow her to come and board, so she trudged through the city streets and out across the country road to our school each morning at 8 o'clock and home again each afternoon.

Blossom was industrious and quick at her work, making splendid progress, and her bright and smiling face showed how happy she was that first year at school.

But alas! the Mohammedan priestess discovered, through some zealous relatives, what was being done, and had such influence over the family as to have Blossom taken out of school and taught at home by herself.

The lesson books are not the same, for the priestess teaches the Korean in Arabic. But our little Blossom still reads her New Testament and sings the gospel hymns in her home, and whenever she can manage to escape the priestess and get away, she still comes to church or Sunday School.

1 Kings 21: 11-20. Study 1 Kings, ch. 21-*Memory Verses, 17-19.

11 And the men of his city, even the elders and the nobles who were the inhabitants in his city, did as Jez'ebel had sent unto them, and as it was written in the letters which she had sent unto them.

12 They proclaimed a fast, and set Na'both

on high among the people.

13 And there came in two men, children of Be'lial, and sat before him: and the men of Be'lial witnessed against him, even against Na'both, in the presence of the people, saying, Na'both did blaspheme God and the king. Then they carried him forth out of the city, and stoned him with stones, that he died.

14 Then they sent to Jez'ebel, saying, Na'both is stoned, and is dead.

15 And it came to pass, when Jez'ebel heard that Na'both was stoned, and was dead, that Jez'ebel said to A'hab, Arise, take possession of the vineyard of Na'both the Jez'reelite, which he refused to give thee for money: for Na'both is not alive, but dead.

16 And it came to pass, when A'hab heard that Na'both was dead, that A'hab rose up to go down to the vineyard of Na'both the

Jez reelite, to take possession of it.

17 And the word of the Lord came to Eli'jah the Tish'bite, saying,

18 Arise, go down to meet A'hab king of Is'rael, which is in Samar'ia: behold, he is in the vineyard of Na'both, whither he is gone down to possess it.

19 And thou shalt speak unto him, saying, Thus saith the Lord, Hast thou killed, and also taken possession? And thou shalt speak unto him, saying, Thus saith the LORD, In the place where dogs licked the blood of Na'both shall dogs lick thy blood, even thine.

20 And A'hab said to Eli'jah, Hast thou found me, O mine enemy? And he answered, I have found thee: because thou hast sold thyself to work evil in the sight of the Lord.

THE LESSON RETOLD

King Ahab was talking to Naboth, who lived in a city where King Ahab had a beautiful summer palace. Now Naboth had a vineyard which the king wanted for himself.

"Sell me thy vineyard," said the king to Naboth. "It is near my palace, and I want to make it into a garden. I will give thee another vineyard, or I will pay thee money for it."

Naboth loved his vineyard. "I cannot sell thee the land of my fathers," he answered.

King Ahab went away to his palace with his heart full of anger. He knew he was doing wickedly. His conscience told him that he ought to have left Naboth to enjoy his vineyard and its fruits. The vineyard belonged to Naboth, and Naboth surely had a right to keep it if he wished. Not even the king had the right to take it away from him against his will.

Yet King Ahab grew more and more angry. He lay down and turned his face to the wall and would not even eat. He wanted the vineyard. He wanted it so much that he was breaking God's Commandment, "Thou shalt not covet .. any thing that is thy neighbour's."

By and by Queen Jezebel came to him and asked: "Why dost thou not eat? Why art thou so sad?"

When King Ahab had told her the story she said: "Eat and be merry. I will get Naboth's vineyard for thee."

Then the queen wrote letters to some of the chief men in the city where Naboth lived. This is what she wrote: "Set Naboth before

the people. Let two men say that he has sinned against God and the king. Then stone him until he dies."

They did to Naboth just as Jezebel had commanded,—to poor Naboth, who had done no wrong! Word was sent to Jezebel that everything had been done as she had ordered in the cruel letters which she had written.

Then the queen said to Ahab: "Go and take the vineyard, for Naboth is dead."

Ahab went to the vineyard and began to walk about among the vines. Suddenly he looked up, and there, standing before him, was Elijah, God's prophet. For God had seen the wickedness of Ahab and Jezebel and had sent Elijah to tell the king that their sin would be surely punished.

"I have found thee," said Elijah, "because thou hast sold thyself to work evil in the sight of the Lord."

Yes, God knew how wicked Ahab had been. And now God had sent Elijah to tell of the punishment that would come upon him and upon Queen Jezebel.

14 Then went he down, and dipped himself seven times in Jor'dan, according to the saying of the man of God: and his flesh came again like unto the flesh of a little child, and he was clean.

15 And when the servant of the man of God was risen early, and gone forth, behold, an host compassed the city both with horses and chariots. And his servant said unto him, Alas, my master! how shall we do?

16 And he answered, Fear not: for they that be with us are more than they that be with

them.

17 And Eli'sha prayed, and said, Lord, I pray thee, open his eyes, that he may see. And the Lord opened the eyes of the young man; and he saw: and, behold, the mountain was full of horses and chariots of fire round about Eli'sha.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Once upon a time the king of Syria was making war upon the land of Israel, and made his camp in a certain place. But Elisha the prophet knew where the camp was and sent to tell the king of Israel. Then the army of Israel took good care not to go where the Syrians had camped. Again and again the Syrians made their camp in the land of Israel, and each time they did so the news was sent to the king of Israel by the prophet.

Now at first the king of Syria thought that some one of his own officers was carrying news to the king of Israel. But at last he found out that it was Elisha who was doing this. Of course the Syrian king was very angry. He found out that Elisha was staying in the city of Dothan and he made up his mind

to send a great army and take him prisoner.

It was very dark out in the fields. Look at that army marching, marching, through

the country at the dead of night.

The king of Syria was sending his soldiers to the little town of Dothan. They were going to take Elisha, God's prophet, prisoner. An army was trying to capture just one man!

On they went in the darkness. By and by they drew near to Dothan. Quietly, oh, so quietly, they pitched the tents and made their camp. They would have to wait till daylight before they could take Elisha.

Elisha's servant woke early the next morning. When he got up he saw the army of soldiers and chariots around the town.

"Alas, my master! What shall we do?" he asked.

"Fear not," answered Elisha. "We have more help than the enemy has." Then Elisha prayed, "Lord, I pray Thee, open his eyes."

God heard Elisha's prayer. The servant looked and saw a host of chariots and horses of fire sent from heaven. The enemy could not see the fiery host, but God was surely with Elisha and his servant.

Soon another wonderful thing happened. God sent a strange blindness upon the enemy's soldiers, so that when Elisha boldly met them, they did not know him.

"Follow me," he said. Then that great army turned and went over the hills after Elisha until they came to the city of Samaria. Elisha led them all inside the city and the gates were carefully guarded. Then Elisha prayed, "Lord, open Thou their eyes."

In a moment the blindness left the soldiers and they saw where they were. They saw the strong walls around them and the troops of Israel standing ready with their spears. They knew that they were Elisha's prisoners.

"No," answered Elisha. "Give them food and send them home."

4 And the seventh year Jehoi'ada sent and fetched the rulers over hundreds, with the captains and the guard, and brought them to him into the house of the Lord, and made a covenant with them, and took an oath of them in the house of the Lord, and shewed them the king's son.

12 And he brought forth the king's son, and put the crown upon him, and gave him the testimony; and they made him king, and anointed him; and they clapped their hands, and

said, God save the king.

THE LESSON RETOLD

There was a king of Judah whose mother was a very wicked woman. She was a daughter of the wicked king and queen, Ahab and Jezebel, and her name was Athaliah. When the son of Athaliah, who had been king, died, his mother determined that she would rule in his place. So she caused all the king's sons and daughters to be put to death, so that none of them might grow up to interfere with her plans.

There was only one of the king's sons who escaped being put to death, and he was a wee, wee baby named Joash. Jehosheba, the daughter of Athaliah and aunt of the little Joash, determined to save his life. Now Jehosheba was the wife of Jehoiada the high priest, and she knew every nook and corner of the temple. So she took the

baby and his nurse, and hid them in the temple until the boy was seven years old.

Baby Joash had almost lost his life. His aunt had come just in time to steal him away from the evil men whom his grandmother had sent to slay him.

The grandmother did this wicked deed because she had stolen the throne of baby Joash, who was really the rightful king of Judah.

Aunt Jehosheba ran with the baby to one of the temple storerooms and there she hid him and his nurse. She could do this because her husband, Jehoiada, was the high priest.

Little Joash was hidden in the temple six years. While he was there, Uncle Jehoiada taught him many things. He told him of the heavenly Father, and how God wanted him to be a good, obedient boy, so that some day he would be a kind, wise king.

When Joash was seven years old, Uncle Jehoiada decided to tell the people that their little king was alive and safe. On a certain Sabbath he gathered the soldiers and trusted men of the land around the temple. Then he brought little Joash out before them. A golden crown was set upon his head and he was anointed king. At the same time a copy of God's word was placed in his hands. This meant that the new king was to obey God's holy law in all that he did.

4 And Jeho'ash said to the priests, All the money of the dedicated things that is brought into the house of the Lord, even the money of every one that passeth the account, the money that every man is set at, and all the money that cometh into any man's heart to bring into the house of the Lord,

5 Let the priests take it to them, every man of his acquaintance: and let them repair the breaches of the house, wheresoever any breach shall be found.

6 But it was so, that in the three and twentieth year of king Jeho'ash the priests had not repaired the breaches of the house.

7 Then king Jeho'ash called for Jehoi'ada the priest, and the other priests, and said unto them, Why repair ye not the breaches of the house? now therefore receive no more money of your acquaintance, but deliver it for the breaches of the house.

8 And the priests consented to receive no more money of the people, neither to repair

the breaches of the house.

9 But Jehoi'ada the priest took a chest, and bored a hole in the lid of it, and set it beside the altar, on the right side as one

cometh into the house of the Lord: and the priests that kept the door put therein all them money that was brought into the house of the LORD.

10 And it was so, when they saw that there was much money in the chest, that the king's scribe and the high priest came up, and they put up in bags, and told the money that was found in the house of the LORD.

11 And they gave the money, being told, into the hands of them that did the work, that had the oversight of the house of the Lord: and they laid it out to the carpenters and builders,

THE LESSON RETOLD

King Joash had ordered the chest to be made. When it was done, Jehoiada, the high priest, had bored a hole in the lid and then set the chest at the entrance to the temple.

Word was next sent to all the people of Judah. "Come to the temple," I suppose the message said. "Bring money and pay your share for mending God's house."

God's beautiful temple in Jerusalem sad y needed mending. It had been built many years now and the walls were cracking and crumbling. But it takes money to buy timber and stone and to have carpenters and masons. So now everyone was asked to do his part and give some money.

Surely it was no wonder that Joash loved God's house and wished to see it as beautiful as possible. It was there that he had been kept safe from his cruel grandmother, Athaliah, and there his good uncle, Jehoiada, had carefully taught him and trained him so that, when the time came, he was ready to be a good king over God's people.

How quickly the princes and people answered, and how generous they were I They brought their money to the priests who stood by the door of the temple and the priests dropped it into the chest.

There was soon so much money in the chest that it had to be carried to the king's room and emptied. The gold and silver was put into bags, and the chest taken back to its place in front of the temple. Again and again it was filled, and still the people kept coming. They were glad and anxious to give.

13 Then let our countenances be looked upon before thee, and the countenance of the children that eat of the portion of the king's meat: and as thou seest, deal with thy servants.

14 So he consented to them in this matter, and proved them ten days.

15 And at the end of ten days their countenances appeared fairer and fatter in flesh than all the children which did eat the portion of the king's meat.

16 Thus Mel'zar took away the portion of their meat, and the wine that they should

drink; and gave them pulse.

19 And the king communed with them; and among them all was found none like Dan'iel, Hanani'ah, Mi'shael, and Azari'ah: therefore stood they before the king.

20 And in all matters of wisdom and understanding, that the king enquired of them, he found them ten times better than all the magicians and astrologers that were in all his realm.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Clang! the great gate was shut! Daniel and three companions with him were prisoners, with many others, in the city of Babylon.

King Nebuchadnezzar sent the four boys to the palace. He commanded that they should be trained and taught so that by and by they could become his trusted servants.

When Daniel was led into the palace, he saw the king's tables loaded with rich food and golden goblets of wine. King Nebuchadnezzar had ordered just such food for the boys, also.

What should Daniel do? He knew that God would not want him to eat the rich food and drink the wine. For, before being brought to him and his companions the food and drink had been offered to the false

gods of Babylon. And if Daniel had used the food and drink, it would have been the same as worshiping these false gods. Yet, if he refused, King Nebuchadnezzar might be angry. Would Daniel dare to say "No?"

Daniel was brave and it did not take him long to decide. He went to the king's servant and said: "I pray thee try me and three of my friends for ten days. Let us have simple food and water instead of wine. See if we are not as strong and well as the other boys who drink the king's wine."

Daniel coaxed, and at last the king's servant was willing to try the plan. For ten days the four boys were given vegetables to eat and water to drink. They did not touch the sparking wine or rich food. They obeyed the

lessons their fathers had taught them in their old homes in Jerusalem.

In ten days the king's servant came to look at the boys. And Daniel and his three friends were healthier and stronger than any of those who had drunk the wine. Then the king's servant was satisfied, and after that the four boys were allowed to eat their simple food and drink only clear, cool water.

God saw how Daniel and his three friends had tried to do right, and now He helped them in their work. How quickly and easily they learned their lessons! You see their heads were not dull and sleepy with wine.

Then one day King Nebuchadnezzar found out what good work these boys had done. He called them to the palace court and there he chose them to be his trusted servants.



Jonah 3: 1-10. Study Jonah 3: 1 to 4: 11-Memory Verse, 10.

Golden Text—Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I commanded you: and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world.—Matthew 28: 19, 20 (Rev. Ver.).



2 Arise, go unto Nin'eveh, that great city, and preach unto it the preaching that I bid thee.

3 So Jon'ah arose, and went unto Nin'eveh, according to the word of the Lord. Now Nin'eveh was an exceeding great city of three days' journey.

4 And Jon'ah began to enter into the city a day's journey, and he cried, and said, Yet forty days, and Nin'eveh shall be overthrown.

5 So the people of Nin'eveh believed God, and proclaimed a fast, and put on sackcloth, from the greatest of them even to the least of them.

6 For the word came unto the king of Nin'eveh, and he arose from his throne, and he laid his robe from him, and covered him with sackcloth, and sat in ashes.

7 And he caused it to be proclaimed and published through Nin'eveh by the decree of the king and his nobles, saying, Let neither man nor beast, herd nor flock, taste any thing: let them not feed, nor drink water:

8 But let man and beast be covered with

sackcloth, and cry mightily unto God: yes, let them turn every one from his evil way, and from the violence that is in their hands.

9 Who can tell if God will turn and repent, and turn away from his fierce anger, that we perish not?

10 And God saw their works, that they turned from their evil way; and God repented of the evil, that he had said that he would do unto them; and he did it not.

THE LESSON RETOLD

One day a long time ago, a man named Jonah heard God speaking to him. God said: "Arise, go to the big, wicked city of Nineveh, and tell the people that I am displeased because I see them sinning."

Jonah did not wish to go to Nineveh. For Jonah was a Hebrew, and the Hebrews hated the people of Nineveh, who were very fierce and cruel. Jonah knew that God was very kind and good and wished the Ninevites to give up their sin so that He might forgive them, and Jonah had such evil feelings in his heart that he did not want them to be forgiven.

So Jonah tried to run away from God's voice, but he could not. He went down to the sea and got into a ship and started for a country far, far away from his own. But

God sent a great storm, and the ship, with all on board, was in great danger. Jonah, at last, told the sailors that the storm had been sent because God was angry with him. Then the sailors took Jonah and threw him into the sea, and he was swallowed by a great fish, so that he was kept from drowning. By and by God brought Jonah out of the fish.

And again God called to Jonah, "Arise, go to Nineveh, and tell the people what I want you to tell them." This time Jonah obeyed.

When he reached the big, wicked city he cried again and again, "In forty days Nineveh shall be destroyed!" He told how God hated sin. But he also told of God's love.

The people came and listened. They believed Jonah's words about the true God whom they never had known, and were sorry for their wickedness. Even the king took off his royal robes and put on clothes of mourning to show his sorrow. All the people prayed God to forgive them. God heard their prayers. He forgave them and spared their city.

So Jonah and all the Hebrew people learned that God loved all the people in the world as truly as He loved them, and that God wants everybody to know about His love and kindness. No one can be so wicked that God does not love him and long to forgive him and make him good.

There is a country over the seas called China, which, for a long, long time, had sadly needed a message from God. In China dwell thousands and thousands of children and their fathers and mothers.

For hundreds of years China was a sad land in which no one knew about the one true God. On the shelves of the houses were ugly idols. All of the people in the family, even little boys and girls, prayed to them. These people made many mistakes because they knew no better. God was displeased with many, many things He saw in China.

But God spoke to some men and women and said, "Arise, and go to China." They obeyed, and went and taught the people. Now China is growing to be a happier land.



2 The virgin of Is'rael is fallen; she shall no more rise: she is forsaken upon her land; there is none to raise her up.

11 Forasmuch therefore as your treading is upon the poor, and ye take from him burdens of wheat : ye have built houses of hewn stone, but ye shall not dwell in them ; ye have planted pleasant vineyards, but ye shall not drink wine of them.

12 For I know your manifold transgressions and your mighty sins : they afflict the just, they take a bribe, and they turn aside the poor in the gate from their right.

13 Therefore the prudent shall keep silence in that time; for it is an evil time.
14 Seek good, and not evil, that ye may live: and so the Lord, the God of hosts, shall be with you, as ye have spoken.

15 Hate the evil, and love the good, and establish judgment in the gate: it may be that the Lord God of hosts will be gracious unto the remnant of Jo'seph.

THE LESSON RETOLD

"Ta-a-a-a! Ho-o-o!" The sound rang over the hills. Amos the shepherd was calling his flock, and how they rushed to answer! They loved the shepherd who guided them over the steep rocks, leading them where they could get plenty of grass and water and protecting them from dangers.

One day Amos was called away from his flock on the quiet hills of Judah. God sent him to take a message to Bethel. The people of Bethel had grown very wicked. Most of them no longer loved our heavenly Father;

they had forgotten Him. Instead of praying to God they bowed down and worshiped the glittering image of a golden calf.

This was one of the two golden calves, which, you will remember, the wicked king of Israel, Jeroboam, had, long before the time of the Lesson, set up, pretending that they would help his people to worship the true God. But, as time went on, the people' more and more forgot about the true God and worshiped the calves. The people of Bethel thought the image could bless and help them and keep them safe in times of danger. Amos was to go to these foolish, wicked people and call them back to God.

Now Amos, as we have seen, belonged to the kingdom of Judah, but he was sent with God's message to the kingdom of Israel. It was a very dangerous thing for him to go amongst a strange people to tell them of their sins. They were likely to grow very angry at him and might even take away his life. But Amos was a brave man, and he started at once on God's errand. Over the roads he hastened until he came in sight of Bethel and the gleaming roofs of the temple built for the worship of the golden calf.

As he drew still nearer he saw that the streets were throughd with people, gathering around the golden calf. He could hear the noise of laughing and feasting.

Amos had a hard task before him. It was not easy to face those people who were so strong and rich, and yet so wicked! But Amos was not afraid. Straight into their midst he walked, and then he gave God's message.

He told the people how wicked they were. He bade them leave their sinful ways and come back to the heavenly Father. God would save them if they would obey. "Seek the Lord!" he cried. "Seek good, and not evil...and so the Lord...shall be with you."

Amos had faithfully given God's message.

8 And the Am'monites gave gifts to Uzzi'an: and his name spread abroad even to the entering in of E'gypt; for he strengthened himself exceedingly.

9 Moreover Uzzi'ah built towers in Jeru'salem at the corner gate, and at the valley gate, and at the turning of the wall, and forti-

fied them.

10 Also he built towers in the desert, and digged many wells: for he had much cattle, both in the low country, and in the plains: husbandmen also, and vine dressers in the mountains, and in Car'mel: for he loved husbandry.

15 And he made in Jeru'salem engines, invented by cunning men, to be on the towers and upon the bulwarks, to shoot arrows and great stones withal. And his name spread far abroad; for he was marvellously helped,

till he was strong.

16 But when he was strong, his heart was lifted up to his destruction: for he transgressed against the Lord his God, and went into the temple of the Lord to burn incense upon the altar of incense.

17 And Azari'ah the priest went in after

him, and with him fourscore priests of the LORD, that were valiant men:

18 And they withstood Uzzi'ah the king, and said unto him, It appertaineth not unto thee, Uzzi'ah, to burn incense unto the Lord, but to the priests the sons of Aa'ron, that are consecrated to burn incense: go out of the sanctuary; for thou hast trespassed; neither shall it be for thine honour from the Lord God.

19 Then Uzzi'ah was wroth, and had a censer in his hand to burn incense: and while he was wroth with the priests, the leprosy even rose up in his forehead before the priests in the

house of the LORD, from beside the incense altar.

20 And Azari'ah the chief priest, and all the priests, looked upon him, and, behold, he was leprous in his forehead, and they thrust him out from thence; yea, himself hasted also to go out, because the Lord had smitten him.

21 And Uzzi'ah the king was a leper unto the day of his death, and dwelt in a several house, being a leper; for he was cut off from the house of the Lord: and Jo'tham his son was over the king's house, judging the people of the land.

THE LESSON RETOLD

King Uzziah was very young when first the crown was placed upon his head; indeed, he was only a big boy.

He was a good king for a long time, and he had a great many things to make him happy. He loved God and tried to serve Him; he was kind to his people.

As he grew older, he began to do great things. He built fine towers and houses and bridges in his land. How proud he was when he looked away up at a tall new tower! He would think, "I, King Uzziah, built this!"

He placed in the towers new kinds of machines of war that never before had been known. The soldiers could fire from the machines big stones and arrows.

He gave to his soldiers shields and spears and helmets and bows and arrows and slings. When Uzziah and his soldiers went to war, God was with them, because the king was good.

But, after a while, Uzziah forgot that it was God who was making him great and successful.

He was proud when he saw his shepherds leading his flocks and herds to the wells which he had had his servants dig. He was proud when he walked through his beautiful

vineyards. He thought, "I have made myself very great !"

At last Uzziah grew so bold that he dared do a very wicked thing. One day he went into the temple to burn incense on the altar. Only the priests were allowed to do this; it was forbidden to any other man, even to the

The priests rushed after King Uzziah. "Go out from this holy place, King Uzziah," they exclaimed. "You are sinning! You have no right to burn the incense!" It was a brave thing for the priests to stand up against the king in this way when he was breaking God's law.

The proud king had the censer in his hand; he was very angry. But as he looked at the priests, his punishment came. A spot appeared upon his forehead. It was leprosy, a most dreadful disease!

Now, when any one had this dreadful disease, he was not permitted to live with other people for fear that they, too, might take the disease. The leper must leave even his dearest friends and go to live by himself.

And the priests drove Uzziah from the holy temple. He had to leave the palace and live in a lonely house away from well people.



1 When Is'rael was a child, then I loved him, and called my son out of E'gypt.

2 As they called them, so they went from them: they sacrificed unto Ba'alim, and burned incense to graven images.

3 I taught E'phraim also to go, taking them by their arms; but they knew not that

I healed them.

4 I drew them with cords of a man, with bands of love: and I was to them as they that take off the yoke on their jaws, and I laid meat unto them.

5 He shall not return into the land of E'gypt, but the Assyr'ian shall be his king, because they refused to return.

6 And the sword shall abide on his cities, and shall consume his branches, and devour *them*, because of their own councils.

7 And my people are bent to backsliding from me: though they called them to the most High, none at all would exalt him.

8 How shall I give thee up, E'phraim? how shall I deliver thee, Is'rael? how shall I make thee as Ad'mah? how shall I set thee as Zebo'im? mine heart is turned within me, my repentings are kindled together.

9 I will not execute the fierceness of mine anger, I will not return to destroy E'phraim: for I am God, and not man; the Holy One in the midst of thee: and I will not enter into the city.

10 They shall walk after the Lord: he shall roar like a lion: when he shall roar, then the children shall tremble from the west.

11 They shall tremble as a bird out of E'gypt, and as a dove out of the land of Assyr'ia : and I will place them in their houses, saith the Lord.

THE LESSON RETOLD

The children of Israel had a very loving heavenly Father. God had given them all the blessings they had. All He asked in return was that they should be good, and love and obey Him.

God told them just what things they should do, and just what they should not do. The things God told them not to do would hurt them.

Sometimes the people of Israel tried to obey, but so often they disobeyed.

God was sorry, for their sins were making them more and more trouble. He forgave them may times, but often He had to punish. He sent teachers, or prophets, to help them learn. One of these teachers was Hosea.

This prophet told his people how dearly God had loved them and how much He had done for them,—how long, long ago, when they were slaves in Egypt, He had set them free and brought them to a land of their own, and how He had cared for them and protected them. But they had been very ungrateful, and, instead of loving and obeying God, they had done many wicked things and had worshiped false gods.

Hosea said to his people: "If you keep on in wrong-doing, you will surely be punished. But God is like a loving father. He longs to forgive you. Ask Him." So we should ask God to forgive us. For the Bible says: "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins," 1 John 1:9.

"Blessed are they .. whose sins are covered," Romans 4:7.

THE LESSON RETOLD

For a whole year our Lessons have been about the people of Israel. What wonderful stories we have had about the judges and kings and prophets whom God sent to His people to rule over them and teach them to do His will! And, above all, how much we have learned about God's love to His people and His goodness to them. Surely, when God loved them so dearly and did so much for them, they ought to have loved Him with all their hearts and they ought to have done everything that God told them to do.

But alas, as our stories for the year have told us, the people of Israel were often very ungrateful to God for all His goodness to them. He wanted them to worship and serve Him, and, instead of doing this, they chose for themselves false gods, just like the heathen peoples who lived round about them. God

had given them laws to tell them what they ought to do and what they ought not to do, and they very, very often disobeyed these laws and did just what pleased their own foolish and sinful hearts. If they had only obeyed God, they would have been truly happy, but when they disobeyed Him, they always suffered for their wrong-doing.

Now God was very patient with His people who thus sinned against Him. He was always slow to punish them for their wrong-doing, and when they were sorry for their sins, He was always quick to forgive them. He sent many prophets as teachers to tell them of His love and to warn them of the evils which their wickedness would bring upon them. When they went after false gods He did everything that He could to bring them back to Himself and to His loving service.

But, in spite of all God's loving warnings and invitations, the people of Israel grew worse and worse. They kept on worshiping false gods, and they would not obey God's commands. So at last God determined to punish them by sending them away as captives into a strange land. He allowed the king of Assyria to come up with a great army against Samaria, and make prisoners of the people in one part of his land. The people in the other part of the country were permitted to remain in it for a good many years longer; but at last, they, too, were taken into captivity. So God showed that He wants people to be good and to serve Him.

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
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
