**PROGRESS OF THE WAR**  
 [August 31 to September 6]

DURING the past week very little in-formation was forthcoming concern-ing hostilities, and no event of out-standing importance was recorded.

In the West artillery duels were continuous throughout the week, with no real change of front. In the Vosges much activity prevailed, which, apparent-ly, resulted in some slight advantage to the French.

In the East, Grodno was evacuated by the Russians, but this was still held.

The Teutons made some further progress in the direction of Riga, and the possi-bility of the evacuation of that most im-portant port is now not remote.

The Teutons also seem to have forced the retirement of the Russians at the southern extremity of the line in Galicia; but apparently, but little change was made in the central part of the line.

Of the operations in the Dardanelles few details have been officially announced, but it is believed that the Allies have made some important gains.

The week was received from Italy during the point of view of the Quadruple Al-liance. The Austrians were reported to have evacuated Rovereto, an important place in Trentino. At other points on the frontier north to the north, and in the northeast, the Italians are said also to have made gains.

The German submarine "blockade" of British ports was considerably in evi-dence, a number of merchant vessels being torpedoed and sunk, unfortunately with a loss together of nearly sixty lives. The most important of these were the Atlantic liner *Hesperian*, 150 miles south of the coast of Ireland at dusk on Saturday evening, September 4. An attempt was made to tow the vessel to Queenstown, but she sank on Monday morning outside the harbor. She carried 350 passengers and a crew of 300. Nearly thirty people are missing, but it was not possible on Tues-day to learn the exact number of fatalities, or whether the deaths were due to drown-ing or the result of the explosion.

The diplomatic correspondence between America and Germany in regard to sub-marine warfare seems to have made no further progress during the week; and the *Hesperian* episode only accentuates Ger-many's determination to modify in no degree the methods of submarine activi-ties against which America has so strong-ly protested. We cannot criticize the action of America in the difficult situation in which Germany's disregard for her protests has placed her, but we are con-fident that she will find ways and means to enforce her views.

No solution of the Balkan problem was reached during the week, though it was stated that Serbia was willing to concede to Bulgaria the acquisition of territory in Albania which she demanded.

While the Pope is said to have been making great efforts to bring about peace, some observers are predicting the conti-nuance of the war for a number of years. While another winter's campaign is in-evitable, it is difficult to believe that Ger-many and Austria-Hungary will be able to hold out for more than a year. And even one year more of war is frightful to contemplate.

**VANDALISM**

WE regret to have to record a piece of vandalism for which no possible reason can be given except that of mere want of respect. In the Spring Mrs. Hyster Reed, with the co-operation of a number of people who desire to add to the attractive appearance of St. Andrews, had a large number of young elms, maples and other trees planted on each side of the road leading to the Golf Course. The trees were protected with guards, and people were asked through the BEACON to warn their children not to do anything to injure them. The sum-mer has been particularly favorable for the growth of the trees, and they are all flourishing. On Sunday afternoon last a large number of the trees, more than twelve, were deliberately broken, and others much injured. Several persons are suspected of being guilty of the outrage; and it is the hope of all right-thinking townspeople that the rascal or rascals, whoever they may be, who com-mitted the offence, will be brought to book and have condign punishment meted out to them for the senseless outrage committed.

**LABOR DAY**

LABOR DAY was observed quietly in town, most places of business being closed; though a few—those who specially cater for summer tourist trade—kept open in order to accommodate a number of departing visitors. A good many people went out of town for the day on one or other of several excursions. There was no special celebration in town.

**LETTERS TO THE EDITOR**

IT is the policy of the *Sentinel* always to advocate the cause for the best interests of Eastport and its people, even when this involves, as it sometimes must, direct criticism of men and methods. The correction of abuses, wherever they exist, is not the affair solely of the newspaper—it affords a remarkable opportunity for militant righteousness to all citizens, more especially those to whom abuses first appear and appeal.

We are sometimes asked to take up and present to the public matters involving the honesty, faithfulness or efficiency of officials and others. We are asked to call into question certain rights and to make certain comparisons. It often happens that the person calling these things to our attention is much better informed about them than we have had any opportunity or occasion to be. To all such we would tender this friendly advice: Don't criticise the *Sentinel* for being unwilling to stand sponsor for all of the dissatisfaction that may exist anywhere in town. If we gave our attention exclusively to that, we would have time for nothing else, and no other use for our time. If things are going wrong, or have gone wrong, or are going to go wrong, and you know it to a certainty and think that publicity may assist in setting them right, we shall be glad to do our part by opening our col-umns to anything of public interest you may write for publication over your own signature, or over a signature you will stand behind personally.

And we would suggest further, that this is a much better way of "knocking" if that is your drift, or "boosting" if that is your wiser preference, than to keep on doing either on the quiet, where there is no chance for reply or explanation in the case, or acceleration and co-operation in the other. "Letters to the Editor" are useful, instructive and influential features of many newspapers. We suggest and would welcome their wider use in this locality.—*Editorial Sentinel*, August 25.
