City Solicitor Henderson Points Out Way in Which Power Contract Can be Broken---Amendment Made to Draft Agreement for Purchase.

(Special to the Courier)

TORONTO, March 4 .-- City Solicitor Henderson has gone over however sympathetic to the United Evening Standard agree with Sir Ed- the tentative agreement drafted by the receiver's counsel, and approved by the bondholders' committee, for the purchase of the Grand Valley by the city of Brantford, and an amended form has been received by those interested here from Brantford's vigilant watchdog of the law

"You will observe," writes Mr. Henderson, "that I have altered the terms to make them agree with the provisions of our offer of purchase. The only amendment to it suggested by the bondholders was that we should assume the liability, if any, of the receiver, as uch, under the contracts for power with the town of Galt and the Western Counties Electric Co. It was not suggested that we should assume the liability under these contracts of the Grand Valley Railway Company.

Stockdale from any liability attaching to him on account of such power having been supplied during his possession of the railway system, but without admitting that any liabilities attached to him. It is agreed that if any proceedings shall be taken against him in respect of personal liability under said contracts, the city shall **Disappearance** undertake the defence of such proceedings and indemnify him against same and costs."

All this, of course, is conditional upon two things: The ratepayers of Brantford must say "Yes," and the Legislature of Ontario. must empower the municipality to make the purchase.







HOSPITAL FIGURES It will be noticed that the estimated expenditure at the Hospital for the present year is \$24,000, an increase of \$1423 over last year. This leaves a balance of \$9500, which the city of Brantford will have to provide, less the sums received from the county and townships. At present the county has contributed \$500 per annum and the township of Brantford \$250. The other townships have not given anything.
