In presenting their annual programme and greeting to the patrons of Unionville Fair, the Directors have great pleasure in congratulating the farmers on the very prosperous season just closed.

It is seldom that an abundant harvest, a good pasturage season, and good prices all round visit the farmer at the same time. But these appear to be the conditions that have obtained throughout the whole Dominion, and there is general rejoicing in consequence.

The Directors feel that owing to the high prices that have prevailed for cheese this season the farmers of Leeds County should feel especially thankful, and be in a mood to give their hearty support to that worthy and distinctly agricultural institution—the Unionville Fair.

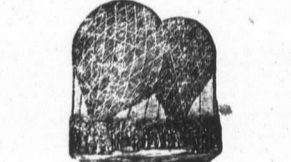
The great storm of last spring wrought considerable damage to the property of the Society at Unionville—leveling the fences and wrecking the cattle-stalls, sheep-pens, etc. But the officers of the Fair have risen equal to the occasion, and, relying upon the loyalty of the people to the Fair, have reconstructed on new and improved plans for two hundred head of cattle, and two hundred feet of sheep pens are now in readiness.

The work of improvement has not been confined to the smaller buildings. A change has been wrought in the interior of the Main building that will meet with the favorable appreciation of all, especially the ladies. The north and south wings have been lined with inch planed lumber, and a broad table or shelf with railing in front encircles both these wings. Besides showing the exhibits to better advantage, this arrangement will enable the caretakers of the different classes to check the objectionable practice of handling goods, so prevalent at all fairs.

These improvements have necessitated a large expenditure, which the Directors expect will be fully met by the ever increasing attendance. The benefits to be derived from attending Unionville Fair, from a social and business point of view, are being better understood each succeeding year. Here the best products of the agriculturalist and of the domestic animal, and the woman are brought together, all classes of society are thrown into communication, ideas are exchanged and with the exchange of ideas comes improvement in method. A friendly rivalry, too, to excel his neighbor induces the exhibitor to use the best means within his power to produce a fine article, and this means increased general excellence in all lines of production. This fair should receive more and more recognition from the general public for its stimulating and healthful classes of the community on the path of progress.

A growing feature of all fairs—township, county and provincial—has for several years been the entertainment department. Efforts along the line of rendering fairs more attractive by providing pure, wholesome entertainment for the whole have been very favorably received and have invariably resulted in greatly increasing the attendance. The managers of Unionville Fair have not been slow to recognize this fact and to take advantage of it; but while making generous provision for the amusement of the people, their efforts have been always devoted to securing pre-eminence for its purely agricultural features. An engagement has been made with Prince Leo of New York, the greatest aeronaut of this continent, to make his fifth ascension from the grounds of Unionville on the second day of the fair (Thursday, 16th September). For the past year or two a keen competition has existed between Prince Leo, champion aeronaut of the United States, and Prof. Chas. La Strange of Paris, France, who claims the championship of the world. These two men met at the Montreal exposition during the fair and Prince Leo challenged La-Strange to a contest for the championship of the world, to take place from the fair grounds at Unionville. The two balloons, which will be the largest ever constructed for hot-air exhibitions, will be inflated side by side and be cast loose at the same moment, and the man who goes the higher and makes the more successful parachute leap and descent to earth will receive the title of Champion of the World and a purse presented by the managers of Unionville Fair.

This will, without doubt, be the most exciting Balloon Contest ever witnessed in the world, and will be worth coming hundreds of miles to see. The Fair Managers have incurred a very heavy expense to provide this new and exciting feature at their fair and rely upon all their friends and patrons turning out and assisting in swelling the gate receipts to help meet this large outlay. Should the weather prove unfavorable, the ascension will be postponed to the following day.

The Bicycle Races will be run under the rules of the C. W. A. and promise to be keenly contested. The list of prizes offered will be found in another column of this announcement.

The liberal prizes offered by the Sports Committee never fail to attract to Unionville a lot of first-class horses, and this year promises to be no exception. The track was last year greatly improved and at this fair it will be found in excellent condition.

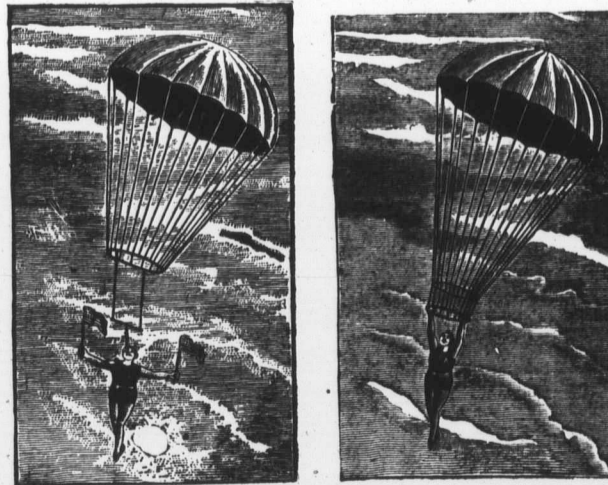

DEAR SIR:—As I had the pleasure of recently visiting the city of Buffalo, perhaps a short description of what I saw and heard, and a few facts about Buffalo, might be of interest to my fellow countrymen who read your great journal.

The trip from Montreal to Buffalo via Syracuse and Rochester (294 miles) was made in eight hours, reaching the city at 4.15 p. m. on Monday.

The hotels and boarding houses were already crowded, and it was estimated that 347 special trains had reached the city by noon on Tuesday, besides the regular passenger trains, on the 27 regular lines of railway.

The 350,000 visitors at one time made the city seem fairly lively.

The G. A. R. parade on Wednesday was a scene to be remembered. First came the mayor and leading officials of the city, about fifty in number, on horseback; then President McKinley and staff in carriages; and then officers of the G. A. R. on horseback; then 50,000 veterans of the war of '62-'66, marching eight abreast. The music band was all that could be desired. The very frequent appearance in the procession of the torn and faded flags which had seen service in the late war, elicited an almost continual roar of applause from the hundreds of thousands along the line of march. The time occupied in passing a given point was about six hours.

Camp Jewett, with its 1250 tents for the G. A. R., was well worth visiting.

The display of bunting and decoration was most beautiful, the contract price for one of the many arches was \$2,500.

Buffalo has a population of 355,000. There are 80 public schools, and 190 churches in the city. There are 200 miles of asphalted streets, 160 miles of electric street-railways. The view of the city from the top of the Guaranty building, 240 feet above the street, and the Morgan building, 221 feet, was very fine.

The convention of the United States Bee-keepers' Union in the college, Corner Huron and Main streets, from Tuesday to Thursday, was well attended, many prominent bee-keepers from throughout the United States and Canada being present at all the sessions. Unsuccessful candidates for Junior or Senior leaving standing will be allowed to take the same options in 1898 as previously selected. This privilege is granted only to those who were candidates in 1897 or in a previous year for junior or senior leaving certificates. Candidates for partial matriculation will forward their junior or senior leaving certificates to the department for endorsement in the subject passed in these examinations.

List of the marks of the unsuccessful candidates in the various form examinations will be forwarded before September 1st to the Principals of the High School centres and the Public School Inspectors in the cases of the other centres. Certificate will follow to the same addresses in about two weeks. Candidates need not, therefore, apply to the Education Department for either marks or certificates. Unsuccessful candidates should consult the Principal of the school after receiving their marks, before making "appeals." In no case will appeals be accepted by the Education Department after September 20th.
