

CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS.

free from all rancour and all recrimination, impressed everybody.

The Tories, after recovering from their staggering blow, took up the difficult task of choosing Mr. Balfour's successor. For the first hours Austen Chamberlain was rushed to the front, then Walter Long was caught up, but the final decision was that the place should fall to Andrew Bonar Law, who is a junior in service and in rank, and still more in social position, to the two others.

The Liberals are delighted at the change in the leadership. It means a headlong plunge of the Tories into high protection and food taxes, which Mr. Balfour so long prevented, and it means that Tories will stand forth as a solid and united high-tariff party unless some strange and unexpected cataclysm interrupts British trade which is now booming, and brings a long spell of unemployment and hunger.

No high-tariff party has any visible chance of success for many years. Thus, to-day the Liberal ministry, after five years in office, stands in a stronger position than ever, and already the people laugh at the possibility of any serious difficulty in passing either the Home Rule or Welsh Disestablishment Bill next year.

The one serious cloud on the Liberal horizon is the continued labour unrest, and there is still a bitterness of feeling against the ministry for the assistance given to the railways during the recent railway strike. This labor resentment burst out in a triangular fight for the Oldham constituency of Lancashire, which the Liberals have held for several years, but have lost by a labor candidate taking away sufficient votes to return a Tory.

The Home Rule campaign is going on actively, and Mr. Redmond's speeches continue to help enormously the growing unanimity for Home Rule.

The "Picnickers" Keep Mum.

The Government is in no haste to explain why that sale of cattle at the Government farm was not advertised. Out of that well advertised event of the Premier's, surely some little can be spared to let the farmers know why they were ignored, and why a number of better persons selected to attend the sale, were not invited.

One farmer in the vicinity of the farm assures us that he had been examining some of the stock on behalf of some others with a view to the latter purchasing, and that word was sent to him about the sale half an hour before it commenced, but too late to communicate with his principals. Another farmer we are told happened to hear the cattle, as he was passing along the road and went there and purchased a cow. But the great body of farmers, who are told, know nothing whatever of the sale, and these included farmers in the neighbourhood of the Government farm. If the Premier's energy cannot compass these things perhaps he will instruct the Minister of Agriculture to report on the sale, and inform the public how much the cattle is head we are informed, cost the Government up to the time of sale, and how much they realized. On Saturday we were told that \$12 was the lowest price paid at the sale, since that time we have been told that one beast was sold for \$5, and further that a cow went for \$19 which was worth twice as much.

If neither the Premier nor the Minister can burden their mind with the compilation of a statement of the facts of the case, they might instruct Commissioner Downey to tell all he knows and what he can find out about these matters, and also direct Secretary Simms to co-operate with the Commissioner, as we are informed both officials were present at the sale. They are handsomely paid and do well out of the Department of Agriculture, and it will hardly be argued that either of them is so overburdened with official duties that he cannot find time or energy to report in detail on the Government's venture in cattle-jobbing. So far, our Government cattle-jobbers have absolutely ignored the request for light in these

The Beginning of Blotting Paper

Early in the last century an operator in a paper mill in Berkshire forgot to put the size into his pulp. When the paper was rolled, it was thought, on account of this omission, to be useless.

Then the unlucky operator was dismissed. It was not until some days later, when the paper was about to be thrown away, that some one discovered its strange power of absorption. Needless to say, the operator was taken on again and rewarded for his mistake.

Previous to the discovery of blotting paper, writing was dried by having sand sprinkled over it. In small country places, until quite recent years, millers have been in the habit of drying their occasional clerical efforts by means of flour sprinkled over the writing.

The police believe that he was run down by an automobile or a heavy truck, and that the guilty driver had propped the mangled form up against the lumber and driven off without so much as calling aid. The lad was identified as Howard Mangold, the six-year-old son of Charles Mangold.

Mrs. Bailey suffered spinal injuries, while Welland dislocated his hip.

MALTA, Nov. 20. It is officially announced that the lights in the Red Sea, which were extinguished on account of the war between Turkey and Italy will be re-lighted from Nov. 22nd to Nov. 26th, for the passage of the Medina carrying King George and Queen Mary to India.

A dispatch from the London News agency at Shanghai, reports that fifteen gunboats are proceeding to Nanking in order to co-operate with the rebel attack on the telegraph. A Peking correspondent says that anonymous letters have been received by Yuan Shi Kai, warning him that an attempt is to be made to assassinate him and the members of his family. The Premier is constantly surrounded by a guard, fearing a revolutionary bomb.

SYDNEY, Australia, Nov. 20. The Japanese Antarctic expedition aboard the Kaiman Maru which was forced to return here last spring, has started on a second attempt to reach the South Pole. The expedition is in command of Lieutenant Shiraz, on the previous attempt got as far as 74 degrees South, but was forced to return on account of stormy weather and ice-pressure. The Kaiman Maru has undergone important repairs, and the equipment of the expedition has been greatly improved.

PARIS, Nov. 20. A baffling robbery from three vans of Indian mail occurred on Saturday while the mail train was running at sixty miles an hour between Paris and Lyons. The stolen goods were worth \$60,000. The thieves devoted their attention to the vans conveying mails for India and the Far East, which they knew were full of valuable bonds for the Durbar and for Christmas presents.

PARIS, Nov. 20. The serious attention of the public has again been called to the depopulation question in France by the publication of the official statistics. These cover the first six months of 1911, and show an excess of deaths over births of 18,279. The figures are more discouraging from the fact that in the preceding months the excess was 21,189.

BERLIN, Nov. 20. It is stated that Sir Edward Grey's Anglo-German statement in the House of Commons has been delayed because Germany and Britain are collaborating upon a formal arrangement, which will be issued in both countries simultaneously.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20. President Casceres of San Domingo was fatally wounded yesterday at San Domingo, according to a report from the United States Charge d' Affaires. No details have as yet been received.

LONDON, Nov. 20. Persia, retreating that she has been badly treated in the crisis with Russia, has placed her case in the hands of Britain, as diplomatic relations with Russia have been interrupted. Persia has asked Britain to advise her as to the course that should be followed, and promises to abide by the decision thus given. If necessary, Persia is prepared to comply with the demands of Russia, on condition that the Russian troops, if as stated on their way to and in Persia, return to Russia.

LONDON, Nov. 20. A news despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. states that the report of the massacre of foreigners at Siam Fu, capital of Shan Si, has been confirmed. Confirmation from other sources is lacking, so far as is known. The massacre is chiefly in the former missionaries' territory of Scanlanians and English Baptists. How many have been killed is unknown.

Faber, member of parliament for Andover Division of Hampshire, in which he told of the narrow escape of Britain from war with Germany over the Moroccan situation. To One Bulb—\$5.00.

Facts and Figures to Interest The Winter Gardener.

A potential little article is a bulb. To look at, one of these curious, wrappied-up forms of plant life is very much like another. What lies beneath the dry outer skin is a mystery concealed as only Nature knows how to preserve her secrets.

One thousand bulbs, carriage-paid, for five shillings is the current offer of a Wisbech firm of growers, yet the equivalent to five thousand sovereigns has actually been paid for a single tulip bulb.
You can purchase daffodil bulbs at two shillings per hundred, but the patrician varieties of the clan cost as many pounds apiece. A few years ago the Peter Barr daffodil changed hands at twenty guineas per bulb, and one firm in Covent Garden, London, offered a new type at fifty pounds for a single bulb, and kept their limited stock in the depths of their most massive safe.

Eclipsing the Potato.
Bulbs run a level race with orchids for the fancy prices paid by their patrons for single specimens. Quite recently we had the big potato boom, when solitary tubers were sold at £100, but the potato record has been eclipsed by that of the bulb family.

The biggest boom in bulbs was that which occurred in Holland in the seventeenth century, and ever since that time the Dutch have been in control of the world's market for this class of commerce. On that historic occasion a nation went mad over bulbs, and the Government had to step in and put a stop to the craze.
The boom—and the present vast industry, for that matter—owed its inception to the importation of some tulips from Turkey. The flowers from these bulbs were probably poor and colourless compared with the gorgeous creations of to-day, but they set a country aflame.

Everyone wanted to grow tulips. As the seasons came round new seedling varieties were introduced.
In those days bulbs were literally sold like gold and precious stones, for they were weighed in the balance, and their price depended upon the number of "azens" they scaled—the azen being a small weight similar to the grain we use now.
A "mother-bulb" set in the smallest of gardens would produce the required seedlings, and in many cases the bulbs were sold whilst in the ground at the purchaser's risk, to be delivered when the season came for raising and replanting them.

When Spies Stopped In.
For the time the inns became bulb-markets and clubs, or "collegiums," were formed. Buyers and sellers would meet, and with each group would be the arbitrator. If any entered who did not belong to the club the members would quack like ducks, as a signal that a spy had penetrated their circle.
It is a matter of history that during the craze in the neighborhood of Haarlem rare tulip bulbs were sold for the colossal sum of £10,000,000—ons bulb realizing £5,000, another twelve acres of land and so on. In those days the value of a sheep was ten florins, yet bulbs changed hands for nearly five thousand florins frequently.

Naturally, the skilful horticulturist who to-day introduces a striking new variety of bulb—any other flower, for that matter—sets a high price upon it, so that he may benefit from his astuteness; but it is improbable that there will be another mad, insatiable boom like that which beset Holland.

Wrestling Match.

Olson Defeats Sam Anderson, Putting Him to the Carpet Twice.

The C. L. B. Armoury was well filled last night with sports and lovers of sport, many of whom gladly paid \$2.00 to see the bout. The prices of admission ranged from 50 cents to \$2.00. The total receipts amounted to \$840.

Young Olson was the victor and put Anderson down twice. Both men were evidently in good condition and put forth their best efforts.
 The bout began at 9.30 when Mr. Reg. Dowden introduced the principals and made known the terms of agreement to the spectators and the wrestlers. Olson's seconds were J. Kavanagh and P. Marshall, and Anderson's, R. Jackman and P. Neville. Etn. Goodland was referee.
 At 9.40 the men grappled in a head-lock test. Anderson did some quick and telling work and put Olson under. Anderson tried for the cradle hold but Olson was on the watch and freed himself every time. Olson had a hard time and for about 20 minutes was kept on the defensive constantly while Anderson tried every trick of his art to bring him to the mat. On two occasions he almost succeeded. He put him in a dangerous position with arm holds and for a time it looked as if it was all up with Olson, he, however, managed to get clear by the effect of pure grit and coolness. For half an hour he looked to the spectators that Anderson might be a winner. The tables were soon turned and his friends confidence in Olson returned. He seemed to have reserved his strength till this stage of the bout. The spectators were now getting the worth of their money and saw the finest specimen of wrestling since the big bout between O'Connell and Olson. The excitement grew tense as each man in turn came into imminent danger of going down. It was quick and clever work with no dead minutes. After half an hour of this strenuous life Anderson began to show signs of giving out. Olson made a smart move and secured a cradle and body hold. Holding him tight for about 20 seconds he brought him to the mat and pinned his shoulders down. Time, 40 minutes 42 seconds.

In the struggle Anderson's head came into contact with the floor outside the mat and he looked quite dazed when he arose, but when the dressing room without complaint. This ended the first bout.
 After a rest of ten minutes they came to close quarters. Anderson looked somewhat fagged out. They began with a head lock, Olson looking by far the most promising. He was now the aggressor while Anderson took the defensive attitude. He showed lack of vim and it was only by pure scientific knowledge of the game that he kept Olson from downing him so long. After about 8 minutes Olson got a double leg and body hold and pinned him down the second time and thus retained the middleweight championship of the world and took the belt from Anderson.

Great credit is due to Olson, and Anderson deserves praise and a plucky defense. He leaves the belt in St. John's but takes away the best wishes of his supporters.

A Chapter for the Young Housewife.

If it were not for the perfection to which gas appliances of every kind have been brought, the position of any housewife without a servant would be a very difficult one. Imagine having to undertake the cooking for even the smallest family, if it were not for that delightful gas cooker! To take one item alone, namely, the fetching of coals. This is essentially a job for which one needs help and a servant in an average middle-class household; but, with the cooker, one strike of the match is all one has to do when cooking is the order of the day. It is now only necessary to light the cooker just a little while before starting operations; for amongst the virtues of gas is the speed with which dishes can be prepared for the table. Besides this cooking by gas is such clean work. When one's hands were plunged in soot under the old regime it might just happen to be at this particular moment the stove might need stoking; but, having once raised the temperature of the oven to the desired height, there is nothing else about which to trouble now that gas does all that is necessary to ensure a successful result for the housewife. Then, again, gas is so reliable; there are no sulks to contend with, as in the case of a coal-heated range, when sometimes a good deal of coaxing is required before the fire will condescend to put a bright face on things. Once having lighted the gas, it is quite possible, after having seen that a saucetpan is fairly on the boil, to put it on the smallest jet, and go and either lay the table for a meal, or even fetch from out-of-doors some forgotten article, with the full assurance that all will be well, and that the dish in preparation will not suffer.
