





## Mr. Howley's Lecture.

A large and highly appreciative audience gathered in the British Hall last night to hear Mr. James P. How-

dience gathered in the British Hall last night to hear Mr. James P. Howley, F. R. G. S., lecture. His theme was a most interesting one for our people, viz: "Nature's Studies, with Observations on the Natural History of Newfoundland."

Mrs. Davidson, wife of His Excellency the Governor, was present attended by Capt. Goodridge, A. D. C., and was received on arrival at the Hall by Sir W. H. and Lady Horwood. In beginning Mr. Howley expressed his regret that more of the Natural History of the Colony was not known by our people, and that it was not taught in the schools. Great knowledge and not a little pleasure could be derived from such a study, and the study of botany alone is of absorbing interest and shows one the beauties of nature. He spoke of the natural ferns peculiar to each country, and there may be in Newfoundland some plants of value from a medicinal standpoint yet unknown to science. He also spoke of the collection of seaweed, which when prepared properly may be arranged in most attractive form for decorative purposes in the home and showed its commercial value when gathered in the form of kelp, the potash in which renders it a very valuable fertilizer. He spoke also of the science treating of shells and dealing with the classification of hirds, indigenous and migratory, the learned lecturer gave much interesting testimony as to their habits, etc. He also entertainingly descanted on the great auk which once inhabited the islete around our coasts but which now unfortunately is extinct. now unfortunately is extinct.

Of four-footed animals the caribo or deer, is first, being responsible for bringing visitors here. Their antiers are highly prized. Next the speaker referred to the moose. Their number is increasing in the interior. He said there was good research believed. said there was good reason to believe that assertion and was of the opinion that something should be done so that all our own fur bearing animals would increase Of the Newfound-land dog, said Mr. Howley, very little is, known, their fidelity and other good traits being omitted by ancient explores. 





The tendency of the age seems to increase such lives; but there is a better life there is the life of hope and Christian service, and of obedience to the higher authority of the conscience and the soul. It is this higher life of service that Christianity teaches and that is offered in the Gosepl to the people But men have become materialistic and are devoting most of their atten-tion to the things of time; to the entire neglect of what is more enduring and of principles which brings peace and hope to the heart.

The entire address was very appropriate for Evangelistic services; and t had a most desirable effect upon the congregation. full, and the idea of keeping on a duty of three cents a pound on sugar is simply preposterous. Tucker and Deeney want that duty lessened by two cents on every pound, for, as he says, nearly every workingman uses sugar to-day, and to have to pay a hundred per cent duty on it is not good enough. Sometimes a Government reduces the ity on certain articles in order make themselves popular, and in this way the duty is very often reduced on articles without the people benefitting very much by the change. What should be done is to reduce the duty on such goods as those which the people can see the benefit in the broad daylight, as, for instance, sugar and coal. Now Tucker understands that we pay seventy cents a ton duty on coal, and he would suggest that this be lowered also. He knows that this duty goes to the city for what is con sumed in the city, but he thinks that ome other plan could be arranged be veen the Government and the Coun cil whereby this money could be made good to the Municipal Council if the luty were taken off. Tucker says we spend barrels of money on the papers for publishing the debates of the As-

embly, and he considers it a wilful waste of the people's money, for he'd venture to bet two and sixpence that not one man in a thousand ever read em and lived to tell the tale. What is more ridiculous than to see a speech of the learned member for Jpper Island Cove appearing in the papers on the day after the Races The money spent on this farce might be saved and handed over to the Council in place of the coal duties, and no one would be the loser except the poor paper men, and as usual they can stand it. They have fine broad backs capable of standing anything. Some cranks will say "Don't take the duty off coal; sure we want to pro-tect our local coal fields" But Tucker says don't worry about our coal areas, they can look out for them-selves; and seem to be able to evade he keenest detectives that were ever sent on their trail.
