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

Sunburn is a Disease.

Spring sunshine, according to a medical paper, is far more apt to do you harm than sunshine later in the

Too much bright light is apt to cause a disease known as photophthalmia, a sort of inflammation of the eye. It is not dangerous, but may take days to pass off. The sight of one or both eyes becomes misty.

It is far commoner in spring than in summer, as the eyes have not then accustomed themselves to the new brightness of the daylight. The sensitiveness passes off later in the season, but on the first bright days of the year everyone has, more or less, to screw up their faces to protect the

eyesight. The inflammation in photophthalmia is caused by the ultra-violet rays contained in sunlight. Lamplight, gas-light, and ordinary electric light are weak in these rays. But some forms of artificial light are rich in them, particularly naked arc lamps, mercury vapour lamps, and the metallic filament in electric lights that are now so popular.

In offices where this electric light is in use all day snow-blindness (for this is the best-known name of photophthalmia) is becoming increasingly common.

It is the ultra-violet rays in sunlight that cause sunburn which a medical lecturer has called merely a form of dematitis or skin disease. You can if you like get sunburn enough for a month at the seaside by getting a beauty specialist to give you ten minutes of the concentrated rays of a mercury vapour lamp, the eyes, of course, being protected against the danger of photophthalmia.







"London antiquaries have the opportunity of judging for themselves whether Christopher Columbus discovered or re-discovered America, for, in the windows of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company at Charing Cross, the celebrated Fletcher runic stone. discovered near Yarmouth. Nova Scotia, by Dr. Fletcher over 100 years ago, is now displayed," says the Daily News.

"On this stone strange characters can be seen which, it is stated, for over fifty years baffled the leading scientists throughout the world. It was left to Mr. Henry Phillips, junior of Philadelphia, to decipher the mysterious inscription, which he found represented the words 'Harkussen Men Varu' ('Harka's son addressed

the men.') "Searching through ancient writings, Mr. Phillips found that, in an expedition of Norsemen which left Greenland in the year 1007, the name of Harki occurred. This expedition consisting of 160 men in two ships under the leadership of Thorfinn Karlselfne and Biorne Grimolfsen, took all kinds of livestock with them for the purpose of establishing a Colony in Vinland (Massachusetts). But on their way they landed and partially explored Nova Sciotia ('Markland.')

"To celebrate the event Harki, one of their chieftains, addressed his followers, and apparently this stone was inscribed in commemoration of the event. It was recently shipped from Nova Scotia in order to be given the place of honour in the Centenary Exhibition of Norway, which will open in Christiania on May 15th."

Emergency Wedding Rings.

Most workhouse masters and police-court missionaries possess what they term "emergency wedding rings" which they either lend or give to women who are desirous of being married, but whose prospective husbands lack the means to purchase for them a ring of their own.
