SERIOUS GASOLENE EXPLOSION —TWENTY KILLED AND TWO HUNDRED INJURED.

ARDMORE, Oklahoma, To-day. Twenty persons were killed and it is estimated 200 were injured serious-ly here yesterday afternoon, when a 250 barrel-tank car of gasoline ex-ploded in the heart of the business district. The force of the explosion shook the buildings and threw the burning gasoline in every direction. A few minutes later, Ardmore was at the mercy of scores of fires.


