War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.

GERMAN TRENCHES RAIDED.

LONDON, Jan. 7. The report from the British Headquarters in France, last night, reads: North of Beaumont Hamel we seized two hostile posts last night. A subsequent counter-attack was beaten off and our new positions consolidated. This afternoon we successfully raided the enemy's positions southeast of Arras under cover of heavy bombardment. Our troops entered the enemy's trench system over a wide front and penetrated his third line. Enemy dugouts were bombed and destroyed, and much damage was done to the enemy's defences. There has been increased artillery activity in the neighborhood of Hebuterne. Elsewhere the usual artillery activity continued. In minor engagements, raids and patrol actions since Christmas, we have taken over 240 German prisoners. Thursday night and again yesterday, our aeroplanes bombed a number of places of military importance behind the enemy's lines and obtained good results. Much successful work was carried out during the day.

THE CAMPAIGN IN EAST AFRICA.

LONDON, Jan. 7. A British official on the campaign in German East Africa issued to-night, says: Our columns, pursuing the enemy in the Rufiji Valley, occupied German camps on the Tshogofali River, and reached Ribambawe, on the north bank of the Rufiji on the night of Jan. 5th. The enemy still holds the south bank.

EMPEROR CHARLES' ORDER.

LONDON, Jan. 7. Emperor Charles, according to a Vienna telegram received in Amsterdam and transmitted by Reuters's, has issued an order to the Austro-Hungarian army and fleet, in connection with the receipt of the reply from the Entente Allies, declaring that the Entente alone is to blame for the continuation of the war.

STEAMERS SUNK.

LONDON, Jan. 7. Lloyd's Agency announces that the British steamer Carlyle and the Danish steamer Naosborg have been sunk. The crews were saved.

BRIDGE WRECKED.

LONDON, Jan. 7. One span over the railway bridge over the Maritza River at Kuleli Burgas, south of Adrianople, is reported wrecked by British naval aeroplanes, an official statement issued to-night, says.

CONFERENCE.

PARIS, Jan. 7. The conference of Entente statesmen, including Premier Lloyd George, Briand and Besseli, was in almost continuous session to-day, according to a Havas despatch from Rome. Premier Besseli presided at the meeting, which was the first of a number in which the general situation will be discussed by representatives of Britain, France, Italy and Russia. In honor of the event, the Italian Government declared the day a holiday.

BERLIN REPORT ON BRITISH RAID.

BERLIN, Jan. 7. British troops, after preparing the way by strong artillery fire, says an official issued to-day from the German army headquarters, launched an attack yesterday against the Teutonic positions south of Arras, in France, which were defended by the forces under Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria. The statement says the attack was repulsed with heavy losses.

GERMAN ATTACKS REPULSED.

PARIS, Jan. 7. German attacks against the French lines on the right bank of the River Meuse in the Verdun sector, near Vaux les Palenieux, and in the Vosges mountains, were repulsed last night, according to an official issued this afternoon by the War Department. West of the River Meuse skirmishing and hand grenade encounters took place.

RIOTOUS SCENES AT PIRAEUS.

LONDON, Jan. 7. Telegraphing from Athens, under date of Friday, Jan. 5, Reuters's correspondent says: Riotous scenes at Piraeus yesterday evening, resulted in the withdrawal of the French naval detachment stationed near the Town Hall there. This is regarded in Athens as an ill-omen of future developments.

PEACE DISCUSSION.

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 7. According to German papers received here, Count Czernin von Chuden-

U.S.A. GOLD.

NEW YORK, Jan. 7. JAPAN TO ARM STEAMERS.

TOKIO, Jan. 7. Owing to the activity of submarines, it is said the Navy will arm Japanese merchant ships bound for the Atlantic and Mediterranean with 6-inch guns. The arming of merchantmen begins with the Suwa Maru, which sails for London on June 20th. Steamers bound for the Atlantic by way of the Panama Canal will also carry guns.

PREPARING SECOND NOTE.

PARIS, Jan. 7. A second note to the Entente which, according to the Lausanne Gazette, the Central Powers are reported to be preparing, enumerates their conditions of peace, the newspaper says, as follows: First, the evacuation of Belgium in exchange for Belgium Congo; second, the evacuation of Northern France in exchange for German Colonies occupied by the Allies; third, creation of the Kingdom of Poland within the limits of the Grand Duchy of Warsaw, with the exception of the Province of Suwalki; fourth, creation of the Kingdom of Lithuania, comprising the Provinces of Vilna, Kovno, Grodino, Suwalki and Courland, with retention of local autonomy; fifth the cession by Russia of Eastern Galicia as far as the River San.

FRENCH ARTILLERY EFFECTIVE.

PARIS, Jan. 7. On the Somme front the French artillery effectively shelled German organizations at Felsalabbe, Outcourt and Licourt. An enemy surprise attack in the region of Maisos D'ichampagne, was repulsed and many prisoners taken.

GREEK ARMY AWAITING ORDERS.

ALL PEACE PROPOSALS SHOULD BE CAREFULLY ANSWERED.

LONDON, Jan. 7. Lord Buckmaster, formerly High Chancellor, speaking at Kebley on Saturday, said that all peace proposals ought to be published at the earliest possible moment and none should be summarily rejected, but each should receive full and carefully-considered answers. Neither for glory nor for vengeance should this war be prolonged a single hour, and every fair means whereby a lasting and honourable peace could be obtained should be welcomed. But, he added, no peace could be lasting or honourable unless the terms provided a repetition and provided for reparation for the past. G. H. Barnes, Minister of Pensions, in a speech in London to-day, said that President Wilson's suggestion that the belligerents state their terms for peace, was entitled to all possible respect. The American people, the Minister said, on the whole wanted to be on friendly terms with England; therefore we should cultivate that friendship. President Barnes said all should be assured that this country is not out to smash Germany, or anybody or anything, except her military power and pride.

STILL SINKING.

LONDON, Jan. 7. Lloyd's announces that the British steamer Alle, 1,244 tons, and the Danish steamers Ebro, 1,027 tons, and Viking, have been sunk.

ALLIED DELEGATES IN SESSION.

ROME, Jan. 8. The Giornal d'Italia publishes the following note: The third meeting of the Allied delegates was held this morning. Yesterday the political and military missions met first in general session then separately. To-day the order was reversed, the missions first held separate meetings, then toward noon the political and military delegates had a general meeting. We are able to affirm that already the results have been very important.

THE LATEST.

NOLDFON, Jan. 7. An Amsterdam special to the Times says German submarines are now even sending out S.O.S. wireless signals to lure British vessels to destruction. The Telegraph learns from an officer of a large steamer of an important Dutch line that on his journey from the Dutch East Indies he received while in the Bay of Biscay an S.O.S. message. He immediately rushed to the place indicated and found a German submarine which was not in distress. The captain of the submarine expressed the regret that it was a Dutch and not a British vessel, and said, "We don't want you to save our souls, we want British to save our souls."

NAVAL LOSSES OF 1916.

LONDON, Jan. 7. The Times Naval correspondent writing on the naval losses of 1916, says: During 1916 the British have lost nine battleships and cruisers, apart from light cruisers, compared with eight in 1915 and seven in 1914, but six of these were sunk in the Jutland battle. The other three were the battleships King Edward VII and Russell, and the cruiser Hampshire, all mined. Of the losses in 1915 five battleships were sacrificed in the Dardanelles. No British battleship or armoured cruiser, except under the special circumstances which prevailed in the Dardanelles, have been sunk by direct action of an enemy submarine for two years. On the other hand, the submarines laid some mines which caused the destruction of certain vessels. The Allied fleets were also comparatively free from losses during 1916, so that the relative strength of the British fleet is greater than a year ago, owing to the addition of new vessels.

NEW PHASE OF WAR.

NEW YORK, Jan. 7. The New York Times despatch from Rome says the strictest secrecy is maintained about the discussions and decisions of the meeting of the Allies' Premiers and Ministers, which is now in session here, but all agree that their object in coming to Rome is to co-ordinate their effort for more decisive action, aiming to bring the war to a speedy and successful termination. The present exchange of views in person was rendered necessary by the many changes which lately have occurred in the different cabinets of the Allies. An Italian statesman remarked that from to-day a new phase of the war begins. At the same time it is felt that the meeting in Rome contributes to give the greatest importance to the answer of the Allies to President Wilson's note.

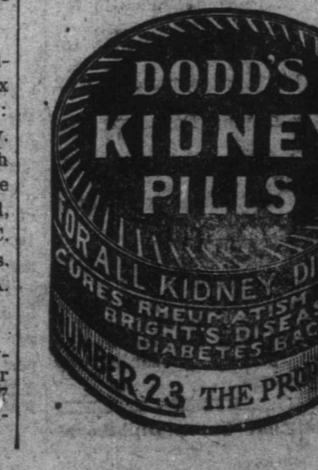

RECRUITING TOUR.

Mr. W.W. Blackall Relates His Experiences

(Continued.)

SEAL COVE:—Shortly after noon we left Base Verte and by 4.30 p.m. we were in Seal Cove, White Bay. Here we bade adieu to the Prospero, and at 8 o'clock that evening we were in the school-room, which had been decorated for the purpose and was packed tight, beginning our patriotic meeting under the Presidency of Skipper Osborne. The men had welcomed us on our arrival with a generous expenditure of powder and the gathering seemed to be much impressed by the addresses. The Rev. M. Sealey was present, as also was Mr. Watson the teacher, to whom we were indebted for the excellent arrangements for our meeting and for much good cheer at his home. We were sorry to receive no volunteers at the close of the meeting, particularly as there are a good many stalwart young fellows in the place not one of whom so far has discovered that the safety of his home and family has been secured by the gallantry of others and that the call comes to them to get out and do their part. I do most sincerely hope that Seal Cove will do its bit before it is too late to have a chance to do it and so be able to feel after victory and peace have been won that this bonnie and prosperous spot has not been a Merz.

WESTPORT:—At noon on Wednesday, October 24th, the Rev. C. Wood's fine motor-boat, The Arrow, came for us and took us to Westport where in the Paragon made so picturesque and beautiful by himself and wife the whole of our party was entertained. None of us can forget the pains taken by Mr. and Mrs. Wood for our happiness and comfort. They belong to a stock to whom patriotism is second nature and realize to the full what they owe to our brave soldiers and sailors. At 8 o'clock that night the school-room was filled with the people of this pretty little settlement. Mr. Pearce himself presided. After the soldiers and I had delivered our addresses, the Rev. C. Wood and Mr. Lacey made a few stirring remarks, and one good ball joined the colors. This brings the roll for this tiny village to six or seven, so that Westport may well feel that it has taken a noble part in this gigantic struggle.

BEAR COVE:—On the following day, October 25th, aboard the Arrow we moved to Bear Cove where with musketry and cheers we were welcomed by a crowd on the wharf. Mr. Breen, Mr. Rice and Mr. Ball opened their homes to us. At 8 in the evening service came with their offering and in the end I had eight dollars and fifty-six cents to bring to St. John's for the W.P.A.

LITTLE CONEY ARM.

The following day, Monday, October 23rd, was too rough to permit us to start upon our next run of some thirty miles, but on Tuesday before the sun had risen and when it was so dark that we had to use a lantern to find our moorings, we set sail and at about five o'clock in the afternoon reached the neglected but most picturesque little settlement of Little Coney Arm—about nine miles immediately north of Jackson's Arm. Although the fishery here—the mainstay of the people—had been a failure and gunpowder was sixty cents a pound, we were welcomed with many a blaze. Mr. Sackery and Mr. Hinds entertained the party. At 8 o'clock in the evening the new school-room was well filled to listen to our stories. Although there were several fit to volunteer, none came forward but the conditions of Sopp's Island are identified here. What do the people of Little Coney Arm (and many other settlements in these parts) know of the public services of Empire? To post a letter or to find out if one has come for them, they have to take a journey by sea of nearly nine miles to Jackson's Arm and run the probability of two or three days' delay there. No steamer comes their way; no anything. Poor folk!

HARBOUR DEEP:—For the next two days we were scum bound and prisoners in this little settlement of about twelve families. Our next call was to be Great Harbour Deep—thirty miles away—whence we were to organize meetings at South West Cove, North East Cove, Duggan's Cove, and Williamsport. As the fall was fast passing away we were more than anxious to get along.

By Friday, Nov. 2nd, the wind had moderated and we started for Harbour Deep. By the time we had reached Little Cat Harbour the wind and sea proved too much for us and we were compelled to take shelter in this splendid but uninhabited harbour. Here for two days we were unwilling prisoners. On Sunday, Nov. 4th, the wind shifted and we were able to go to sea but as it was so late in the season, and as we were desirous of restoring to Paragon Wood his boat, we concluded that we must abandon all hope of reaching Harbour Deep. Consequently we made for Westport and reached there safely at about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. One hope of reaching Harbour Deep remained and that was to take the Prospero on her way north to Harbour Deep, there carry out our plans and rejoin her on her southward way. Owing to the terrific weather, however, the Prospero was much delayed, taking seven rather than three and a half days to travel from St. John's to Westport, and when at last she reached the bay, to our intense chagrin she was compelled to pass Westport on account of the terrific winds. Fortunately she was able to call on her way south, and on Thursday, Nov. 15th, we reached St. John's after a lengthy and arduous though recreative tour.

My permanent hero companions had been Royal Naval Reservist Deering and Private Bradbury. They made excellent speeches, they proved most efficient recruiters—never losing a chance—shey were skilful seamen (for both on the Pedanaut and the Arrow we constituted the crew, they as sailors and I as engineer) and altogether very jolly good fellows.

The French Censorship

Manchester Guardian: The British newspapers value their space too highly to appear with blank spaces where the censor's blue pencil has been at work, but in the French press the appearance of such evidence of censorial activity is quite common. Curiously enough, too, the French public like it. They do not, perhaps, place so much reliance upon their newspapers—to some extent as a result of exaggerated statements in the early weeks of the war, from which the newspapers have never quite recovered—and they argue that if a paper appears with blank spaces it is at all events trying to tell the truth. Recently there was a curious example in "L'Homme Enchaîné." At the top of a column appeared the heading, "The Whole Truth," then came a column of pure white virgin paper, and at the foot the signature, "Georges Clemenceau." "Tiger" Clemenceau's paper probably holds the record for blank spaces, but it has its rivals. One appeared the other day with a heading indicating that what should have followed was an extract from an English paper. What did follow was a column and a half of blank space with the word "Censure" in the centre.
