To-Day's Messages. 10.00 A. M. KORNILOFF'S ARREST. PETROGRAD, To-day. The surrender on Saturday of Gen eral Korniloff took place without bloodshed, but only after prolonged negotiations, during which a collision seemed unavoidable. When Gov ernmental army under General Korniloff (?) was marching from Orshon General Korniloff was negotiating with General Alexieff. Chief of Staff who had already reached Mohileve but was unable to effect Korniloff' arrest owing to the fact that part of the local forces was emphaticall for Korniloff and was prepared to d fend him to the last. Korniloff and Lokomsiky laid down the conditions under which they were willing t surrender their swords, the nature o which has not vet been reported. Both showed considerable obstinacy and the negotiations broke down. General Alexieff telegraphed to Premie Kerensky of the determined oppos tion of Mohileve, expressing the opinion that the majority of the local troops were siding with Korniloff Kerensky refused to countenance the delay and gave an order to Alexieff to execute immediately the order of ar rest and as Alexieff still hesitated to provoke a conflict, Kerensky telegraphed him that if Korniloff was no surendered within two hours he would conclude that Alexieff was Korniloff's prisoner and would take measures for the expulsion of the counter-revolutionists from Mohiley. In the meantime Government troops were being readily concentrated on Mohiley barring the roads and cap turing all fugitives, among these b ing Korniloff's ordinary officers, Sea voika, who took a prominent part i the revolution, and members of th union of the army and fleet. Kornilo surrendered apparently only when Korotokoff's forces were near M hiley and after the defection of h supporting troops. The Grand Coun cil of Don Cossacks sitting at Nev Tcherask had been ordered by th Government to arrest General Kale ines. The Council replied, "It is in possible to obey the order because Kaledines has attended the Military Conferences of the Cossacks official capacity."
