Ismet Pasha, chief Turkish delegate at the Lausanne Peace Conference, has again been instructed by the Anglo-American plenipotentiaries to go on the question of capitulations, according to available information reaching Paris, sent in view of the probability that one of the biggest battles of the conference will be fought over the point of the Turks insisting that foreigners be amenable to Turkish laws and Courts and of the other nations declaring for their Nationalism to be accorded extra-territorial rights. Ismet is declared to have been warned in no uncertain terms that he will be hanged if he yields on the capitulations.

### CUNO SUCCEEDS IN FORMING A CABINET.

BERLIN, Nov. 21. Wilhelm Cuno, Germany's fifth chancellor, and first non-socialist, succeeded in forming a cabinet today, recruiting among the three middle parties.



**Anglo-American Friendship.**

Often we are too apt to take seriously the occasional blow-offs of our cousins of the Great Republic. Spread-eagleism has more or less developed in United States, because of the many nationalities that have become incorporated with its population, for it cannot be expected that the process of absorption of the polyglot peoples, seeking homes in the many states of the Union can be brought about in a year or even in a decade. The old ideas of the countries from which the thousands of immigrants come, cannot be sloughed as a snake sloughs its skin. Time, education, environment alone can produce the real citizen. And America is making him to-day. The process may be slow, but so long as the desired result is reached and the ideals of the Anglo Saxonism inculcated in place of those brought across the water, so long will the real spirit of pride of nationality mark the course of the world, toward Peace. Anglo-American friendship and influence can do more toward the abolition of war than any other array of power combined. In this connection the following editorial article taken from the current number of "Our World" is a revelation of sentiment which many never believed to have existed. Friendship with Britain is the theme and the writer argues from well laid premises that this relationship is of the most supreme importance for the future of the two nations.

"There is no possible program of peace for the United States that does not have for its first plank: 'Friendship with Britain.' Even those who talk of 'America Alone' can not ignore our long, unfortified Northern frontier. In thinking of the problems of this Hemisphere, we must not forget the importance of the role which the British played, in the formulation—and in the maintenance—of the Monroe Doctrine. When President Monroe received the despatch from Mr. Rush, our Minister in London, telling that Channing had proposed an understanding between Great Britain and the United States to oppose the project of the Holy Alliance in South America, he forwarded it to Jefferson at Monticello for advice. The ex-President was immensely pleased at this proffer of friendly co-operation from England. 'The question presented by the letters you have sent me,' he wrote to Monroe, 'is the most momentous which has ever been offered to my contemplation since that of independence. That made us a nation; this sets our compass and points the course which we are to steer through the ocean of time opening to us. And never could we embark upon it under circumstances more auspicious.' (Quoted in 'Life of James Monroe,' by George Morton.)

Both in North and South America, friendship with the British is of supreme importance to us. And if we are to go down to the sea in ships, it is our trade and our influence are to expand beyond our continental frontiers, our points of contact with those who share our mother tongue become innumerable. On all the Seven Seas, the English are—and are to be—our partners or our rivals. The Washington Conference demonstrated that in Pacific and Trans-Pacific problems, the attitude not only of the British Isles, but also of the Dominions, is of vital interest. If attention swings across the Atlantic, it is even more obvious that no European policy which is unfriendly to England can be a policy of peace. As Jefferson so forcibly stated to Monroe, so it is to-day and will be tomorrow—'never' will our Government find 'circumstances more auspicious' than when British and Am-

erican interests drive towards the same goal.

The fact that in every corner of the world and on all occasions we find ourselves in negotiation with the British is a very definite plus element in our foreign relations, for we very rarely find representatives of other nations with whom it is as easy to reach accord. The British Empire—fortunately it is becoming more fashionable, as it is more logical, to call it "The British Commonwealth of Nations"—is as it were a bridge between the Old World and the New. In dealing with France or Italy, with Russia, Germany or Spain, we deal with Europe—a small continent, over-weighted with the history of the dead. In dealing with Britain, we deal with all the world—the New as well as the Old.

The Self-Governing Dominions—and their influence in Imperial policy grows steadily—live in the same era as ourselves. The language we speak has the same accent. They, like ourselves, are more intent on the welfare of the children than on ancestral feuds in the Councils of Britain, the voice of the Dominions rings with a faith like ours—a faith in the world—that-is-to-be.

**"Thought The Fire."**

The following extract from Hatton and Harvey's history of Newfoundland is almost paralleled to-day, with the exception of a visitation by fire, but with that elasticity of recuperation for which this country is famous. The gloom of the present will ere long be dispelled by the sun of prosperity. Already has the new boom in the price of codfish, given an impetus to trade, and by Christmas matters will, we hope, have so changed for the better that our outlook for 1923 will be brighter than ever.

"The spring sealishery of 1817 was a failure, and the summer one of the gloomiest ever known, as regards the business of the country. In November of the same year came what seemed to be the crowning calamities of the colony. On the 7th of that month a terrible fire in St. John's swept away one hundred and thirty houses, besides stores and wharves, destroying property to the value of half a million pounds sterling. This was followed by another great fire on the 21st November (one hundred and five years ago to-day—Ed.) which destroyed a considerable part of the business portion of the city spared by the former conflagration, and seemed to complete the misery of the inhabitants. Scenes of heartrending distress followed. Two thousand persons were left without a home, many of them having lost all they possessed. An appeal for help met with a liberal response. Provisions were dispatched from Halifax to save the inhabitants from starvation. The people of Boston loaded a vessel with a large cargo of food of various kinds—an act of generosity which is still gratefully remembered by Newfoundland. The British Government sent prompt and liberal aid. The Governor, the merchants and the wealthier classes exerted themselves to the utmost to relieve the wants of the needy. Though there were some disturbances caused by want and misery during this trying season, yet, on the whole, the people met this calamity with fortitude and patience. It was not long before the dark hours passed away. The year 1818 witnessed the commencement of a reviving prosperity. The fisheries were remarkably successful and the prices in foreign markets were considerably enhanced. A favorable change was experienced all over the commercial world. The courage of Newfoundlanders revived, and industrial activity was everywhere visible."

May we not then to-day take heart and emulate our forefathers who in misfortune and calamity never gave up, but steeled themselves toward the work which was presented, and carried it through successfully. As in 1818 may we not say of 1923, So mote it be.

**Delegates Return.**

The delegates of the United Fishermen's Movement, who went to Carbonear last evening to attend the public meeting last night returned to the city this morning. The delegates report receiving a great reception and numerous requests to hold meetings at other points in Conception Bay. All along the line they say the people are enthusiastic over the United Fishermen's Movement and are determined to fight for reduced taxation and retrenchment.

**A Slight Fire.**

At noon to-day a still alarm called the Central Fire Company to Water Street where the store occupied by John Thistle, Shoemaker, was thought to be on fire. Investigation proved that the fire was in the chimney in the upper flat of the premises which is occupied by Mr. Vincent Goss. Soon falling asleep of a tin chimney front had ignited the woodwork of the mantle shelf in the kitchen. The firemen used hand extinguishers and quenched the blaze before much damage was done.

**Fishermen's Movement Makes Good.**

RECEIVES ADVANCE OF EIGHTY CENTS.

Yesterday afternoon Messrs. A. E. Hickman, Sir John Croable and Capt. A. Keen, the latter buying for another firm, made offers of \$4.50 for Labrador fish. As the United Fishermen's delegation had met the exporters during the forenoon and learned that the majority thought that \$4.50 was as much as the market warranted, they held a consultation and accepted the offer of \$4.50. The Board of Trade has kindly placed an office at the disposal of the delegation, and during the afternoon, the orders were issued to the various schooner owners to start discharging as soon as the weather is favorable. The offer practically means an increase of eighty cents per quintal over that made when the movement started.

**Burin Congratulates Fishermen.**

(Daily News Special.) BURIN, Nov. 20. Burin District congratulates the United Fishermen on compelling the Government to repeal the Export Tax on fish and in securing a higher price for Labrador cured fish. We stand four square with them in their demand for reduction in taxation, abolition of new and, at present, useless offices, the immediate discharge of a horde of hangers-on, in the public service, the replacing of the Dalglish protection service with a boat compatible with our ability to pay, and we confidently expect them to demand the resignation or dismissal of Coaker from the Marine and Fisheries Department and the Executive Government, thereby repudiating the error of 1919. We cannot, as a country, expect reasonable treatment from European buyers while he is prominently connected with the Government of this country. Further he has shown himself to be entirely indifferent or incapable of handling the affairs of the fishermen and we assure them that this coast will have nothing to do with him, notwithstanding Boone and Bugden's claim to the contrary. We with the men of the North are praying for the time when we may rid ourselves of the entire bunch of misfits at present comprising the so-called Government.

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Enjoyable Gathering at Grenfell Institute.

MANAGER WATSON MAKES AN ANNUAL REPORT.

Members of the Grenfell Association of Newfoundland, the Institute Committee and the Ladies' Auxiliary were guests of Manager Watson and chairman Capt. George Holmes at the House Committee at the Institute last night.

His Lordship White, and Mayor Cook, and a number of other friends were also present. The Institute has recently been on a new lease of life, in all its activities. The interior has been redecorated and the whole building presents a very creditable appearance.

It was for the purpose of inspection that last night's gathering was arranged. On arrival the visitors were greeted by Manager Watson and Supt. Holmes, and showed to the Gymnasium, the first place visited was the Gymnasium, where Mr. Holmes senior gave a very excellent display.

A Fox news reel was also shown. There the party were taken to the Bowling Alley where a match was played between teams comprising Messrs. Eric Bowring and Mayor Cook and Messrs. L. E. Ousebridge and R. J. Job, the latter team winning the match.

A visit to the swimming tank and a display of swimming and diving by members of Mr. Holmes' team. The Library, which is packed with some fifteen hundred volumes, comprising fiction and standard works, was visited, and the quarters were also inspected.

The party expressed themselves highly pleased with the up-to-date character in which the institution is now managed. After the inspection of the various departments, the party retired to the Girls' Living Room where tea was served by the Ladies' Auxiliary. Capt. Whiteley presided.

In a few words, congratulating Manager Watson and Supt. Holmes on the efficiency that was everywhere apparent. He then called upon Mr. Watson to give a brief report of the activities of the Grenfell Association.

MR. WATSON'S REPORT.

Mr. Watson gave a very interesting report, and in his opening remarks, announced that the deficit of \$5,600 the running expenses of the Sea-side Institute for last year, had been covered by the local Committee and outside sources, and the Association had received a grant from closing down buildings, the amount which would have been allowed to go further in the year, however, the deficit was much less, due to the fact that the Institute is being made a revenue producer. A Gymnasium class of 200 members has been formed. Two Bowling teams with 12 teams are playing a considerable number of matches. The boarders are on the register. Grenfell Hall has been opened for public lectures, concerts, dances, all of which will mean greater revenue. The Girls' Department has been made more attractive and probably the most up-to-date of its kind on this side of the Atlantic.

NEW ORPHANAGE COMPLETED.

Mr. Watson also referred to the work of the Association, in connection with its Northern activities. At present five hospitals and five orphanages were in operation along the Coast this year, and \$80,000 had been spent in connection with the Association's undertakings. The new orphanage at St. Anthony was now completed. It had been erected at a cost of \$100,000 and had accommodations for 50 Orphans and staff. Educational programme had been started out during the season, with the assistance of 22 school teachers spent from six to ten weeks on the Coast. Two nutrition units were working, one in Northern Newfoundland and the other on Labrador. The staff comprised a Doctor, Nurse and ten trained workers. At present thirty students from the North, 17 girls and 13 boys, were attending school in Canada and getting an advanced training. In the case of all other students, the same exception, they will be returning to the coast when finished.

THE ENDOWMENT CAMPAIGN.

The endowment campaign conducted by the Grenfell and the Committee has been a remarkable success, and the objective of one million dollars is now being reached, with every prospect of the full amount being secured. Industrial activities in the form of the manufacture of toys, mats, baskets, have been increased this year, and to the extent of \$10,000 have been sent to Canada and the States. It is greater than in any previous year, and it is hoped to even do better in the coming year.

TO REPLACE STRATHCONA.

A letter from Dr. Grenfell, who is present in the Old Country, contains the information that the Royal Mission to Deep Sea Fishermen, had offered to present free of charge to the Grenfell Association, the steamer "Alpha" to replace the Mission ship Strathcona, which was recently lost. This gen-

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

CLIMBING DOWN.

LAUSANNE, Nov. 21. Ismet Pasha, and his associates of the Turkish Delegation to the Peace Conference, appear less confident than when they arrived, and a feeling is growing that they will reduce their program materially, in the hope of restoring peace and re-establishing trade relations with the outside world. It is evident they are coming to realize it was Greece, and not the great powers of Europe, they defeated in the recent campaign about Smyrna.

TWO SCORE DEPARTED.

BELFAST, Nov. 21. Ulster authorities have deported from Belfast forty Protestants, whose presence they thought detrimental to the city's peace.

SHIP ON FIRE RETURNS TO PORT.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 21. With fire raging in her coal bunkers the British cargo steamer Asian of the Leyland Line docked here late yesterday afternoon, racing back two hundred miles to this port following the discovery of the fire. The ship had left here Thursday night for Liverpool.

GLAD TO BE CLEAR OF HIM.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 21. Officials of the Sultan's Palace received a Radio from Mohammed, from Malta, inquiring after the welfare of his wives, all of whom he left behind. A message sent back said all well and happy. Turkish newspapers assert he took away five hundred thousand dollars in currency and gold plate valued at a quarter of a million, and as much in jewels.

OFFERED CARDINALATE.

ROME, Nov. 21. Pope Pius has offered a red hat to the German Jesuit, Father Ehrle, former Librarian at the Vatican, but the offer is not yet accepted.

THE DOLLAR IN DISTRESS.

VANCOUVER, B.C., Nov. 21. The Canadian steamer, Bessie Dol-

lar is disabled five hundred miles from here, inbound from Yokohama, according to radio, and a tug has been sent to her assistance.

U.S. SHIP SUBSIDY BILL.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21. Republican members of the Merchant Marine Committee have agreed on an amendment to the Ship Subsidy Bill, designed to offset losses to United States passenger ships, by reason of prohibition against the sale of liquor. The amendment provides that such ships shall be paid directly by the government for carrying mail instead of turning the amount into a revolving fund, out of which all companies would receive compensation.

OUR ATTORNEY GENERAL DINED.

MONTREAL, Nov. 21. Hon. W. R. Warren, K.C., Minister Justice in the Newfoundland Cabinet, was a guest of honor at a dinner given by the Newfoundland society at the Engineers Club, here, last night. C. E. Whitten, Secretary of the Newfoundland society, was chairman. Mr. Warren gave a brief address, referring optimistically to the present outlook at home, and to prospects for future development of the colony's resources.

EARTH SHOCKS IN ALGIERS.

ALGIERS, Nov. 21. Two great shocks to-day, following fire tremors on Sunday evening, sent the inhabitants from their homes, near Cavalaire, into the open country and damaged the principal buildings, so that they are crumbling, but no other damage is reported.

LABOR WILL MAKE IT LIVELY.

LONDON, Nov. 21. Parliamentary writers have already decided that the House of Commons will be livelier than its predecessor, with Opposition furnished by the Laborites. Attention is called to the radical sentiment of Laborites from the Clyde districts, as already evidenced by outcries from the gallery. Whether Clynes will retain the post of leader will be decided at a meeting of the Labor Party to-day, but the position of Labor as the Opposition seems assured, after an incident yesterday, when the Premier took Clynes with him in the heading a procession to the Lords.

Lasker Raps Dry Rule.

"GREATEST BLOW THAT COULD HAVE HAPPENED TO MERCHANT MARINE."

CHICAGO. — Across a banquet board, A. D. Lasker, chairman of the United States Shipping Board, told U. S. Attorney General Daugherty and the other banqueters that the attorney-general's recent ruling that all ships entering American waters must be "dry" was the greatest blow that could have happened to the American merchant marine.

"I can prove," said Lasker, who with the attorney-general, spoke before the audit bureau of circulation and its guests, "that Mr. Daugherty is the greatest law maver of all time, Moses only made the Red Sea dry."

Lasker said that while he opposed the saloon, he spoke rather as a wet nor as a dry, but from the standpoint of the Shipping Board.

"I want foreign ships to come in, as is their right, wet," said Mr. Lasker. "Forty per cent. of the passengers are foreigners and will not subscribe to our views."

The principal profits of ships coming to American shores is the emigrant traffic, Lasker said. Emigrants regard wine and beer as much as food as they do bread and water, he asserted.

He called attention to one result of the Daugherty ruling. "The American ship Resolute was to make a Mediterranean cruise, he said, and 300 reservations had been made. Within 72 hours after the decision, 64 cancellations were received, including one from the head of a great New York bank, who was to pay \$38,000 for his accommodations.

The Shipping Board chairman said he entered the government service hoping to show that government ownership was possible, but added:

"Government ownership is the poison ivy in the garden of industry. Policy dictated by expediency of votes, with losses paid by the government and no responsibility is a blight on the faith of the people. It is hypocrisy in government. I plead with you to help get American out of this morass: America owns 1500 steel ships that cost millions. They are operated by the government and private ownership is withering under it. Under the ship subsidy bill we can add a loss of \$50,000,000 a year in 30 months."

Daugherty, in his address, touched only briefly on his "dry" decision.

"I know there is a great difference of opinion," he said, "as to the question of liquor used and carried on all ships. I did not have that question before me as attorney-general. That has been passed on by the people and the supreme court. I was obliged to follow the law. The question was a naked, legal question."





**Obituary.**

**JOHN W. KINSELLA.**

(H. F. SHORTIS.)

A wide circle of friends in every part of the country will hear with feelings of the keenest regret the sad news of the death of John W. Kinsella, which occurred at his residence, King's Bridge Road, last evening, after a short illness, fortified by all the rites of the church he loved so well. John W. Kinsella was born in St. John's 68 years ago, being a son of the well-known Mr. John Kinsella, blacksmith, a native Irishman, who came to this country from the County of Wexford in the early part of the past century. The deceased received his education at St. Bonaventure's College in the days of the illustrious prelate, Rev. Dr. Mullock, and as a youth was commended for his high ideals. Some time after leaving College, he entered the General Post Office, on the 18th January, 1877, and step by step he advanced to the responsible position of Superintendent of the Parcel Post Department in that institution—thus he was one of the oldest officials in the public service at the time of his demise. His honesty was proverbial, and his sobriety and moderation in all things were his outstanding characteristics. He was generous to his Mother Church, according to his means, and charitable to her less favored children. In his family he was a model head. It is a wonder that such a father brought up a family of God-fearing children and worthy citizens. John Kinsella was an omnivorous reader, and a man of profound literary ability. He possessed a pointed wit and lively imagination; his communication was rapid, copious and interesting; he possessed a vein of humor rich and luxuriant. He was a storehouse of anecdote—a reservoir of good things—a lively chronicle of past times. The principles of honesty and integrity marked his character through life, and being united with gentlemanly manners and an amiable disposition greatly endeared him to his friends and a numerous circle of acquaintances. His literary productions, both in prose and poetry, published in the Telegram and other newspapers and magazines would fill volumes, were of a very high order, and widely perused throughout the country. When mail-officer on the S. Grand Lake and other ships, some years ago, his communications to the Daily News were both luminous and instructive, and few people could describe outport life more interestingly than the subject of this brief sketch. He had great power of portraying character; also possessed shrewdness and wisdom, a strong imagination, rich humor, deep pathos and a loving fondness for the beauties of Nature. John Kinsella was a man of strong Catholic faith and high intellectual qualities, and as a member of Holy Church he not only practised his religion, but most zealously championed it. His faith and piety were no less remarkable than his rare gifts of mind. As generous as he was humble, his knowledge and time were always at the disposal of others. Mr. Kinsella was one of the oldest members of the Benevolent Irish Society, and always took the deepest interest in the welfare of that time-honored institution. The deceased leaves a widow, one son, three daughters and numerous relatives and friends to mourn their sad loss, to all of whom the Telegram extends sincere sympathy. "Eternal rest grant to him, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him. Requiescat in pace."

## Indoor Sports Meet Draws Large Crowd.

MANY RECORDS BROKEN BY CONTESTANTS.  
Upwards of 2,000 people witnessed the annual Dominion (Indoor) Sports, held in the Prince's Rink last night. The affair which was held under the auspices of the Cadet Boat Club was again the success for which it has been noted in the past. The programme which consisted of the usual running events, basketball and tug-of-war, proved highly interesting to all, each of the events was hotly contested and brought forth loud applause from the entire gathering on several occasions.  
**GOOD RUNNING TIME.**  
The short distance running events were closely contested, Gerald Halley in the 100 and 220 yard dashes won out by a very close margin, and taking into consideration the sharp turns of the track his time was remarkable. He clipped 1 1/2 sec. of the last year time in the 100, and 3/4 of a second of the 220 yards. William Thorburn, who is one of our most promising athletes for an excellent exhibition of running, he having carried off the 1-4 mile, 1-2 mile, and 1 mile events. Thorburn's time for each of the events clearly proved to the entire audience that he is a coming runner of repute. He clipped 10 seconds of the last year time in the 1/2 mile, and in the 1 mile race with Stone, which were the most closely contested events of the racing times for the evening, he was clocked at 5 min. 12 sec., having lowered last seasons time by 2 min. and 1/2 sec. His nearest competitor Stone gave him a hard race to the tape. At the 3/4 mile mark, Stone had a comfortable lead of 30 yards on his opponent, when Thorburn uncorked a fine burst of speed in the third last lap, overhauled his man and coming up the final stretch won out by about 3 feet. Stone is a comer, and should he keep up the running game, he will give an excellent account of himself in the future.  
**O'TOOLE WON FIVE MILE.**  
The five mile race which was one of the most interesting items on the programme, resulted in Ron O'Toole taking the measure of Dunphy, Dodd, Mills and Fleming. O'Toole took the lead from the very outset, closely followed by Dodd, with Dunphy a few yards to the rear. Up to the first mile O'Toole crossed over first in 5:22 with Dodd running a splendid race right in his heels, while Dunphy was contented with third place some 50 yards to the rear. In the second mile O'Toole opened out, and running in fine form clipped many seconds of his first mile at the completion of the second. Dodd who was running very close to him lost considerable ground, having suffered a stitch in his side and retired from the race leading into the third mile. O'Toole, who had held the lead throughout ran the last mile in fine form, and did not alter the terrific pace which he had set from the outset until he had crossed the wire an easy winner in the splendid time of 28 min. 21 1/2 sec., reducing 36 seconds off his last year's mark. Dunphy finished second with a fine burst of speed some eight laps to the rear, Mills followed, while the kid Fleming, only 15 years of age, was the hero of the evening, he having run the full distance under 32 minutes. He received loud applause from the gathering for his splendid performance. The same lad took part in the race last year.  
**ENLIVENING BASKET BALL.**  
The basket ball games were closely contested throughout, and certainly helped to enliven the proceedings. The game, which is an exceptionally fast one, produced many smart and clever plays, while the accurate throwing of the ball into the baskets by many of the players was indeed a revelation to watch. The Cadets which consist of a very classy set of players, were in excellent condition, won out over all their opponents, and defeated the St. Bon's in the final by a very close score of 6 points to 5.  
**GUARDS WIN SQUIRES' CUP.**  
The tug-of-war event, participated between the Guards Old Comrades and the Catholic Cadet Corps for the Sir. R. A. Squires Cup again resulted in a victory for the former team, they having thus annexed a second year's win on the splendid trophy. In the first pull so great was the strain on the rope that it snapped from the centre after 2 min. pull, a happening seldom heard of. Upon the rope being spliced the contest was proceeded with, and resulted in the Guards winning two straight pulls, the first was won by only half a foot, while the second was won by a scant 2 1/2 inches. Burnell again proved the victor in the walking match lowering his last year time by 8 seconds. While James Kieley in the high jump beating his former performance by a 1/4 inch. Mr. W. J. Higgins, K.C., was in charge of the sports and he was assisted by a committee of other gentlemen who always take an active interest in events of this kind as well as the members of the Cadet Boat Club. 
## Activity at Bell Island.






