SUNDAY NIGHT

DECREASE AS RECEIPTS FROM TAXES GROW.

PARIS, Jan. 31.—The French economic situation is shown in a series of tables in Le Matin, furnished by Emmanuel Ervin, chairman of the auditing committee of the Chamber of Deputies. The principal tables are those of civil and military expenditures and receipts from taxation.

Lack of Enterprise in Research

"Sir Frederick Kenyon, at the recent annual meeting of the Society for the Promotion of Hellenic Studies, raised an educational question of the first importance," says the Educational Supplement.

"He declared that British schools lack enterprise, and backward in dealing with new material, whether published abroad by foreign scholars or first given to the world by British scholars. Our scholars are less ready to question tradition, are reluctant to concentrate on a single branch of study. He admitted that a conservative tendency is wholly a defect, but when the subject matter is new he insisted on initiative and originality are essential.

"All this is, no doubt, true with respect to the special subjects which Sir Frederick Kenyon has covered. It is true partly because younger scholars are immersed in purely tutorial work and cannot give time to original research, and ground can be and will be made as the financial position improves, if the main cause is lack of initiative, enterprise, and originality. One can only hope that the proposition is not generally true, and is only the case of archaeological scholarship because the subject does not attract the most brilliant men.

"Hitherto in the history of English scholarship, thought, and science, originality and initiative of English workers has been the outstanding feature, and the fact that their work has been exploited by industries not specially original German workers in the same field has been a source of annoyance, but not of shame. Sir Frederick Kenyon states that to some extent in his own case the same process has gone on, as foreign scholars have exploited his best work.

"It is true that in all fields there is a tendency to what Sir Frederick calls 'national self-deprecation.' This is regarded as the right attitude among the best type of English scholars, and for our own part we rather see an under-statement of an over-estimate of the claims of originality by British research students. Yet there can be no doubt that in every field we have workers of the first rank, even if our powers of self-advertisement are deficient.

"Much, for instance, has been done in recent years of Professor Einstein, but we have mathematicians better than Einstein, and physicists better than Einstein. The realm of the new theories of physics have been exploited with adequate recognition by various German physicists. In the regions of applied chemistry our chemists during the war were able to provide gas and terrible explosives at a cost which the Continental chemists were not only left behind in originality, but also in the economic results of that originality. TRIBAL FIGHTING IN NEW BRITAIN. MELBOURNE, March 5. Reports have reached here that tribal fighting has broken out in the Zope River District of New Britain in which fifty-eight natives were killed. The Australian Home Territories' Department is investigating the reports.

THE NEW BREWM. SYDNEY, N.S., March 5. Sydney's new mayor, James McConnell, elected yesterday, has begun his clean up campaign by suspending a liquor vendor against whom charges of irregularity are now pending.

SINGAPORE BASE STILL UNDEVELOPED. LONDON, March 5. Charles Ammon, Parliamentary Secretary to the Admiralty, replying to a question in the House of Commons to-day stated no decision had yet been made with regard to the proposed naval base at Singapore, but the matter would be considered soon by the Government.

A TELEGRAPH INVENTION. STOCKHOLM, March 5. An invention, claimed to make it possible to send 400 words a minute by telegraph has just been perfected by a Swedish expert, Lieut. Thor Thoenblad, who is now seeking patent rights.

The final abolition of State lotteries in 1826 cost the Government some £300,000 a year.

Leading Articles In The "Reviews."

AFTER TREASURE TROVE.
 We all love stories of buried treasure and there is a splendid one in Chambers' Journal—"The Biggest Treasure Hunt of the Age," by Mrs. Doecker—with the added merit of being true.
 The Grosvenor belonged to old John Company and was wrecked off the Newfoundland coast in 1782, having on board precious stones valued at £517,000, gold bars valued at £420,000, and specie to the tune of £717,000. But this was not all; after quoting these figures the official documents add "as well as the savings of the crew." It was rumored that she also had on board the two world-famed golden peacocks taken from the Diwan-i-Am, or Hall of Public Audiences at Delhi. These peacocks stood behind the peacock throne and were inlaid with sapphires, rubies, pearls and other precious stones. The Grosvenor was wrecked after days of stormy weather which prevented observations being taken. The majority of those on board were got ashore and the captain decided to attempt to march overland to the nearest Dutch settlement. About 100 started but only 18 appear to have survived the terrible journey.

The British Admiralty attempted salvage within a year of the wreck. Fully to realize the difficulties the coast must be seen—rugged, forbidding, with the mighty combes of the Indian Ocean everlastingly thundering inwards and dashing themselves to pieces on the cruel and relentless rocks. Had the ship lain farther out, away from the rocks, salvaging operations by diving would perhaps have been possible, but lying as she is, only about 90 feet from land, it has proved to be an impossible job. She is fixed between rocks, practically immovable, kept firmly in her cradle by the sand which settled over her and made it impossible for her to break up.
 The Admiralty expedition gave up, as did many subsequent expeditions and the ship still lies intact. An attempt made between 1905-7 succeeded in recovering 15 guns and numerous coins, but during spell after spell of bad weather Mother Ocean covered up the work done with fresh sand and the syndicate having spent all its money gave up. One can only rely on two months' fine weather out of the twelve. Another attempt is at present being made by the Grosvenor Hullion Syndicate, Johannesburg.

floats in 1921, and it differs from all previous attempts in that diving has been abandoned in favor of tunnelling out to the ship from the shore. A tunnel 450 feet long is being driven through solid rock to the gully, in which the Grosvenor lies.

Ten Years?" It is not a case, it is explained, of letting the imagination run riot, but of a serious effort to fit together a picture based upon scientific progress already realized and the developments which might be expected "normally and logically" to follow during the next decade. For this purpose M. C. C. Toudouze has asked a number of persons well qualified to speak for the various branches of mechanical science which are likely to be affected most to give their carefully considered ideas.
 Mr. J. L. Breton, Director of the National Research and Invention Office, and himself the inventor of an ingenious electric "washing-up" machine, pictures domestic life completely transformed within a short period by the introduction of a multitude of little labour-saving devices. He assumes that ten years hence none but millionaires will be able to keep a servant; but the housewife of 1934 will not be dismayed. There will be no need to keep running to the door when the bell rings; visitors will simply state their names and business into a "microphone transmitter," which, in your absence, will register the information on a device which will also serve to register telephone messages. If you are in, all you will have to do is to press a button and the door will open for the visitor, who will be guided to you by luminous indicators. He describes steps and stone floors washed and sterilized by water injectors; wood floors cleaned and polished by electricity in as little time as it takes to walk across them; a neat little electric boot-cleaner; the week's washing done and ready for the string cupboard in a few minutes; food prepared and cooked by electricity in automatically regulated stoves, and served on dinner waggons driven by little electric motors, and bristling with warming devices; the whole meal cleared away and all dishes washed, sterilized and dried, while the housewife has nothing to do but turn a switch or two. "And, mind you," M. Breton adds, "not a bit of this is fanciful; my rapid survey errs if at all, on the side of omission. At this moment, indeed, the majority of the devices which I have described exist in the embryonic state, and can already be used to great advantage. Now that the start has been made, they will be perfected very rapidly, while more than as many again will take shape. One year will be enough, I am sure, for considerable progress to be shown."

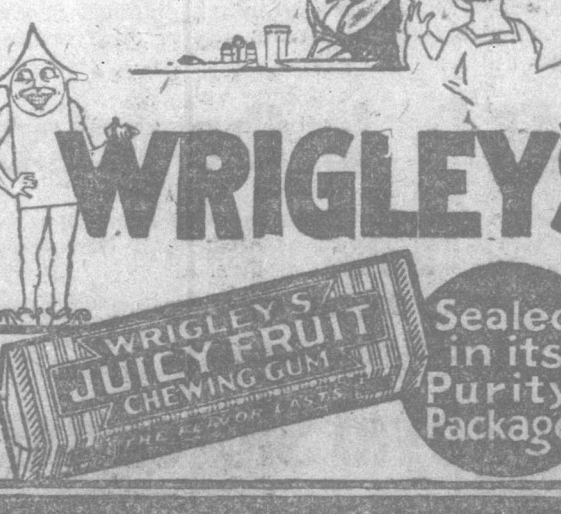

SAN SALVADOR, March 6. The Rebels, according to reports received here, now control all the Atlantic ports of the Republic and are said to have repulsed an attack by Government forces at Zambrano.

SASKATCHEWAN TO HAVE PLEBISCITE ON LIQUOR QUESTION.

REGINA, March 6. The date of the plebiscite of the liquor question in Saskatchewan is set for July 21st in a Bill introduced in the Legislature this afternoon by the Hon. J. A. Ross, Attorney General.

RAWLINSON WILL NOT AGREE TO FURTHER REDUCTION OF ARMY IN INDIA.

DELHI, India, March 5. General Lord Rawlinson, Commander-in-Chief of military forces in India, in a speech to-day on the Budget in the Legislative Assembly, said that 18,000 British and 20,000 Indian troops had been cut off the military strength.

THAT'S THE SPIRIT!

DENVER, Col., March 6. Despite one hundred or more protests from a score of cities, from New York to San Francisco, the Rev. B. B. Kessler, Pastor of the Merritt Memorial Methodist Church here declared he will continue boxing bouts after semi-monthly prayer meetings; the next such programme being set for tonight.

MCLACHLAN IS RELEASED.

DORCHESTER, N.S., March 6. James B. McLachlan, who was sentenced to serve two years in prison at Dorchester, for seditious libel, was released this morning. He left on the Maritime Express for Truro whence he will proceed to his home at Glace Bay, N.S.

WORLD REVOLUTION IS SLOGAN OF RUSSIAN REDS.

MOSCOW, March 6. The Red Star, organ of the Soviet

Army, commenting on the fifth anniversary of the Communist Internationale being celebrated here, says that the anniversary of the Communist Internationale must bring out a statement made in the most decisive form, that the aims of our enemies to divert the Red Army from its goal are in vain.

RUM RUNNERS READY FOR THE SPRING TRADE.

NEW YORK, March 6. The British steam yacht, I. Star, Queen of the rum fleet, has reappeared off "Rum Row" twelve miles out, with twenty other vessels, ready for the spring trade.

BEST GUARANTEE OF FUTURE PEACE IS TOTAL ACCORD OF ENGLAND AND U.S.

WASHINGTON, March 6. King George sees in good understanding between Great Britain and United States the best guarantee for the future peace of the world. This declaration was made yesterday to President Coolidge, at the request of the King, by Sir E. Howard, and marked the presentation of new ambassador's credentials to the United States chief executive.

\$15,000,000 LOSS IN SAN JOSE EARTHQUAKE.

SAN JOSE, March 6. The estimated loss in government buildings and churches from earthquake, which has been in progress for two days, is about \$15,000,000. Private losses are very great, but have not been estimated.

PROPOSED NAVAL BASE AT SINGAPORE DROPPED.

LONDON, March 6. The Committee which has been investigating the proposal for a naval base at Singapore reported to the Cabinet yesterday and there is good reason for stating that the Government has decided to drop the subject, says the Daily Mail. The paper adds that the basis of the decision may be a crisis in admiralty resignations, which are to be expected unless the Government is prepared to announce that it has over-ridden the advice of the Naval Staff.

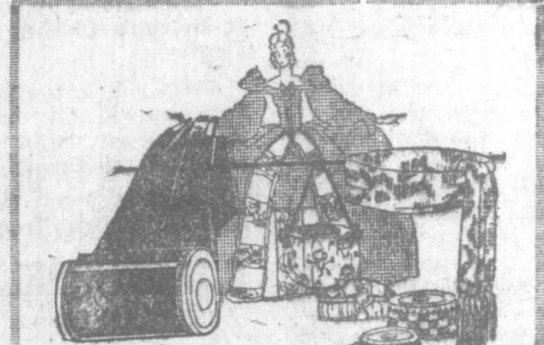

Help Make the Fisheries Pay.

Editor Evening Telegram

Dear Sir.—Will you kindly oblige me with a little space in your widely read paper, to make a few remarks with regards to the state of the cod-fishery of Newfoundland. Is it to be continued or to be dropped out altogether? With regards to our schooner, I may say we are reduced to less than half we had in 1912. Mr. Editor, I may say the half we have left are practically worn out schooners; our young men pouring out of the country in such vast numbers, driven, I may say, from the Union Jack under some other flag. Where is it all going to end? What encouragement have we to-day held out to us to remain at the fishery any longer, without a bonus or at least 25 per cent. reduction in taxation? It is the cry on the West Coast and Southern Shore and all the Northern Bays. There is no living under present conditions, and it seems strange that we can't see our way to live, seeing the men that have emigrated to other countries are making a decent living. Are we going to lay on our oars? No-sir! I say we will unship them, and live as they. I venture to say you won't find one quarter of our schooners with a crew, what we never saw in the history of our fishery. Now I appeal to the mercantile men and the government of our country. On them the whole thing hangs. I assure you, Mr. Editor, it is more serious than they imagine. Once a man's schooner and traps are gone what way is he going to replace them? If an average voyage, from five to six hundred quintals, won't pay, how in God's name can people continue the fishery under present conditions. Hoping I have not trespassed too much on your valuable space, I remain, Yours truly, FISHERMAN.

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Dublin Revisited
STATE AND ITS PROBLEMS
THE COST OF LIVING.
(By ROBERT LYND.)
There are many people who think that nothing has changed in Dublin since the revolution. It is not true. There has been a change in the Irish Republic since the Government buildings were built. The symbol of the revolution of a regime that has passed since the Conquest. It is now governed by her own people, as she never was before. Her ruling classes are no longer from London and London from her own youthful days. Her soldiers are no longer the guardians of an order based on discipline, but the guardians of a freedom. This reality is what must strike most people who revisit Ireland. It may be struck at first by the green envelopes in the streets and the delivery of the mail. It is the substitution of a National Police, and a Government.

pearance, smoking when they should not have been smoking, and rebellious against orders. He accordingly, disbanded them, looked through the Army for new material, found one man who could play a mouth organ, another who could play a tin whistle, and so forth, and out of this unpromising material he has created a military band that delights soldiers with its appearance and musicians with its skill. Its concerts, at which Wagner and Mozart, as well as Irish airs, are played, draw far greater crowds than can be packed into the theatre.
The Civic Guard.
The National desire for efficiency, however, has reorganized not only an army band, but an army. And the elements of guerrilla discipline and high-handedness, which did so much harm for a time in certain counties during the civil war, have been weeded out.
The greatest achievement of the Free State Government, on the other hand, has been the creation of the new Police Force known as the Civic Guard. It was a great experiment during a time of revolution to send out an unarmed police force through the country, and the experiment has been justified by the fact that, for the first time in Irish history, the policeman has become a popular figure. The Civic Guard is composed of young men above the average in intelligence, physique, and good humour and discipline.
An official, not given to reckless enthusiasm, told me that he doubted if there was another police force in

Europe to equal them. You may think this an exaggeration, but it is, at least, evidence of the way in which the character of the Free State police has impressed Irish opinion. I have heard the praise of the Civic Guard sung, indeed, by people who were by no means enthusiastic for the present Free State Government.
Doing Well.
In my own opinion, the Free State Government is, considering its difficulties, doing remarkably well. It is criticized by Southern Republicans for being Unionist in disguise, and by Northern Unionists for being Repub-

lican in disguise; but, as a matter of fact, it is too busy with the ordinary problems of peace and prosperity to pay much attention to those who think of politics mainly in terms of flags.
After a civil war, in which each side accused the other of excesses, such as indeed, are scarcely avoidable during a civil war, the Free State Government has undoubtedly restored the reign of tranquility and order. There is no curfew in Dublin as there is in Belfast, and you hear belated pedestrians peacefully whistling music hall tunes on their way home at 1 o'clock in the morning.
The armed robberies that still take place are not the work of political guerrillas, but of criminals. Nobody now believes that there is any danger of the renewal of civil war, and the most sanguine Republicans foretell the triumph of their cause, not as the result of an appeal to arms, but as the result of an appeal for votes.
Then, apart from unforeseeable accidents, Ireland is already a country, not of revolutionaries, but of constitutional, politics.
Bitterness, it is said, is dying down as more and more of the prisoners

shopkeeping.
There is a scheme for the unification of the railways, which should reduce the cost of transport. There are schemes for making Ireland as prosperous agriculturally as Denmark, and as producing a population of farmers who can afford to buy more and to produce more cheaply.
At present, the Irish farmer, like the English cotton spinner, is suffering bodily from the contraction of the world's markets, but, even apart from that, he has been suffering from inefficient methods of farming. The Government intends to encourage better farming by introducing better breeds of cattle and by grading bacon and eggs so that Irish agricultural exports shall go out to the world with a national guarantee of excellence, and that farmers will either have to achieve a high standard of excellence or go out of farming.
As regards cattle Ireland has to compete with Denmark, which depends on milk, and with Canada, which depends on beef, and the problem is how to breed cattle among which the cows will produce as much milk as the Danish cows, and the bullocks will produce as much beef as the Canadian bullocks.
At present I understand the average milk producing capacity of an Irish cow is more than 50 per cent. less than that of a Danish cow. This will give you an idea of the prosaic problem about which the Government has to busy itself, and it is the good fortune of the Government that it can deal with such problems, from the point of view of national welfare, without interference from organized vested interests.
Men who have served under other Governments tell me that the Free State Ministers are not only as efficient as any other under whom they have served but that, not being entangled among vested interests, they are more disinterested, and can deal with problems like a third party, with no thought of anything but the public good.
Their critics do not admit this, but I think history will say that President Cosgrave and his Government have done wonderfully well in an extraordinary difficult period.—Irish Times, Feb. 5.

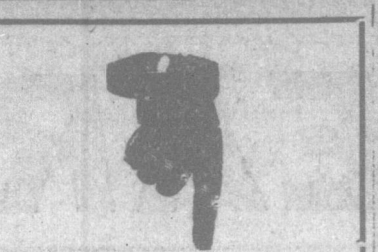

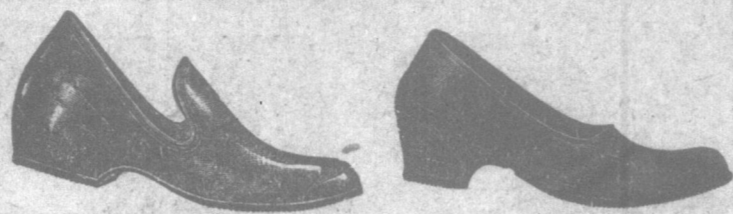
