INFAMOUS.—From the Colborne Express we learn that the Government through the "Honourable" the Post-Master General, has been pleased to dismiss J. M. Ferris, Esq., Postmaster at Campbellford, for the course he took during the late election in the East Riding, in opposition to the ministerial candidate.

THE corner stone of the new Cathedral of the Holy Cross, in course of construction in Boston, was laid on Sunday with imposing ceremonies, in the presence of an immense multitude.

FIRE IN GARAFRAXA.—The saw and flax mill, lately erected at Douglas, Garafraza, by Messrs. Robinson & Cassidy, was totally consumed by fire, between one and two o'clock on Saturday morning together with \$300 worth of flax seed. Total loss not less than \$3,000.

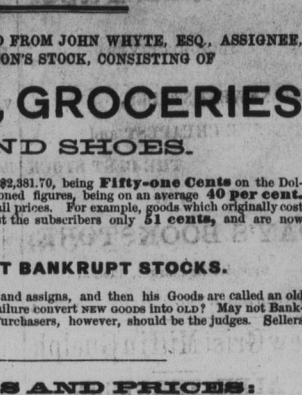

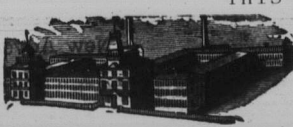
