t will be remembered that when the amship Hibernia foundered at see, 1. 25, no a single life was lost during a embarkation of the passengers and erew in the small boats, although a severe gale was blowing and a bad sea running at the time. This, I believe, is the first time when under the same circumstances, the same feat has been safely accomplished, and merits some investigation in the case thereof. It seems that some 142 passengers and crew were put into the five boats without accident, except a slight one to one of the life-boats. I find by one of the Hisagow papers that this result was due to the use of oil. Before the boats were launched, the ship being hove to Captain Numor had a quantity of oil thrown over the lea side of the ship, upon the water, with the happiest result, as, although the swell was not iessened, the waves were prevented from breaking, thus rendering it easy for the boats to be launched, while being filled with their complement of people. One feels safe in saying that had it not been for the use of this oil some, if not every one of these boats, would have been stove against the iron sides of the doomed Hibernia.

It is a well known fact that in all cases

It is a well known fact that in all cases of launching boats in a heavy sea this is the chief danger, and generally a fatal one. Each of the Hibernia's boats was also furnished with a supply of oil, to be used when running before the sea.

It is to be hoped that the use of oil in these cases will be more generally practised, and that each vessel will carry a supply for use in case of need. This is a subject that merits much attention of all hipmasters and owners.
