Just now speculation is rife with regard to the proposed changes in the Ontario Government. Messra. Blake and Mackenzie having resigned their seats in the Legislative Assembly, some change will require to be made, and no doubt will be effected in the course of two or three weeks at farthest. What these changes may be are at present mere matters of conjecture. Mr. Blake at the proper time will no doubt send in his resignation to the Lieutenant Governor, and will exercise the right, which long established custom has given him, of recommending to his Excellency some gentleman who would assume his place as Premis and leader in the House. The Tory papers, we notice, have all at once become very solicitous about Mr. Scott's position in the Cabinet. The papers when only a few months ago were denouncing him as a renegade, as an apostate Conservative, and as unif to hold a position in any Government, are now sounding his prases in the loudest key. He is represented to be the ablest man now left in the Cabinet, a statesman, a gentleman and everything else that is good and commendable, and after paving the way by certifying to his fitness for the office, they claim that he has the best right, as he is the only man qualified to fill the place of Premier. lars each, payable in twelve years at fartest from the day on which this by-law is appointed to take effect, at the office of the Treasurer of the said County, and that every such debenture snall bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum from the date of its issue, payable half yearly at the said office, and shall be siggled by the Warden, and countersigned by the Treasurer for the time being to the said County, and shall have attached thereto coupons for the payment of said interest, which debentures the Warden is hereby authorized to negotiate said dispose of.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, for the purpose of forming a sinking fund for the payment of said debentures and interest, an equal special rate of one-fourth of a mull in the dollar in addition to all other rates be raised, levied, and collected in each year upon all rateable proper ty in the said county during the continuance of the said debentures.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, the proceeds of the said debentures hall be applied and apportioned to the several purposes hereinbefore mentioned, and in the amounts and proportion aforesaid, the grants of the said local municipalities to be paid to the Treasurers thereof respectively, to be applied by them strictly to the purposes aforesaid, and an account of such application to be returned by each Reeve to the Council of the said County, at the next December Session of this Council.
