NEW YORK, June 21.—The Tribune's Washington correspondent says earnest efforts are being made to secure reprieve for Guiteau, and secure the appointment of a commission to make a thorough examination as to whether or not he is insane. The president, on Thursday, will give a hearing te Miss Chevalier, secretary of the National society for the protection of the insane. She requested Dr. Beard, of New York, and others to be present. A strong appeal will doubtless be made to induce the president

to postpone the execution. WASHINGTON, June 21.—The president has received one or two "crank" letters asking for executive clemency on behalf of Guiteau, but so far he has heard nothing from his counsel or family.

Guiteau was unusually serious to-day and looked haggard. His spiritual adviser spent several hours with him. The execution will be private. Only a few members of the press and the jail officials will be permitted to witness it. The gallows were crected some days ago. A formal application for commutation is now in the hands of the president. The jail officers do not entertain the slightest expectation of a reprieve or commutation.
