The professor says that cockroach tea may cantharides, and when prescribed it is in the shape of a pill, made with the powder of the dried insect. The Hon. Chancellor said (you may quote roughly.) "This is not to be wondered at. The legislative mind does not take it in. Yet it is the very question of questions in practical philanthropy. It will actually pay us as a community to see to it that our system does not only punish crime. We need not only classification but a grading of penalties, so that a prisoner by good conduct and conscientious labor may goin both money and privileges. Thus as he shows himself better able to use his liberty
