a Coup-The Missing Chinese Transports Turn Up-Japs Taking Medsures to Protect Seoul-A British Gunboat

Japanese forces in Corea outlined in the cable advices. So far these plans have not been disturbed by any serious reverses, and the victorious Japs, will, if they adhere to their commanders' arrangements, push on to Mookden, the most important city in Manchuria. On Sept, 5 the Chinese were gradually drawing back further inland, following Gen. Wolseley's advice of other years. Their hopes seem to be to detain their more active enemies until winter in a climate which means death to them, and thus terminate the campaign. Mookden is being rigidly and strongly fortified, while thousands of Chinese troops are being poured into it. It is anticipated that the next battle there will be one of the most important engagements of the war. In Mookden the Chinese Emperor is supposed to have at his command about 1,200,000,000 yens, which in itself is a great inducement to the enemy. Estimating China's losses at the highest limit in killed, wounded and prisoners and deserters at about 40,000, she has still 50,000 troops in Cores and 100,000 in Manchuria.

One Jap Ship Disabled at Yalu.

Shanghai, Sept. 22.—The four Chinese warships destroyed in the battle off the Yalu River were torpedoed by the Japanese. The victory was the result of superior maneuvres and of the courage displayed by the Japanese commanders. Admiral Ito's flagship, the Matsuima, was in the thickest of the fight. The first lieutenant and 34 of the crew were killed. The forward turret was destroyed, and the vessel has gone into dock at Sasebo for repairs. The rest of the fleet will keep out at sea. Passengers on motor car No. 378,Carlton and College route, at 1.30 Saturday afternoon, had an experience which will remain vividly before them for many days to come. Motor 378, in charge of Motorman John Davis and Conductor R. J. Raynard, with the trailer in charge of Conductor A. Gibson, was running over the Gerrard-street bridge crossing the Don River, and when near the centre of the bridge the motor suddenly left the rails, drawing the trailer with it.

Suspended Over the Brink. Running about 30 feet along the plank driveway, the motor suddenly swerved no the south on striking a heavy 8-inch timber which sepatates the driveway from the sidewalk, jumped completely over this obstruction and struck with tremendous force on an iron post which constituted a portion of the fencing of the bridge.

The post snapped like a cedar stick and carrying with it two 12-foot panels of fencing fell to the ravine below.

The Hind Wheels Lodged. When the car alighted on the sidewalk the frail material of which the walk is made gave way and the rear wheels lodged between the huge stringers. This and the shock of the collision with the iron post was all that saved the car from clearing the bridge and dropping with its load of human freight to the earth, 30 feet below. As it was the escape was a miraculous one, the car coming to a standstill when another six inches would have thrown the balance the other way.

Motorman Davis stuck to his position and applied the brakes with vigor. Although suspended in mid air when the car slipped, his hand was on the brake and his foot applied to the dog. 



Cross Petitions May Be Filed Without
Putting Up \$1000.

Mr. Justice Osler in the Court of Appeal decided that it was not necessary to put up, a deposit of \$1000 in filing cross petitions. In his judgment Justice Osler says: "Previous to 1874 there was no power to file a cross petition, but the Act was subsequently amended providing for the filing of the petition. 
