THE FARM PUPIL BUSINESS
THE LONDON TRUTH DISCLOSES ON A LIVELY TOPIC.
From Concerning the Inner Workings of the International Emigration Association—How the Ambitious Young Men of the Mother Country are Fleeced.

London Truth, of which the clever and well known Mr. Henry Labouchere is editor, deals in a recent issue with the Canadian farm pupil business taking the exposures recently made by the World as a text. The matter was brought up by the writer entered by a young Englishman named Greenwood against F. McArthur, the Canadian superintendent of the International Emigration Association, and for 321 other young Englishmen had been brought out by one A. L. Atkinson, who represented himself as the managing director of the International Emigration Association, Ltd., of 41 Victoria Street, Westminster, London. Truth now gives some valuable information with reference to the persons of this concern. In 1884 the same journal made an exposure of the frauds perpetrated by a man named Pointing, who carried on an employment agency on the Strand. The result of this exposure was, according to Truth, that the agency business collapsed, and Pointing started out in a new line, furnishing "aids to beauty" to those of the female sex who were foolish enough to patronize him. Subsequently he formed the International Emigration Association, of which London Truth gives the following account:

History of the Concern.
The concern was registered in March, 1884, and it is based on an agreement between Pointing and three other persons, one of whom is the individual named Atkinson referred to by the Toronto World as one of the victims to America. By the agreement, Pointing and Atkinson are to sell the business previously carried on by them to the company. A third party named Todd was to find the working capital. Atkinson, I am told, was formerly himself a "pupil" of the man Atkinson, of the Anglo-Canadian Farm Pupil Association, well known to readers of Truth; and it was he, so he could not have been initiated into the mysteries of the farm pupil traffic under a more proficient manager. Mr. Todd, however, being unable to do more than furnish the money, according to the latest returns at Somerset House, he paid 300 pounds in cash for them. Pointing and Atkinson had each been obtaining 300 pounds as managing director, and Todd as the secretary (F. F. McArthur) of the Toronto branch, Canada, is put down as superintendent, who works that part of the concern. The names of the three individuals kept in the background, and I suppose most of his time is taken up in selling his cosmetics and "aids to beauty." Such are the individuals responsible for the story told in Toronto newspapers, and the business is of the old type, so often described in Truth. They buy up 200, according to the returns at Somerset House, of the class of passage, and the presence or absence of a "conductor" makes no difference. The charges do not include any expenses beyond railway fares after landing in Canada. All these returns are at an enormous margin of profit for the association to divide with the farmer, with whom the youths are placed. The Toronto papers calculate that, even if the ordinary passenger fares were paid (and in all probability the association gets a discount on them), each pupil is paying \$72 to the association and about his fare, and the same calculation appears in the case reported in the World. This is the price of an introduction to a farmer, which could be obtained absolutely without charge by an application to the representative of the Provincial or Dominion Government; and the only further return promised is that the lady is to be paid \$5 per month for the year. What that return is worth the case of Mr. Greenwood shows.

How They do Their Work.
"To the history of impostors there are few things more astounding than this farm pupil humbug in the face of the official warning issued by the Canadian Government, and the repeated exposures of the game in the press, yet not only do new recruits continue to be sent, but the old ones still find it pay."
"About two years ago a great deal of space was devoted in Truth to a concern called the Anglo-Canadian Farm Pupil Association, run by one Hayden of Sheffield, one Aspin of Tewkesbury, and a queer sort of a Doctor-of-Divinity, named Michie, of Sheffield, London and elsewhere, which dealt in consistent with their duty to publish their advertisements—though their doubtful nature are known to every pressman.

Five Years for a Postal Thief.
Fred J. Williams, who was convicted at the Sessions of Toronto on the charge of robbing a mail bag, was yesterday sentenced by Judge McEwen to six months' imprisonment, and to be sent to penitentiary for the full term. The judge held that the fact of Williams being a member of the International Emigration Association was in his favor, against him rather than in his favor.

Death of a York Pioneer.
Mr. Thomas Humberstone, father of the ex-reeve of York Township, died on Sunday at his residence, No. 1333 Markham street, at the age of 85 years. The deceased gentleman was the second son of Mr. Thomas Humberstone, Sr., who served with distinction in the War of 1812. His gallantry in carrying the mortally wounded Brock over the battle field of Queenston Heights drew out his general's gratitude in the words, "I lead you Humberstone." Born on the old Home-land in the township of North York, he died in 1811, he moved after 1833 to the northern portion of the township, and there carried on the pottery business, for which he was well known. He was married to a woman of the name of Mrs. Humberstone, who was the mother of a number of children, and took up farming, and was engaged in the same occupation at the time of his death. He was a staunch Episcopalian, and a thorough-going Conservative. The funeral will take place from his late residence at 2 p.m. to-day.

Ontario Veterinary Association.
The Ontario Veterinary Association, composed of duly qualified veterinary surgeons, practicing in Canada and the United States, met in their annual meeting in the Ontario Veterinary College building on Friday last. The president, Mr. H. W. Fenwick, opened the meeting with an excellent address, containing many suggestions for the improvement of the profession. The Act recently passed by the Ontario Legislature was brought up, and the liability of parties who may allege the title or any abbreviation of the name of the association was discussed. The secretary was instructed to get copies of the act printed, together with a list of veterinary surgeons who have registered up to date, for distribution to members of the association.

FLEMING'S CONFIDENCE. A CRIMINAL DOUBLE.

The result of the interview in the drug store was that Orser exchanged \$100 worth of money for what he considered to be \$1000 in green goods, but which turned out to be nothing more than pieces of paper. Wood was arrested on the charge of defrauding Stark, but he was not convicted and has served a term of imprisonment.
