Now I feel sure it is all a matter of "ways and means," and it strikes me three hundred dollars would do con-siderable toward mending these things and council next Monday night, "Yes, we approve of 'manual training,' but for the time being, we more ap-prove of decent facilities for pedes-trianism and' we are willing to vote three hundred or six hundred dollars to this branch of the public service," our city fathers would then tackle the problem in real earnest knowing they had the rate-payers behind them in such an expenditure.
