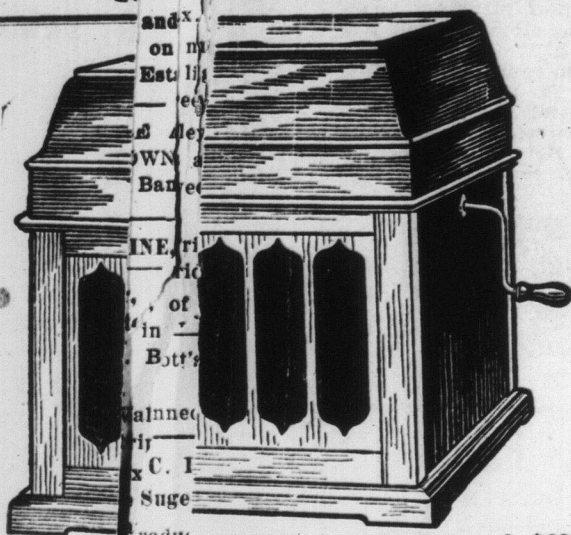

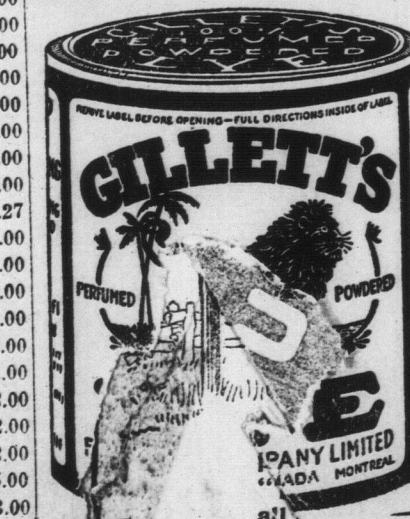

MARINE NEWS

Schr. W. T. McDonald, arrived at Mobile Dec 24 from Barbados.
M. A. Belliveau (schr) Tampa for Havana; arr and in port Dec 23.
Schr. Maid of Scotland, arrived at Gulfport Dec 18 from Guantanamo.
C. Maud Gaskill (sch) New York for Yarmouth; arr at Vineyard Haven Dec 24.
Schr. Leo LeBlanc, Capt Leander Porter, arrived at Norfolk Dec 24 to load for Martinique.
Granville (s s) Annapolis Royal for Gloucester, to lay up; arr at Portland Dec 22nd in port 25th.
Two well known Yarmouth master mariners who have been travelling the ocean blue to Far East countries in charge of American steamships were at their homes for Christmas, Captain Frank K. Crosby and Capt. William Corning. The former's ship the West Zula, and the latter's ship the Rockway Park, are at Boston after completing long voyages.
Three of the fleet of tern schooners sailing from Weymouth are reported chartered this week. The C. Maud Gaskill, now due at Yarmouth from New York, is to load victuals at Kingsport or Hall's Harbor for Havana. The St. Clair Theriault was fixed for a cargo of lumber from Savannah for Havana and the E. P. Theriault with lumber from Mobile for Demerara.
Captain W. A. Morehouse, of the White Star liner Cretic, was forced to give Ponia Delgada, a wide berth because a heavy gale made it impossible for the Nova Scotia captain to take his ship into that port in the Azores. She arrived at Boston Wednesday from Mediterranean ports, a day ahead of time. Not very often Capt Morehouse enjoys the privilege of spending Christmas with his family in Boston and some of his Nova Scotia relatives shared the joyous season.
The British fishing schooner Clarence Trohan, which left Yarmouth, N. S., on Nov 29, for Gloucester with a cargo of 67,000 pounds of salt fish and 33 barrels of fish skins for a Boston firm, has not yet reached her destination and fear is felt for her safety. A report that she sought shelter at a Maine port reached the consignees, but they have been unable thus far to verify it. The missing vessel is commanded by Captain George Trohan and carries a crew of five men. Under ordinary conditions, the passage should have been completed within two weeks.

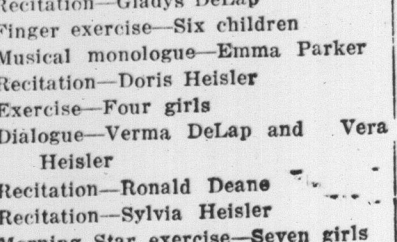

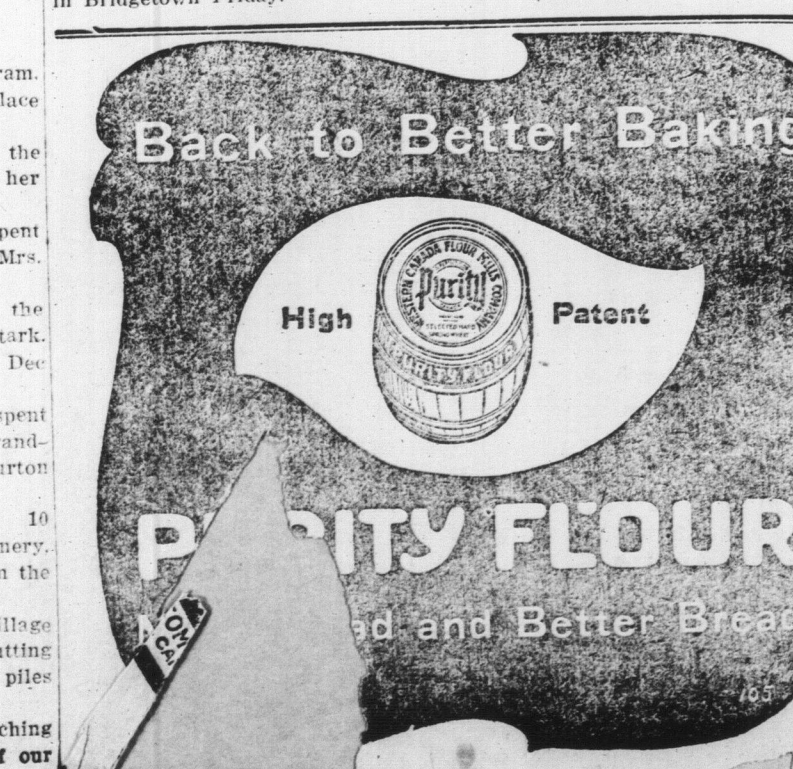

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE AND COUNTY HEALTH CLINIC

Arrangements have now been completed for the establishment of the Health Clinic in Annapolis County and from Dr. Armstrong, Medical Health Officer, who has been over seeing the preparatory work

The organization of County Health Clinics in the first place is another step in the Red Cross Society of Canada's great peace program.

In every part of the Province a great deal of work was done of a medical, surgical and educative nature amongst the necessitous classes, and the establishment of County Health Clinics is for the purpose of continuing this work

Owing to the scarcity of nurses at present Annapolis and Digby Counties have been combined in the work and the Public Health Nurse will work these two fields in alternately week and week about.

Miss Pearl Chute, nurse of Clarence, has been temporarily appointed to this work and began her duties in Annapolis County the first week of the New Year and going to Digby the following week.

To enumerate all the duties of the public health nurse would take more space than we can give in this introductory announcement, but suffice it to say that she is in the County to assist and advise all those needed aid by service instruction and advice.

These clinical days will follow largely certain lines, viz. (1) diseases and abnormal conditions of mouth, nose and throat in children of school age or younger; (2) infant welfare with instruction regarding proper diet and care of infants and young children; (3) chest diseases; for the latter from time to time a specialist in Tuberculosis will be at the clinic to examine cases of suspected lung weakness, or disease.

The Bridgetown Town Council has kindly placed their Council Chamber, opposite the Court House, at the disposal of the Health Clinic. The Council room will be used as a waiting room while the large room back of it has been fitted up for a medical examination room with dental equipment and the first clinic will be held on Friday, Jan 14th, from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. and every two weeks thereafter or until more nurses are available, when the clinics will then become a weekly part of the work.

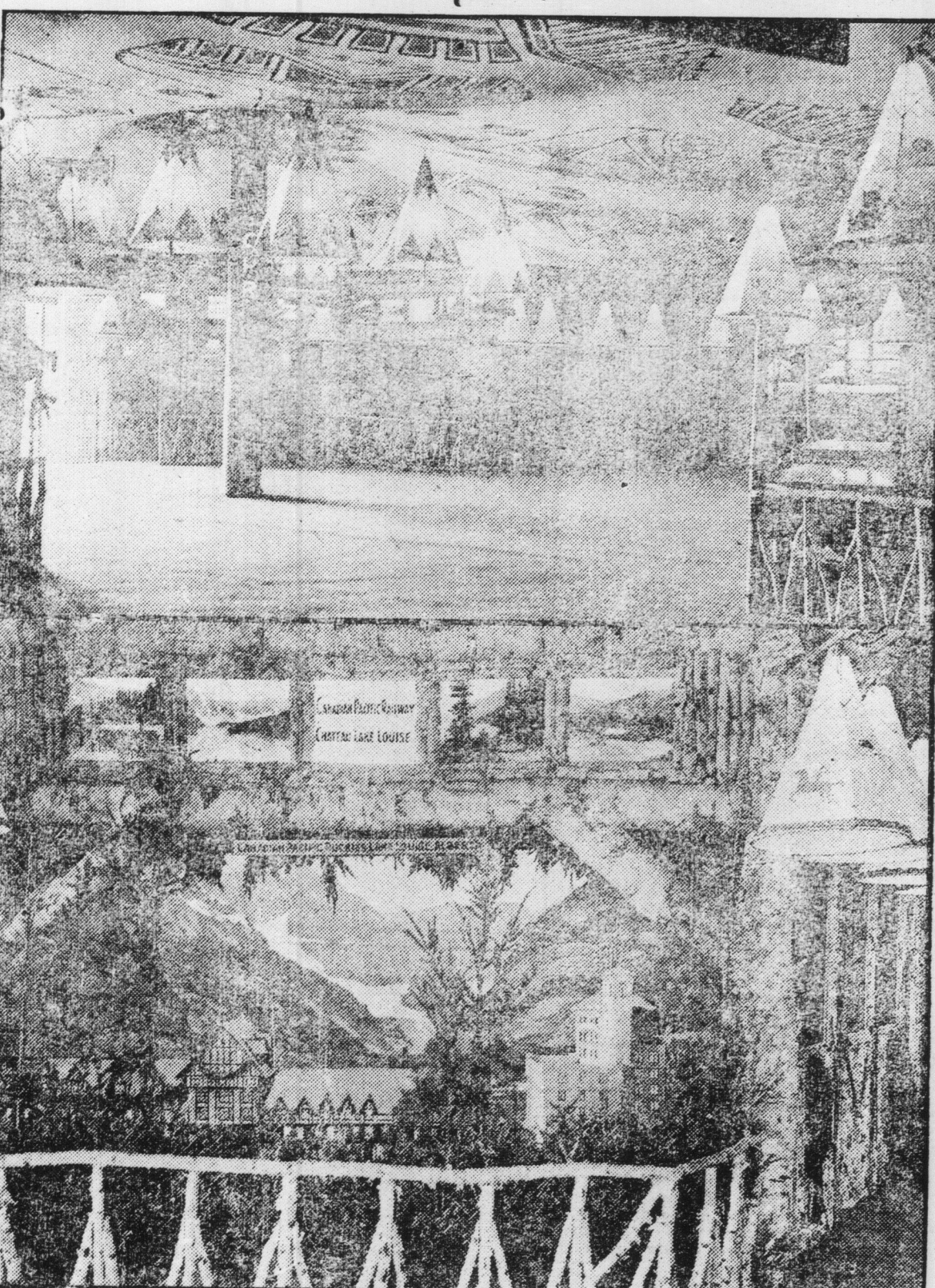
