Prohibition Sweeping Over Michigan-

The State of Michigan is fast coming under Prohibition, through the adoption of the lately enacted Local Option Law. The Christian Herald publishes a map showing the counties which have adopted the Act, those which have defeated it, and those in which votes have not yet been taken.

The law is a very stringent one, declar-ing it "illegal to manufacture, sell, give away, or furnish malt, brewed, fermented, The annual report of the Superintendent of the Cincinnati Chamber of Commerce, Colonel Sydney D. Maxwell, is a startling document. Among the atatements it makes in reference to the beer liquors for sale or for giving away. The business are the following:


