The American troops and the Filipino insurgents have again been in fierce conflict near Manila during Saturday and Sunday. General Otis, in command of the United States forces in the Philippines, evidently made up his mind last week that the attack upon Manila in the way of breaking the strength of the insurgent forces and dislodging them from their position.

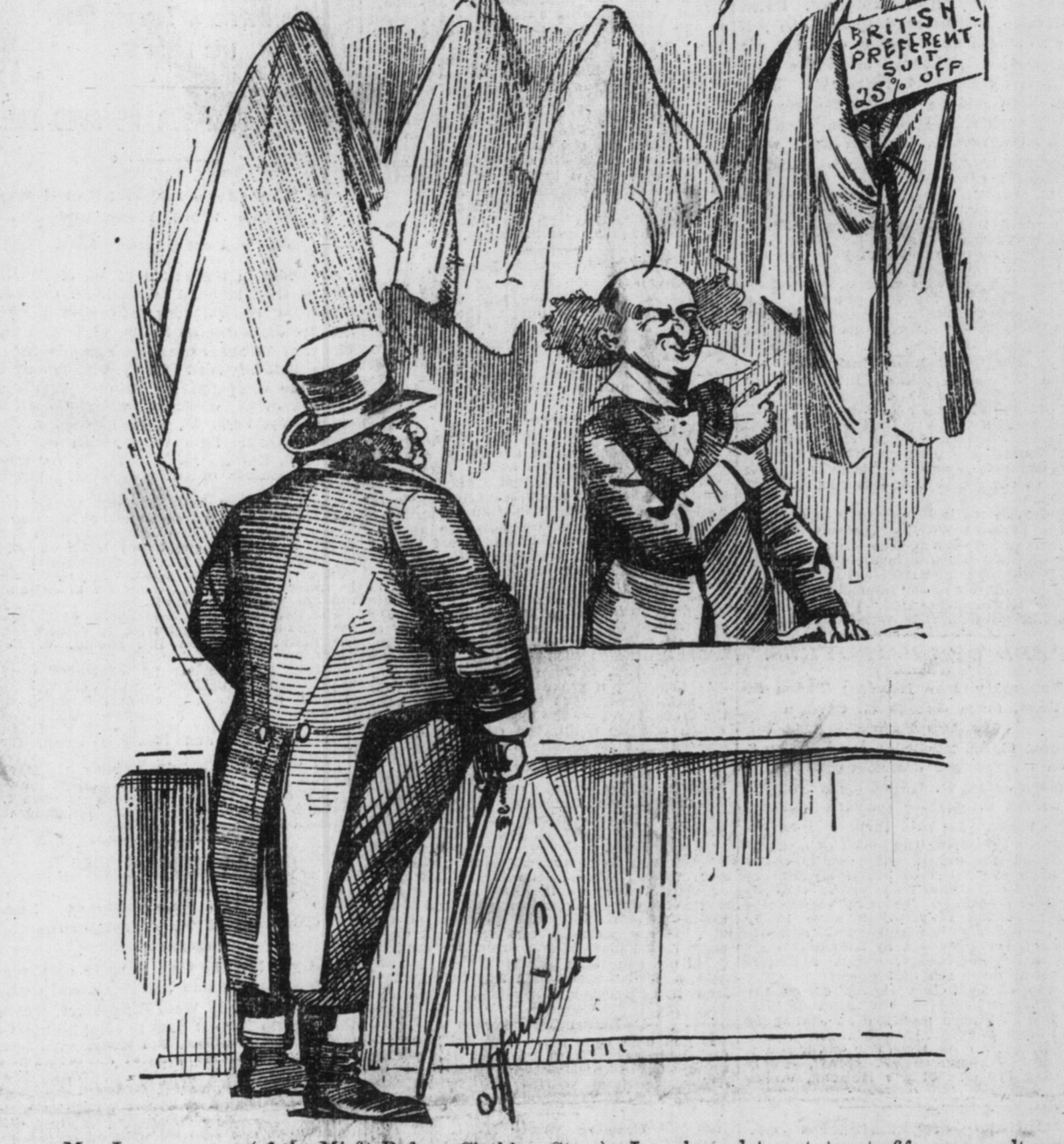

ONE CENT FORTY-SEVEN KILLED AND 200 WOUNDED ARE 200

American Forces Captured the Town of Malinta, But Lieut.-Col. Egbert Was Killed on the Field of Battle.

Insurgents Vacated Their Stronghold at Malabon and Put Torches to the Buildings—Will Otis Fail?

Manila, March 25.—Adjutant-General MacArthur's advance beyond New Canyan, two miles beyond Polo, since March 22, has been a steady one. He is now in open country. Insurgents stoutly resisting behind succeeding lines of entrenchments, from which troops continually drove them. City perfectly quiet and native inhabitants appear to be relieved of anxiety and fear of insurgents.

AGUINALDO'S GAME. Manila, March 25, via Hong Kong. March 25.—Insurgent papers received here from Malolos show that Aguinaldo is endeavoring to deceive his followers into the belief that he is winning real victories.

SATURDAY'S CASUALTIES. Washington, March 25.—A telegram from Gen. Otis at Manila, received this evening, reports yesterday's casualties as follows: Two officers and twenty-five enlisted men killed, eight officers and 142 men wounded.

FOUGHT ALL DAY SUNDAY. Manila, March 26.—Fighting was continued all day today (Sunday). The casualties are much lighter than yesterday. So far 15 are reported killed and 40 or 50 wounded.

MALINTA CAPTURED. There was Fierce Fighting Before the Village with the Entrenched Filipinos.

Manila, March 25.—(7.30.) The United States troops, under Brig-Gen. Lloyd Wheaton, captured the town of Malinta, beyond the Tullahan River to-day after a short night. Col. Harry C. Egbert of the 22nd Regiment Infantry was killed, Prince Loewenstein, formerly aide de camp on the staff of Brig-Gen. Miller at Iloilo, was shot in the side, dying almost instantly.

45 KILLED, 145 WOUNDED. The American casualties yesterday, were short of those of the Filipinos, but the total losses thus far reported since the engagement commenced being 45 killed and 145 wounded.

MR. DANSEUREAU HAS QUIT. Montreal, March 25.—(Special)—Mr. Arthur Danseureau severed his connection with the Montreal Postoffice yesterday afternoon. The Montreal Postoffice has yet been appointed. The resignation takes effect March 1, but the party leaders asked Mr. Danseureau to hold on till his successor was named. He did so, and now the Postmaster-General refuses it, it is alleged, to allow him to introduce, in his over-time. Although several of the Ministers state that ex-Mayor Mechem's chances are weakening on the question, and it will be a surprise if the next postmaster is a French-Canadian.

TEXT OF CANADIAN POLICY

The Scheme for the Representation of Policy Holders as Laid Before Parliament.
SIX TO BE ON DIRECTORATE.

Holders of \$5000 Insurance May Vote, and Holders of \$10,000 May Serve on the Board.
Ottawa, March 26.—The following is the bill of the Canada Life, providing for the representation of policy-holders on the Board of Directors:

Whereas the Canada Life Assurance Company has, by its petition, represented that it is desirable to give to the holders of policies of insurance issued by the company representation upon the Board of Directors...

1. In this act the term "policy-holder" shall mean and include any person of the age of 21 years who is the holder of one or more policies issued by the company...

2. At all meetings at which directors are to be elected, a policy-holder whose policies have been paid up or advanced, or who is entitled to a bonus or addition of profits, upon more than one policy...

3. The present Board of Directors shall hold office until the annual general meeting to be held on the 15th day of February, 1900, or until their successors are appointed...

4. The annual general meeting of the stockholders and policy-holders of the company shall be held in the City of Toronto on the 15th day of February in each year...

5. The present Board of Directors shall hold office until the annual general meeting to be held on the 15th day of February, 1900, or until their successors are appointed...

6. The election of directors by policy-holders shall be by ballot, and shall be held at the same time and place as the election of directors by stockholders...

7. In order to admit of notice being given to the meeting of the policy-holders, notice of the date of such meeting shall be given by publication thereof in the first issue of the Canada Gazette...

There was only a small attendance at Saturday's session of the Ontario Legislature. The first business was the passing of the Attorney-General's bill respecting voters' lists in unorganized territories. Hon. Mr. Gibson's bill to amend the Registry Act was read a second time.

Revenue and Mines Bill, Smelter Resolutions, Shooting Deer in Water Considered.

The House went into committee, and the following bills passed this crucial stage: To amend the Prisons and Asylums Inspection Act—Hon. Mr. G. M. Dawson.

Amending the Statute Law.

In committee on the Attorney-General's bill to amend the Statute Law, some slight alterations were made. There was a little discussion on the clause extending the application of the present law relating to marriages to clergymen non-resident in Ontario. The clause passed. The penalty for abbreviating the word "limited" was restricted. The bill provides that the loss proved to have been sustained by the use of "Ltd." by a person shall be deemed to be a misdemeanor.

WIDESPREAD ACTIVITY IN THIS RESPECT.

SCORE FOR LORD SALISBURY

The Anglo-French Agreement Regarding the Nile Valley a Triumph For the Premier.

FRANCE GETS MOST TERRITORY

But As the Great Sahara Desert Is Part of It, the Advantage Is With Britain.

New York, March 26.—Referring to the agreement reached by Great Britain and France regarding the Nile Valley, the London correspondent of The Tribune says: "The general opinion of those best qualified to judge is that the new Anglo-French agreement is another very satisfactory result of Lord Salisbury's moderate and far-sighted diplomacy. Roughly speaking, the line of the agreement is to draw a vertical line down the centre of Northern Africa almost to the Mediterranean Sea. The British share of the Nile valley is the British share of the Nile valley; west of it, till they come to the Egyptian frontier, the French may annex as much as they please. A few extreme English jingoists are complaining of the enormous area of territory which is thus laid open to French colonization, for the arrangement makes France the largest African power on the map; but the experts of the British Foreign Office know very well that what they are about is to secure to the British Empire the Nile valley, a good deal of the French territory consists of 'rather light soil,' for it includes the great desert of Sahara, much of which is absolutely uninhabitable. On the other hand, there is quite enough populous and fertile country in French Africa to occupy years on exploration and development."

MINES AND MINING STOCKS

Something About the Toronto and Western Mining Company—Operations on Seine.

MORE ORE MCKINNEY MINE.

General Mining News and Gossip—Quotations and Sales on Mining Exchange.

As there has been considerable enquiry amongst our subscribers lately in reference to the Toronto and Western, we have gathered a few particulars, which will prove of interest to our readers. The company was formed about two years ago and the directors and principal shareholders are some of our most prominent and strongest business men, as shown by the fact that the last issue of 50,000 shares of stock at par value was largely oversubscribed by the shareholders. None of the stock is in the hands of the mining brokers, and it might almost be termed "a close corporation," so quietly have its operations been conducted. The capital is \$2,000,000, in \$1 shares, of which 60,000 shares are still in the treasury, and will not likely be issued, as it is expected the cash in the treasury—about \$450,000—will be more than ample for all requirements of the company.

The location known as the Sirdar is the one on which the principal work has been done. It adjoins the well-known Mikado, the wonderful development of which first attracted English capital to the mining resources of the Lake of the Woods district. The main shaft on the Sirdar is now down over 100 feet, and the vein is 15 feet wide at the bottom. It is fully equipped with hoisting machinery, etc., and the vein is being rapidly pushed in to prove the extent of it to as great a depth as possible before installing stamp mills. The first 60 feet in depth gave \$14.00 per ton, which may be regarded as a fair average value for the whole depth, although many higher average assays have been obtained from various portions of the shaft. For instance, from 81 feet to 100 feet the average was \$24.30 per ton. On No. 2 vein on the Sirdar a shaft has been sunk 57 feet and values got of \$10.00 per ton. On this claim are six other known veins, and also a dyke from which surface samples assaying \$7 to \$9 were obtained. The company is now pushing development very fast, three gangs of men being at work on the property. It is anticipated, if the present favorable development continues, that very shortly the Sirdar will be stocked as a subsidiary company at \$1,500,000, of which probably 200,000 shares will be put in the treasury, and 300,000 shares will be retained by the parent company, or four shares for each share of the subsidiary company stockholders in the Toronto and Western.

Nor has work been confined to this location alone, as they have sunk two shafts on two of their other properties, each 51 feet in depth, one 57 feet in depth on a fourth claim, and one 29 feet on a fifth claim, all with very satisfactory results.

A striking business success was the ability of Mr. Frederick Wyld, the president, and his fellow-directors, was shown in their securing the services of Mr. Brudenbach, a mining expert, under whose direction the Mikado has been brought to its present high stage of development. His acceptance of the position of mining engineer to the Toronto and Western is strong evidence of his high reputation as a successful engineer by resigning his position in the Mikado and taking charge of the Sirdar unless he was pretty certain that it would make him as good as, or better than, the Mikado.

Mining Activity on the Seine River. Duluth, Minn., March 25.—The latest reports from the Seine River indicate a most favorable condition of affairs. A. C. Hubbard of the Golden Star Mining Company secured figures on an additional ten stamps for this mine, and they will be added at an early date. The establishment of a chlorination plant at the mine for the treatment of concentrates is under consideration, and a line is being worked in full force. Sinking is carried on steadily, and on the farther end of the north drift the ore is being carried out to 7½ feet and grown richer in values. Assistant Secretary Merritt, who brought down the last consignment of bullion, has returned to the mine under orders from the president to bring down no more consignment before the first week of April. Local stockholders and mining men are extremely well gratified with the progress of the mine. The twenty stamps dropped for 720 hours on 912 tons of ore and produced a trifle over 300 ounces of gold. The ore ran 4 per cent, in concentrates, and careful assays show that the production is nearly \$10,000—making the total output for February \$25,000.

Conditions at the Alice A. are also promising. Col. Hillyer said for England March 23. He is certain of a 50-stamp mill and expects to arrange for one in London when he meets the English syndicate which has an option on a large block of number of piecing statements. A new air compressor plant has been purchased; a telephone system will be established; and when the mine and Mine Centre; the new mill; 1200 acres of mineral land and 1000 acres of timber land have been added to the company's holdings, a steam hoist is on the road to the mine, and later a diamond drill will be used to exploit the ore body. Hillyer expects to return about the last of May.

Sinking is being pushed on the Lucky Coon, and ore of great richness has been encountered in shaft 45. A seven-drill air compressor plant has been purchased and repairs have been made to the five-stamp mill on the property. The stock was started at \$30 a share and the first issue of 100,000 has been sold.

Work will begin in full force at the Golden Crescent next week. That property has several hundred feet of development and will be placed in connection for the installation of a mill. Eastern capitalists have an option on all offered stock, and the impression prevails that the deal will be successfully closed.

Camps will be erected and sinking commenced immediately on the Randolph property, which adjoins the Golden Star. This property changed hands last week and now belongs to one of the strongest companies at the head of the lakes. The transfer price is reported as \$40,000.

The Emma Abbott prospect is out, and the first issue of 100,000 shares is offered at 10c. Henry Clay Clarke of Chicago, president of the company, is now in New York in the interests of the property. A heavy demand for stock is coming from the Alice A. stockholders, and the outlook is that the supply will not equal the demand. The Emma Abbott ore body is an extension of the Alice A.

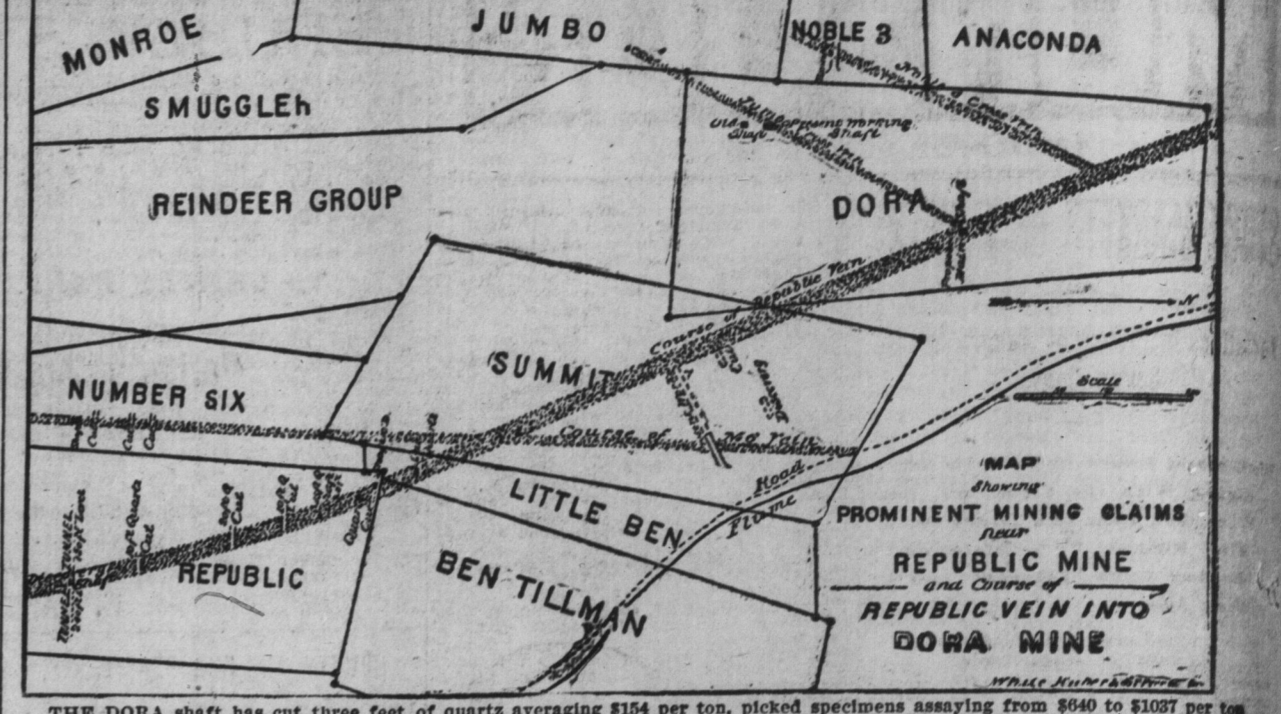
