RICE IS GUILTY OF MURDER

Court of Appeal Says He Was in Conspiracy With Other Bank Hobblers.

NOW PRISONER WILL BE SENTENCED

T. C. Robinette, His Counsel, Will Carry the Matter to the Supreme Court.

That Fred Lee Rice had been fairly tried and that the verdict of the jury was justified by the evidence was the decision of the Court of Appeal, given yesterday, the court unanimously deciding in every particular against points raised by Mr. T. C. Robinette, the counsel for the prisoner. Rice will now have to undergo sentence for the murder of Constable William Boyd on the evening of June 2 last, when he, with Frank Rutledge and Frank Jones, the Chicago bank burglars, attempted to escape from the custody of their guards while being driven from the Court House to the jail.

The trial was conducted by Chief Justice Falconbridge, and the jury had two points to consider, first, whether the prisoner had fired the fatal shot, and second, whether the prisoner was in a conspiracy to escape, thru which the death of Boyd resulted. The trial judge was careful to explain to the jury that where all the parties had acted they were all equally guilty, and in this case murder had resulted.

Had Constable Robinette. While there was no evidence of conspiracy on the part of the three men up to the moment the revolver was thrown into the cab, still, if from that point they had a common purpose to escape, it did not matter whether it was Rice who actually fired the shot that killed Boyd. The jury brought in a verdict of guilty on the second count, but sentence was deferred until a stated case was presented to the Court of Appeal.

The three questions asked were: Was there sufficient evidence to warrant the verdict? Was the judge's direction to the jury right in respect of the question of conspiracy? Was the finding of the jury correct or had there been a miscarriage?

The Verdict Was Correct. On all these questions the Court of Appeal decided against Rice. Chief Justice Armour and Mr. Justice Osier both read their judgments, the other members of the court concurring. Chief Justice Armour said that the verdict of the jury was a proper one and that there was no miscarriage. There was nothing in the charge of the judge that the prisoner could reasonably complain of. Upon the point of conspiracy Chief Justice Armour read a number of authorities showing that where the common purpose existed then all prisoners were equally guilty. Mr. Justice Osier said that it was evident that the attempt to overcome the constabulary was done in a common design, that the direction of the judge should be upheld.

Fellows and delegates of the Royal Society met in the Chemical Building of the University last evening to listen to Dr. Jeffrey of the University speak upon the forest trees of Canada. The discourse was highly interesting throughout.

Officers for the ensuing year were elected during the day. Sir James Grant was elected president; Col. Geo. Denison, vice-president; Sir John Bourinot and Prof. John Fletcher, re-elected secretary and treasurer, respectively. In the morning reports were presented to the society from a large number of affiliated societies. Duncan C. Scott was elected president of the English Literature Section, with Rev. Dr. Bryce as secretary.

Chancellor Burwash of Victoria University and W. D. Lighthall of Montreal were received as fellows. Rev. Dr. Whitrow gave a short talk on the beauties of the University building. A committee was appointed from the English literature section to confer with the Geological Committee regarding the ethnological survey of Canada.

Dr. Saunders, director of the Experimental Farms, gave an illustrated talk on the satisfactory results obtained in the west by crossing a hardy Siberian apple with Canadian apples, when the good points of the Siberian are combined with the toothlessness of the Canadian apple. The satisfactory results obtained by crossing gooseberries and currants and plums with sand cherries were also noticed.

A reception was given to the members at Government House in the afternoon. To-day they will leave on an excursion to Niagara Falls, returning on Monday.

RIOTS IN CHICAGO.

Police Turned Out to Put Down Meat Strike Disturbance.

Chicago, May 29.—Prospects of a precipitated rise in the price of meat and a fight to a finish between the Packers' Union and Teamsters' Union, No. 10, developed at the Union Stock Yards to-day, as a result of an ineffectual conference. Two smaller unions are already out. Swift & Company have prepared to arrange sleeping quarters for employees at their packing house, and hundreds of cots have been taken into the yards. The distribution of meat to local houses was attended by great difficulty to-day, owing to the attitude of the striking teamsters. No work was attempted without the presence of the police.

A non-union teamster who made an attempt to deliver meat to the Palmer House was severely beaten by three men, supposed to have been the teamsters of the wagon. The assailants surrounded the wagon, and proceeded with them over the tracks. A big crowd followed, jeering and throwing missiles. Lieut. Edmund's horse was smashed.

A riot call was turned in by policemen guarding two of Swift & Company's wagons. A crowd of strikers and their sympathizers had stopped the horses. Two officers were unable to cope with the crowd, and asked for help. A wagon load of policemen was hurried to the scene, and the mob was scattered. Nobody was injured.
