From Galveston to the City of Mexico, via Brownsville and Tampico, is pretty nearly an air line, measuring about 1250 miles. This territory is well covered by a net work of suring about 1250 miles. 

He said The World reports did the city market injustice more in little things than big.

The first instance of unfairness he gave was that The World of Aug. 24 (after the resolution was signed) con-

gave was that The World of Aug. 24 (after the resolution was signed) contained a report of receipts of 151 cars of stock at the yards for Aug. 22, when the city yards should have been credited with 180 cars. The fact remains, however, that The Mail and The Globe for the same date only credit the yards with 153 cars. Mr. Buck said he felt sure The World reports had given the Junction yards credit. for more stock than they received, but he admitted he could not give any evidence bearing out this opinion.
