Mining Markets Are Being Left To Take Care of Themselves

Sufficiency of Stock is on Offer to Check Any Material Advances -Trading of Small Volume.

While all the securities markets of late have been subjected to apathetic trading, incident to the usual midsummer vacation season, speculative operations in mining stocks have been particularly quiet. What little public interest is generally taken in the action of the lesser exchanges seems at this time to be even more dormant than is usually the case at this stage of the summer, and on this account the Cobait shares are apparently being left to take care of themselves, which means lower prices more often than anything else. A cursory inspection of the transactions which have been registered during the week just closed, bears out the idea that the outside following of the market is but little concerned in its up-and-down movements; and the general paucity of dealings is obvious ground for the idea that even professional traders favor allowing matters to practically take their own course, rather than attempting to give an appearance of activity to what may be designated the usual favorite speculative stocks.

With the exception of one or two small flurries in certain sections of the list, there has been little in the market's action during the past week to call for special comment. What price alterations have occurred have been in nearly every instance confined to fractions of a point, so that net changes for the week have been singularly small. Several of the cheaper issues have at intervals displayed symptoms of straining at the leash, and in particular cases such as McKinley-Darragh, Beaver and Timiskaming, for instance, an actual movement toward higher levels seemed imminent. The way in which prospective advances were held in check by the selling which came into being, however, fosters the idea that there is a volume of liquidation overhanging the exchanges, which would in all probability become a market factor of some importance were any upward movement really in prospect.




