ANNUAL MEETING.

February 16th, 1888.

The Annual Meeting of the Evangelical Society of La Grande Ligne was held this seventeenth day of February at 3 o'clock p.m., in the French Baptist Church, the Oratoire, Mance Street.

The Rev. A. G. Upham, President, in the Chair.

The Minutes of the preceding Annual Meeting were read and accepted.

There arose from those minutes the question of the advisory Board of five members, to be appointed by this Meeting, and of which Mr. A. A. Ayer had given a notice of motion. After some discussion, the following gentlemen were elected by ballot unanimously:-

The Annual Report was then read by the Secretary, Rev. T. Lafleur. It was moved, seconded and resolved, that it be made ready for publication by the Secretary, with the assistance of the President, and Messrs Muir and Bentley.

The Financial Report was then presented by Sec.-Treasurer, Joseph Richards, and accepted. A somewhat lengthy discussion ensued as to the actual financial status of the Society, from the fact that some friends had made enquiries on the subject.

It was made clear that the Society is in debt of \$3,700, \$1700 of which is due to the estate of the late Rev. Louis Roussy, the revenue of which estate is to be applied for the benefit of the Grande Ligne Institute, when the property has become disincumbered, as it would be if the debt of the Mission were paid.

The business of the Meeting for the past year having been completed, it was forthwith proceeded to the election of the new Board, which was elected by ballot.



STUDIES.

No fixed course of study is prescribed, but the following studies are pursued by the pupils arranged in four general classes.

Class A.—Bible, French, English, Ollendorf, cours de langue Anglaise, Arithmetic, Writing.

Class B.—Bible, French, Geography, History of Canada, Arithmetic, English, Writing, Compositions and Recitations in French and English.

Class C.—Bible, French Grammar and Reading, English Grammar and Reading, History of Canada, Arithmetic, Algebra, Geography, Latin, Book-keeping (elective), Writing and Drawing, Compositions and Recitations in French and English.

Class D.—Bible, French Grammar and Literature, English Grammar and Literature, English History, Algebra, Geometry, Latin, Greek, Compositions and Recitations in French and English.

The School opens early in October and closes by the first of May.

Preference is given to French pupils especially those from Roman Catholic families. A very limited number of English pupils is received. When more extensive accommodations are provided and the applications from French pupils can be overtaken, a liberal course of study may be provided for English students.

THE FIFTY-FIRST

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Grande Ligne Mission.

After a careful perusal of last year's Report, we find much in the general principles and aspirations expressed there that we might repeat in the same words; and to accomplish our work of to-day, we only need to add some recent items of interest, such as a few Roman Catholic families brought over to the knowledge of the Gospel, some young men and women to whom we have imparted the elements of a sound intellectual and religious education, and to record the baptism of twenty-one believers as the aggregate number of those who have made a public profession of their faith in all our stations. Well, does that measure of success justify such an amount of work, and such an outlay of funds? It must be remembered that by some our work is considered as small, and by others as expensive.

Well, if it were as costly a thing as to keep up a somewhat fashionable family in Montreal, to maintain a body of Evangelical Christians, working in the midst of this multitude of paganised Christians, to keep an open Gospel in a dozen of missionary stations, to sustain a small establishment of education, in a portion of the Country where only a few years ago ignorance used to flourish like wild grass, it would be our duty as Evangelical Christians to make the sacrifice. It is a well known fact that Catholicism is greatly modified and purified by its contact with Evangelical Christians; even where but a few pass over to the Reform side, they are still reformed, and when that contact is in a large sphere, the result is visible to any one who has eyes to see. Last year in the Revue des deux Mondes, the great French periodical, Maxime Ducamp of the French Academy speaking of the Protestant institutions of Paris, gave them as models for all to imitate. Do you think this without influence on Catholics.

Of course we prefer to win them clear over to the pure Gospel side. But who does not know that one's best wishes are only partly satisfied in this imperfect world? Nevertheless we have abundant reasons to be thankful for this work, and even for the measure of success of the past year's work, accomplished by imperfect instruments and small means.

It still remains for us to pray the Lord of the harvest to send laborers in the field, for the work is great and the laborers are few and feeble. For us also to prepare such instruments as we may, and ask the Spirit of the Lord to qualify and use them. Some day He may do so in a very different way from our ways.

In the meantime we are laboring as well as we know how, and endeavoring to glorify the Master whose servants we are.

We have to record new changes in the midst of us. Mr. and Mrs. Roux after having labored faithfully in connection with the Mission for seventeen years, have severed that connection and have gone to settle at Saxton's River, Vermont, where Mr. Roux teaches French in the Baptist Institution of that place.

The departure of those friends left us in a very difficult position, considering the small number of laborers at our disposal. We immediately thought of Mr. Massé as a successor to Mr. Roux in the direction of the school, from the fact that previous to his being called to the pastorate of the Church at Grande-Ligne, he had been a very successful teacher with Mr. Roux in the Institute. But then the Grande-Ligne Church would be left pastorless.

After several months of anxious uncertainty we finally decided to call Mr. Massé to take the direction of the school, with the hope that the services of the church could be kept up without a pastor at least for the winter, and that several of the missionaries would alternately fill the pulpit, depending more especially on the ministrations of the Secretary who would manage to go there twice a month. It was at times a pretty difficult task to arrange for those services, as the pulpit at Marieville had also to be occasionally supplied in the absence of the pastor, Mr. Parent, then in Great Britain on behalf of the Mission.

With a view of having a good staff of teachers, the Board, satisfied with Mr. Dalpé's services as teacher in the Institute

during the previous year, engaged both Mr. and Mrs. Dalpé, as resident teachers in the Institute, and are now very happy to state, that they are not only satisfied but greatly pleased with their services, both for their teaching and their hearty interest and devotedness in the work.

The School though not quite as numerous as in some former years, and that owing at first to an impression that it might not be opened in the fall, on account of Mr. and Mrs. Roux departure, is fairly filled and in an excellent condition.

There is a marked religious interest among the pupils, as the Report of the Director shows.

In the latter part of the summer, Miss Riendeau was called to take the superintendance in the management of the house, and some teaching when the School should open, Her work is highly appreciated by all who have visited the establishment, and her cheerful surveillance much liked by the pupils. I leave other details about the school and the house management, to Mr. Masse's Report.

Besides what our brother, Mr. Brouillet, relates of the large and excellent meetings that were held at Roxton at the Association of our French Churches; we must allude at least to another meeting of a significant nature, and that is the ordination of our brother Mr. N. Gregroire, who was some twelve years ago ordained a priest in the church of Rome. A goodly number of our French Protestants repaired to that far off field South Ely, one day last summer, and there in the modest chapel the ex-priest was set apart by few of his brethren, to the gospel ministry. We spent there some precious, solemn and blessed hours, under the blessing of the Lord whom we felt in the midst of us.

As usual, but only still more this year, the arduous work of collecting has fallen on the missionaries. Mr. Parent spent four months collecting in Great Britain, with fair success if we take into consideration, as we must do, that many of the old subscribers have died, that it is very difficult to replace them by new ones, and that the collector is often met with the remark that this American Continent should provide for the wants of such a work.

The ground having been well prepared by articles in the Canadian Baptist, by the exertions of the worthy President of our

Board, Brother Lebeau found Ontario ready to respond generously to his earnest efforts, so that his trip has been very successful.

In the Spring the New England States, were visited by Messrs. Lafleur and Massé, and also a short visit was made by Mr. Lafleur in New York. For the time and work then and there bestowed, they were sufficiently encouraged by those who understand, that though they have there a work of French Evangelization, the Grande-Ligne Mission has been the great pioneer for them all, and is still doing a great and good work here.

We still have as auxiliaries in this good cause the ever cordial help of the Ladies Brooklyn Association which raises friends and funds to carry on this work.

GRANDE-LIGNE CHURCH.

There having been no pastor over the Church at Grande-Ligne for nearly half of the year, as Mr. Massé had resigned the pastorate to take the direction of the School, and preaching having been kept up by different ministers who have had no time to make pastoral visits, it must be admitted that the regular attendance at religious service has fallen off a good deal, especially in bad weather and bad roads when attending meetings necessitated an effort. The lack of a pastor just now is much to be regretted, as close by the station the Catholics have built a chapel pending the building of a church, and settled a priest who has a large following whose unity will not be disturbed by trifles. Nevertheless as Bro. Riendeau mentions it in his report, the congregation has not been left without tokens of God's favor, five young persons were baptized and added to the Church last summer. It is most desirable that efforts should be put forth, that this Grande-Ligne Church should be a model of Christian life and virtues, as the mother of all our churches. The Church deplores the recent death of Mrs. Paul Perron a delightful christian wife and mother, and a cheerful, generous member, who in her own sphere continued the rich hospitality of her devoted parents. A beloved old christian, Mrs. Racicot, has also passed away from us at the advanced age of eighty-four years, calmly and sweetly, retaining her remarkable

faculties to the last. She had been brought to the Lord thirty-five years ago, and her experience had enabled her to rejoice with joy unspeakable, and was now full of glory.

GRANDE-LIGNE SCHOOL 1887-1888.

It is with much pleas re that we undertake to give the many warm friends of our mission a short report of our work in the school for the last few months.

On account of changes in the administration, and necessary repairs in the house, the session did not open till the twentieth of October, a trifle later than usual. For that very reason, likely, the pupils were prompt in coming in.

Owing to the beautiful fall weather we had, the pupils seemed to feel cheerful, hardly one spoke of home-sickness and they all readily settled to work.

So far we have had on an average fifty boarders and fifteen day-scholars. Had our accommodation for boys been greater we would have received some thirty more at least, who were anxiously waiting for a letter announcing a vacancy. Eleven of our pupils are from Roman Catholic houses, five girls and six boys. Some of these are pronounced Protestants in sentiment, and the rest are expected to break the ties that still bind them to Rome, some day or other.

The studies pursued are the same as usual, although we have tried to reduce the number of branches followed by any one pupil. This, however, we have not yet been able to do to our satisfaction.

New text books have been introduced, and the time allotted to each lesson has been lengthened from half to three-quarters of an hour. Less time, we believe, is lost in this way, and more is accomplished.

The staff of teachers is composed of Miss Riendeau, directress, Mrs. Dalpé, who has charge of the girls during class hours, and devotes most of her time to teaching; Miss Hall, and Miss Therrien, teacher of instrumental music. Just here we wish to publicly express our thanks to Mr. L. E. Rivard, of Montreal, who

has been kind enough to leave his business once a week to come and give singing lessons to the entire school. His success is plainly noticeable in the manner our pupils render some of our hymns. Also Mr. Dalpé, a graduate of McGill, who sees to the boys during class hours, and teaches most of the day. Mr. Duteaud, overseer of the boys, and teacher of a few classes; and myself. All the teachers are striving to stimulate the pupils to earnest work, and help them in every possible way.

So far, it seems to us, satisfactory results have been attained. A noticable change has taken place in the general conduct and bearing of many of our pupils, to say nothing of the progress made in studies. A goodly number have been led to Christ and have accepted Him as their Master. Among these we may mention: One bright young girl from one of our Protestant families who had for a long time resisted all religious influences and who finally yielded and confessed her faith in the presence of her companions. Also an interesting young man from the Eastern Townships. Previous to his coming he was, although a Roman Catholic, prevailed upon to enter a chapel where an evangelist was holding protracted meetings. There he was made to see the error of his sinful life, and he subsequently became serious and very anxious for more light and more peace. His parents tried in vain to prevent his coming to our school, but encouraged by certain friends of his, he made up his mind to come. Since his arrival we have noticed a remarkable change in his whole deportment. By the grace of God he is now pious and zealous in his new faith; his Bible has become his constant companion. Possessing naturally a firm character with plenty of energy and push, we expect him to become one of God's chosen instruments for the conversion of men.

Prayer meetings have been organized among the pupils both girls and boys. Much good has aiready been done in these meetings and our eyes are opened to see more.

A temperance society in connection with the school has lately been started and it bids fair to be very successful. Our intention is, that it shall be a permanent institution.

This we submit trusting we have as in former years the good wishes and the prayers of our many Christian friends.

MONTREAL CHURCH.

REV. A. L. THERRIEN, Pastor.

Since our last annual report was written, five happy converts have been baptized, four of which were recent converts from Romanism. Speaking of one of these, our last report said "The niece is as deeply interested as her uncle and aunt, and as firmly decided to follow Christ, but she anticipates great opposition when she returns home where Protestants are scarcely known. Christian brother, or sister, who read this will you raise your heart to God in prayer for her?"

The young sister's anticipated troubles did come, though in a different way from that which she had expected. Solicited and urged by a priest, her parents had delivered her into his hands to be shut up in a convent here in Montreal; but with the help God gave her, and through that of kind, heroic, and generous friends, she marvellously escaped his grip, and was placed out of the reach of her pursuers and persecutors. Her experience furnishes matter for a thrilling story which however it may not be best to write out now. Suffice it to say that she is in a good home, preparing herself for a life of usefulness. Her faith in God is beautiful, and her character of a high order.

In the month of June, I met a priest in the presence of about thirty persons equally divided between Catholics and Protestants. The object of our meeting was the discussion of doctrines upon which R. C. and Protestants differ. But the priest, refusing to enter in an honest and fair agreement, denying even a Catholic version of the New Testament which I had brought with me, and refusing to accept the word of God as our common authority to which we might appeal, he preferred the warfare in which priests usually delight, namely, the guerilla warfare, in which unfairness, virulence, vulgarity, and the abuse of Protestants in general and Reformers in particular, form the principal part. Pressed and cornered on several points, he became greatly excited, and after a furious tirade of invective and a shameful and vulgar abuse of the Bible, he precipitatedly sneaked out of the house, and left us master of the situation.

On hearing of the above events, a Roman Catholic was led to enquire into these questions. He procured a New Testament and read it with his wife. They soon after began to attend our services, and expressed their desire to follow the teachings of the New Testament. They left the city to settle upon a farm in the Eastean Townships, but not without taking the good book with them and being resolved to make good use of it.

Since our coming to Montreal, we felt the need of a Bible woman to be associated with us in the work. Our prayers had ascended to God that he might send us one after his own heart; but we had not expected that an answer to our prayers would come in the way it did. God's thoughts are not our thoughts, nor his ways our ways. A member of our little flock, a timid, retiring and sickly woman, having recently been treated in the hospital for a chronic throat and bronchial affection, expressed her desire to devote the remainder of her life to God's work. She felt strongly impressed that she ought to do something towards giving the Word of God to the thousands of families in our city who have it not. At first the idea struck us as being almost preposterous; but in a conversation we had with her we soon discovered that God had uttered the command "Go work to-day in my vineyard," and she was advised to begin at once, looking to God for her support. She did so, and from the first day to this her success has been wonderful, as the following summary of her report will show:-

In most of the French Catholic churches of the city, this devoted sister and her work have been denounced, and the people warned against purchasing her "vile books." Even the press was used to this effect. She was threatened by one of the priests, of being arrested for selling books without a license (no danger of the license coming from the Bishop). She had several times the occasion of calling on priests with some parshioner of theirs to obtain an expression of their judgment on the books she sold, she maintaining they were the same they themselves used to say Mass with at the altar, but with one exception they were each time rudely received, or unceremoniously ejected from the house.

Mrs. Scott, this is her name, is a French Canadian woman whose parents are converts from the Church of Rome. She attended school in the Feller Institute when at Longueuil, and was converted and baptized when a pupil of that school.

The Montreal Ladies Association, in aid of the Grande-Ligne Mission, have assumed the responsibility of her support and the oversight of her work. May the Lord send us many such a worker.

Our religious services are regularly attended, some of our members who have to come at the distance of three miles, are present at almost every service. Though small and composed mostly of persons not blessed with much of this world's goods, our church has contributed last year three hundred and fifty dollars for its own support and for other religious and benevolent objects. We are expecting to do more this year, having adopted the envelope system of weekly offerings, which is working admirably. The Sunday School under the superintendence of Mr. A. Massé, and having as teachers Mrs. Therrien, Mrs. J. Picard, and the writer, has continued its work steadily, and added some new scholars to their number. A young newly married couple are seen occasionally at our services. The husband has very recently decided to take the Word of God for his guide, but the wife says she is still studying and seeking for light. They belong to a family of rigid Romanists, and are still very timid in their movements. May the Lord give them strength to take their stand on the side of truth. Many Roman Catholics are now reading the Word, and comparing its teachings with those of their church. expect some substantial fruit from the wide distribution of Scripture among them. The Lord grant it.

ST. MARIE DE MONNOIR CHURCH.

In our last report we had to note several departures, these events are repeating themselves year after year in our small community. But while our old people are called to their rest, and the young are drifting away to some other part of the world, many children are growing up in the midst of us whom we expect to fill our schools and churches.

It has been remarked more than once with regard to the field of St. Marie, that the meetings are well attended only so long as the fine season lasts. Most of our people, especially the old, living far from the church are prevented from attending the services as winter sets in. Many of them are for months at a time shut off from nearly all religious influences. To remedy this a special effort was made toward the close of last winter. Most of the missionaries lending their help, we were enabled to hold interesting and profitable services in different parts of the field and for several consecutive evenings, these services were for the most part of an evangelistic nature, and appeals were made to the young to come forward and confess Christ. Although no public profession was then made, we trust that the impressions received were good and lasting.

While labouring to instruct and edify our own people, we have also endeavored to lose no opportunity of reaching outsiders. We held our services at such times and in such places as were best calculated to attract our Roman Catholic friends. In this God has given us a measure of success, and we have seen as many as a dozen of them at a time in some of our meetings.

Not the least interesting is the fact that there came among the rest the most bigoted person of the whole vicinity. And it came to pass as an indirect result of extraordinary efforts in the other direction, efforts she had made to bring over to Romanism a young Protestant girl in her employ. She had used promises, threats, arguments, everything. She had called to her help the vicar of the parish. He came and endeavoured to frighten the girl by saying that the Protestants apparent piety was but a sham since in the last analysis they worshipped none but the evil one. with whom they shall all fare at last without exception. He made her promise to go and see him at his residence; he requested her to say nothing about it to her relatives, and to go alone. (Note in this the spirit of darkness.) She went with her Bible, but he refused to let her speak, saying that it was not proper for a person of her age to take the pose of a teacher before him. The result was as could be expected; the girl understood better than ever before the spirit of Popery, and the person mentioned above, consented to come to our services to see if what the priest had said about Protestants was true. Through that young person, for

her benefit, for the benefit of her employer as well as that of the public, I tried to obtain an interview with that priest, but never succeeded.

I was more successful however with another of his class who is a teacher in the college of Marieville. He was in the railway station talking to a friend, and expressing freely his opinion on Mr. Chiniquy, when he saw himself unexpectedly drawn into a discussion. A good number of people clustered around us and listened very attentively and politely.

The priest seeing that the impression produced was not favorable to his cause, soon retreated saying that it was forbidden to discuss in a public place.

Those who look for a change in public opinion as regards religious questions, will note with interest that the sympathies of the listeners were on my side.

A young man who has spent seven years at the college of St. Sulpice, Montreal, come to me afterwards to express his approval of what I had said
It gave me a good opportunity of urging him to seek the truth as it is revealed in the Gospel.

ST. PIE CHURCH.

Since our last report your missionary has been on the field about eight months only; the rest of his time was spent in Ontario collecting for the Society. During those eight months we have been sowing and reaping also. Some have told us that they had been blessed by our ministrations. We have sown the seed of of Truth to an attentive and constant congregation. An encouraging feature in our work is the presence of a considerably large number of Roman Catholics at our evening services especially. At the funeral service of a member of our congregation, last Spring, no less than one hundred respectable and decorous Roman Catholics were present and listened to the preaching of the Gospel very attentively. The fact that on the following evening sixty of

them returned to attend a fecture in our Church is an evidence of their interest in our presentation of the truth. One of our brethren who has the opportunity of finding out the mind of Roman Catholics in our parish says: "I have conversed with many of them and know that very few of them are cordially attached to their Church."

Our purpose is to continue sowing the good seed with the hope that with God's blessing there will eventually be a richer harvest than we may be permitted to reap ourselves. As an instance of deferred reaping, the same brother above alluded to, gave a bible to a Roman Catholic eleven years ago. He laid it aside for a time; but having met with an accident which laid him up for a few weeks, he took his bible and began to read it only to pass away the time, but the Spirit of the Lord opened his heart and he received the truth sincerely.

I love the Spirit of the old lady who though nominally attached to the Church of Rome said to us: "Work on, should it take you fifty years to convert half of the Province, it would take you two years after that to convert the other half."

Brother Gendreau, a member of our Church, is still continuing his colportage work for the Bible Society. He meets of course with discouragements; but he also meets with many things to cheer his heart and keep him hopeful.

ROXTON-POND CHURCH.

The year 1887 has been for us here a more prosperous one than the preceeding. During that short period we have witnessed several favorable changes. Without being in a discouraging condition, our congregation was not what we desired it to be. We wanted to see it increase in number and more manifest piety. The services on Sunday were as those in the week day generally well attended. But we continued to hope and pray, that the abundant Gospel seed scattered on this limited field, might yield more fruit to the glory of God.

During the winter I began to notice with joyful gratitude to God signs of a new religious interest and a new life in the church and congregation, and in the spring we repaired to the banks of our little river where in the presence of a large number of people both Catholics as well as Protestants, I baptized seven happy converts.

To those new converts were added a few new members who had brought their letters from sister churches, so that we had our pentecostal season during the past year.

Our congregation was also increased by the return from the States of quite a number of French Protestants, among whom several former pupils of the Grande-Ligne Institute. Those young friends had not lost what they had learned at that school, and the influence which they sent among Roman Catholics and Protestants is deservedly due to the confidence placed on them, and the esteem in which they are held.

A young man, nominally a Roman Catholic, who but lately has come to live in our village, has attended our meetings regularly, and has contributed his share in the expenses for the church and for the pastor's support. It is one more soul on the way to the truth.

Our finances are also in a little better condition than last year. Our collections have amounted altogether to \$149; \$117 towards the pastor's salary and \$32 for the care of the chapel.

It is very gratifying to see that our young people who have had some education at Grande-Ligne have become much more generous than the older converts who have not had that training. It encourages us in the hope that ere long the pastors will not have the same struggles as in former times, to get much larger sums. Our sunday school has increased during the past year. To the two small classes of young children, a third of older pupils has been added under the care of Mr. O. M. Therrien. They number in all thirty.

We also have a temperance society in our congregation whose labors have borne good results. We meet twice a month when singing, addresses and readings on the subject are given by our young people. I am happy to say that for years none of our Protestants have been induced to sign a petition in favor of a

tavern in this place. This example given by Protestants, has caused Roman Catholics to say:—"We Catholics do not stand united and firm as Protestants do."

On the last days of June the Association of our French Churches met here. There never had been seen so many French Canadian Protestants in Roxton Pond. On this occasion our chapel was too small to contain them all, we had to repair on a very fine day to a grove near by for most of our meetings which lasted two days. We all felt, what was often expressed during those precious hours, that it was "good to be there." And we all wished we could oftener have such gatherings.

There was a collection taken up amounting to \$25, which were appropriated for the intended enlargement of the chapel.

There is one more item about which brother Brouillet does not speak, it is the generous and cordial hospitality extended by his people to the numerous visitors whom they had to provide for.

SOUTH ELY CHURCH.

REV. N. GREGOIRE, Pastor.

The Church of South Ely has to record this year very few events worthy of public notice. Still we have to be thankful to God that He has continued to us His former blessings, and even has imparted to us new ones. In the same time we have had our share of difficulty, annoyance and trouble, coming to us sometimes from parties from whom they were the least expected.

The good will of God towards us this year has been manifest chiefly in bringing about the following results: Union has been maintained and strengthened in the Church. Piety has been revived or made truer and deeper in many. The Church membership has been increased by the profession of faith and baptism of three adult persons. The Church which had been several years without a regular pastor, was granted one in the ordination of the undersigned, which took place last summer.

Moreover our work has been extended outside of the Church by several meetings which we have been allowed to hold among the Roman Catholics in Lawrenceville, a neighboring village. Many Catholics have opened their eyes to truth in these meetings, and have persisted to the end in attending them, in spite of the most furious denunciations of their priest. This is a fresh proof added to innumerable others that our French Canadian population although very ignorant in religious matters, would not be so stupid as to reject the dazzling light of the Gospel, had it not fallen a prey to such a tyrannical power as that of the Romish Church. May the nations freed from that power understand that it is their duty to come to the rescue of the Roman Catholics even before going to the infidels, remembering that the Lord commanded His Apostles to preach in Judea before going to the Gentiles.

Statistics:—Church members, thirty-three; Congregation, including children, seventy; Average attendance in Church, forty; Sunday school, forty.

ST. JOHNS.

REV. T. RIENDEAU, Pastor.

During the past year my pastoral and missionary labors at a distance from my home have been of a very varied kind. Often called to visit the sick, to bury the dead, to supply the pulpit of an absent brother, or a pastorless Church, I can truly say that these ministrations have proved a blessing to me, while some have been kind enough to say that they have received good from them. In the absence of Brother Parent on a collecting tour in Great Britain, I have several times been called to visit my old charge, once for the funeral service of a young man, when a large number of Roman Catholics heard the Gospel of truth and life in coming to honor the dead.

While there, and referring to the words of Christ to Peter and his brother, "Come ye after me and I shall make you to become fishers of men," one of my old parshioners said to me: "Well, you have been the fisherman in my own case." And in my own case also, said a woman present. Whilst it gave me

much pleasure to hear this, I said to myself, you have borne testimony to Christ on the sea and on the land, in America and even in Europe, but how many have been brought to the knowledge of Him whom to know is life eternal, through your long ministry? Perhaps only a few? On one occasion during the summer I was called to Grande-Ligne to baptize several young converts because the pastor of the Church was unable, on account of sickness, to do it himself. Being here in the centre of railway travel I have frequent visits from Protestants and Roman Catholics, who freely come to my study for advice, consultation on religious matters, and many are the precious moments thus spent in conversation and study of the Word of God.

One day I was deeply touched by the words of a dear little Catholic girl who on hearing her grandmother who is a Protestant pray: "Oh! if I could pray like this." You can, said the grandparent, and you will be heard and saved if you do. "I will then" said the child.

While visiting all the people of my former charge, St. Marie de Monnoir, and sometimes preaching to them, I took occasion to make the collections, as the Pastor was absent. They responded cheerfully and generously to my appeal. In St. Johns and Iberville the collections were made by Mrs. Guertin and Miss F. Riendeau. They met with a kind and generous reception from our many friends in this place.

ST. CONSTANT, LAPIGEONNIERE AND MISSION STATIONS.

This large field has been regularly visited during the summer months, by one of our students Mr. W. Bullock. There appeared nothing of a special, or at least remarkable interest. The meetings were well attended, and in one of the localities two Roman Catholic families have been induced to read the Word of God, and have welcomed with interest the visits of our missionary. Occasionally a member or two of those families would attend our meetings.

That field has sustained a very great loss in two of our French Protestan families, by the death of an exemplary and intelligent young man, and a devoted christian woman, the wife of one of the foremost men in that locality, and the loving mother of a large family. Such dispensations of Providence are not understood on this side of the great shadow.

CLARENCEVILLE & BROCKVILLE, ST. SEBASTIEN CHURCH

ARTHUR ST. JAMES. Pastor.

Though this field has been worked by a laborer especially supported by the Baptist Convention East, he has also given some of his time to French Evangelisation in connection with the Grande-Ligne Mission, and in his successful labors has baptized a few French converts. We are sorry to learn that brother A. St. James has severed his connection with that work where his labors have been blessed, and that he has accepted a call in the United States, where he is to minister to a French church and congregation. There was plenty room for him in our own French field, and it is painful to see one of the sons of one of our most respected French Protestant families, and a former pupil of our Institution leave the work here. We hope that after a short stay there he may be induced to return to us again.

We give here the brief report of his labors :-

To the Board of the Grande-Ligne Mission.—

DEAR BRETHREN.

I come to report the work of a year filled with blessings and some trials, both spiritual and temporal. The roses were not plucked without our having felt the thorns, and we have had cloudy days even in the finest season. We have to chronicle the death of members, who had ripened in the service of the Master. We rather envy their lot, they are at rest.

During the year four families have left the country with the prospect of bettering their circumstances in a financial point of view. We also had the painful task of excluding one unruly member. Thus our ranks have been considerably thinned out.

During the summer a deep spirtual interest prevailed among us; many souls were led to Christ and confessed their faith in Him. Eight of them were baptized, six being English and two French. Others are waiting till the summer for the ordinance, as we have no baptistry in this place.

A man who a year ago was sorely afflicted by the death of his wife, and who had been led to Christ through the labors of the mission years before, but had fallen into indifference, has been revived again this last summer, and has become a faithful worker. In consequence of which he was chosen as one of the Deacons of the Church. Family worship is regularly maintained in his house, and two of his children were baptized during the summer.

Our house of worship was in a very dilapidated and uncomfortable condition. But now the rough hemlock seats have given place to one hundred fine new chairs, and the rough walls that were, are now neatly papered. The wood work is all finished, and the room has now an inviting and comfortable appearance. This surpasses our anticipations, and teaches us the lesson that God is always willing to do for us more than we expect Him to do.

CONCLUSION.

We are called to have our share, however small in the moulding of the vast population which in a few years is to fill so much of this immense continent. We cannot now possibly measure the influence of our work on future generations, but we know it may be considerable. We know that if our souls are enlightened and enlarged by that truth from above and which is one day to fill the whole earth, we shall be enabled, in company with others to sow the seed of that tree which is to cover our world, and which worldly minded men cannot eradicate for they die like others.

A good deal of our work has consisted in lopping off what is too bushy in the semi-pagan christianity that surrounds us, and we have at times been blamed for that, but in this we have followed a great example, even the Lord Jesus Christ. While most of our endeavors have had in view, we say it with all due humility,

to impart the gospel truth, as the Divine Master did it, knowing that the great reformatory power is there. That is at the outset the most simple, the most direct, the most profound and the most effective way of working out a reformation. We have all of us applauded the eloquent protest of Father Hyacinth, and of those who call themselves old Catholics, and we know that their utterances and their actions have had their influence in the breaking up of the great power which has heralded itself for centuries as the only apostolical church. We cannot be indifferent to the bold stand taken by Dr. McGlynn, against what he calls the Roman Machine, which in the name of religion crushes all opposition, without heart or conscience, for it is an intellectual system; and to his appeal for liberty of conscience. We do not admire his bit of Irish eloquence when he says that in a hundred years the bishop of Rome will kick with his foot the devotee who is subservient enough to attempt to kiss his toe; but we see clearly there the chaotic state of the Catholic minds, the breaking up of old cherished idols by the great upheavings of our century; and with those signs of the time we may not slacken our efforts.

> "Can we whose souls are lighted With wisdom from on high Can we to man benighted The lamp of life deny?"

No, we shall endeavor to have more and more light ourselves, more and more truth in our souls, so that all the powers we have of whatever nature may be consecrated to the service of God and to the enlightenment of our fellow men.

In view of greater efficiency of work some earnest souls have proposed to make a great effort to secure an endowment for our Grande Ligne Institute. In the present state of the Mission nothing assuredly could be more in harmony with its needs, and we are happy to believe that this good thought is from the Lord, an inspiration of His spirit that will not be resisted, since He has seen our struggles for many years for mere existence, and He knows that we do not aim at more leisure, but rather at increased facilities for doing good in His name and for the glory of His love.
