CONSTITUTION.

1. That this Society be called "The Canadian Congregational Missionary Society, in connection with the Colonial Missionary Society."
2. That its object shall be, to aid feeble Congregational Churches in sustaining their Ministers,—to spread the Gospel by means of Missionaries among all classes of inhabitants, and to promote other general missionary objects of the Congregational body.
3. That all persons subscribing 5s. per annum shall become Members of this Society; and any person subscribing at one time £5 or upwards, shall be an honorary or Life Member of this Society.
4. That the business of the Society shall be managed by a Secretary-Treasurer, and Committee of not less than nine others, to be elected annually by ballot after nomination, by the Congregational Union of Canada, and to consist chiefly of Pastors and Delegates of Churches not aided by the Society,—five to form a quorum.
5. That the Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held at the Annual Session of the Union, and during such Annual Session the Committee shall adjust all the appropriations for the ensuing year so far as possible.
6. That in order to provide for local contingencies there shall be appointed by the Union a small Sub-Committee with its Secretary, within certain territorial districts, who shall possess discretionary powers to act in special cases, which action shall extend only to the next meeting of the Union, and which they shall immediately report to the Society.

7. That the Local Sub-Committees shall attend to the collection of funds, the supervision of the missionary work in their several bounds, and report annually to the Secretary.

8. That all Churches receiving aid from this Society to sustain their Minister, shall be required, as the condition of its continuance, faithfully to fulfill their own engagement towards his support.

9. That all Missionaries receiving aid from this Society shall report once in six months to the Secretary, and make a full statistical return annually according to the prepared forms.

10. The connection of this Society with the Colonial Missionary Society shall be maintained in the following manner:—

The General Committee, after making up its Annual Schedule of actual and probable appropriation, shall transmit the same, with an estimate of the amount likely to be obtained in Canada, to the Col. M. S.; with the understanding, that if objections be not made within three months, the arrangement shall stand for the year. The occasional grants made by the Local Sub-Committee shall be reported to London as soon as agreed on. The General Committee shall send to the Col. M. S. the Annual Report of its proceedings, with the statistical returns, after its acceptance by the Union. They shall also furnish any information at their discretion, or at the request of the C. M. S., as to the progress of the work, from time to time.

11. That this Constitution may be altered by any Annual Meeting of the Congregational Union of Canada, one day's notice having been first given to the Union in writing, of any proposal to that effect.

NINTH ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting of the Society was held in the Hughson St. Congregational Church, Hamilton, on Monday evening, June 16, 1862. Rev. J. Pullar was in the Chair. The Secretary, Rev. K. M. Fenwick, made a statement of the operations of the Society; and the meeting was addressed by Rev. Edward Barker, Rev. John Wood, and Rev. Edward Ebbs.

REPORT.

The Ninth Anniversary of this Society brings us really to the twenty-sixth year of our movements in Canada, in connection with the Colonial Missionary Society of Great Britain; a year which has not been remarkable for success, though it has not been without encouragements. There have been 47 Missionaries on the list in Canada, and 8 in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Of these, however, 2 were theological students, who labored in various parts of the whole field, during their vacation. Reference is made to the details compiled by the Home Secretary, for an account of the work performed by these valued brethren, so far as their labours can be placed on such a record.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

A reference to the subjoined accounts, will show that the expenditure has been nearly four hundred dollars less this year than last, although no part of the field has been relinquished. A large amount of itinerant and exploring work has been done in Lower Canada, and several new and promising spheres of labour have been entered upon in different parts of the Province. This is encouraging. On the other hand the contributions from the churches have fallen considerably short of last year, in every district, except the Western, where the deficiency is trifling; the aggregate falling off being five hundred and sixty dollars. Special attention is called to this point at the approaching Missionary meetings throughout the country. It should, however, be noted, as accounting for a part of this diminution, that certain stations which have undertaken for the first time self-support this year, have of course been unable to make their usual contributions to the Society. On the one hand they have been of no charge to the funds; on the other hand, because of this, they have not been enabled to do as much for the funds as formerly.

The Colonial Missionary Society contributed this year \$4,200: last year \$3,932.

In the District of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, there has been, for the first time, a general collection by the churches in aid of the Society's funds. Moreover, the work has been happily extended, as appears from the Report of the Home Secretary.

WESTERN DISTRICT.

The Local Committee, as usual, has visited the several stations by delegation, holding public meetings and taking up collections and subscriptions in aid of our funds.

All the stations, on the list last year, have been retained. Garafraxa has been united with Erin. Stratford has been re-occupied and London and Turnbury, placed on our funds since January. Southwold, left vacant by the removal of its pastor to Stratford, is supplied by student labour.

BARTON.—This station, from the reports of the pastor, the Rev. Anthony McGill, appears to be in a prosperous condition. The Sabbath-School is well attended and efficient. A bible-class has been "kept in operation" by the pastor. The weekly prayer-meeting has also been well attended. The congregations have been increasingly encouraging; and the church has had a few additions, on profession of faith. In December, special services were held, in which the pastor was assisted by several of his ministerial brethren. These services consisted in preaching the Gospel every evening; and in holding a prayer-meeting at noon, for united supplication for God's blessing on His word. The effort seems to have been very happy in its influence on the church; and several appear to have been led to think seriously on their need of an interest in the divine Saviour.

DRESDEN AND BOTHWELL.—The Rev. W. Clarke, assisted by the Rev. R. Robinson, has maintained the ministry of the word regularly at these stations during the year; as also at Thamesville. At Dresden an interesting Sabbath-School has been efficiently sustained. Notwithstanding the labour devoted to this field, it is not as fruitful as could be desired, and the pastor is evidently somewhat discouraged.

GARAFRAXA AND ERIN.—The latter station appeared in last report in connection with Eramosa. On the removal of the Rev. E. Barker the Local Committee, and the parties, concerned reconstructed the field: Eramosa and other stations forming one sphere of labour, which was subsequently occupied by the Rev. John

Brown, who has been sustained by his people without aid from the Society; and Garafraxa and Erin forming a second sphere, which has also been occupied by the Rev. Robert Brown since the termination of his course of study at our Theological College. At Garafraxa, matters are in a most satisfactory and hopeful condition. The congregations are increasingly large, and the Church has had a very considerable number added to its membership. The chapel was in debt when Mr. Brown commenced his labour; but the people are making noble efforts to remove it. At Erin, although there is much to encourage, the same degree of prosperity does not exist. The station is too far apart from Garafraxa; and possibly before long, Erin may be otherwise connected, and Luther a very destitute but promising field associated with Garafraxa. The labours of our young brother have been honoured of God, and we trust will continue to receive evident tokens of the highest sanction.

KELVIN.—The reports from the pastor the Rev. John Armour are on the whole encouraging. Besides the main station there are two others occupied by our missionary; at the former the congregations are reported "very encouraging;" at both the latter, "good;" one or two have united with the church during the year: an interesting Bible-class has been conducted by the Pastor. The new church building mentioned in last annual report as in process of erection, has been completed, "without debt, or even foreign help."

KINCARDINE.—The Rev. N. McKinnon retains the pastorate of this church and is encouraged in his work. The congregations are reported as "increasing," and his missionary labour in destitute localities is not without divine approval. Concerning one of his visits he writes: "I have lately preached in a neighbourhood where the people are almost entirely neglected, and the eagerness and gratitude with which they received me was beyond anything I have ever noticed." A new chapel was opened on the first Sabbath in March, 1862, in the erection of which "all denominations gave a helping hand," on which occasion the Rev. J. McLean addressed the congregation. He remained for ten days, and in connection with the pastor held special services during that period. The attendance was very large, and several interesting cases of conver-

sion was the result. The last report closes with these words: "the church is in peace and harmony, and doing their best towards me."

LISTOWELL.—The Church at Listowell has not yet fully recovered from the difficulties referred to in last annual report. The congregations are, however, much increased, and the prospect is brightening. At Molesworth a very encouraging state of things exists: not only is the attendance on the means of grace very cheering, but the Church has been much strengthened by additions to its membership. Turnbury with another station in Hawick, has become so strong as to form a distinct field of labour for another missionary, and will be presented more fully in a subsequent part of this report.

NEW DURHAM.—On the return of the Rev. S. Snider from Cape Canso he visited this station; and was encouraged to remain. He has opened another station in connection with New Durham. Although our brother has been only a few months on the field he is very hopeful that a good cause will be established.

SARNIA.—The Rev. R. G. Baird, pastor of this Church, was so discouraged by removals from the church and congregation during the year, that at its close, he resigned his charge, and removed to the United States. The Church, however, although reduced in numbers, and crippled in resources, has applied for another missionary; and arrangements are in progress for securing another pastor. N. B. Since the annual meeting in June, Mr. Strassenburgh a student from the College, has received and accepted a call, and has commenced his labours under promising auspices.

LONDON.—This Church again appears in our report under peculiar circumstances. It has been self supporting; but the emigration of a large number of its members, through the commercial crisis which so seriously lessened the population of the city, and the reduced pecuniary ability of many who have remained, made it requisite that its pastor should either partly sustain himself by devoting a considerable portion of his time and energy to secular pursuits or be again assisted from our funds. For some time, the first method was adopted, but after mature deliberation the Local Committee deemed it wise (on earnest application from the Church)

to vote an interim grant in order that the Pastor might be wholly devoted to his pastoral work. The Church has consequently been on our list since January, 1862. It is gratifying to be able to state, that the report since received from the Pastor proves the wisdom of the course adopted. The grant, from the nature of the case, can only be temporary; and we trust, that through the blessing of God on the undivided efforts of the esteemed Pastor, the Rev. C. Watson, it will be of limited duration.

SOUTHWOLD.—The Rev. J. Durrant continued his labours on this field with considerable success, and with much acceptance to the people, until the end of December; when he removed to

STRATFORD.—Where he has been engaged in missionary work during the remaining part of the current year. His report from this station is on the whole encouraging; but the cause is painfully small.

TURNBURY, (Bluevale). This Church was formerly connected with Listowell, but other stations opening with promise, at the request of the people, student Day was sent to labour during his vacation. A notice of his missionary work during that period, will be found under "Student Labour." At the close of his vacation he received and accepted a call to become Pastor of the Church. His subsequent report depicts a large and hopeful sphere for missionary effort, with many encouraging features. The Church though still small, and poor in worldly substance, is united, prayerful, and active. The congregations are good.

WARWICK.—The Rev. D. McCallum continues on this field; and under his patient and efficient service, the cause is making sure and steady progress. The Church is united in itself, and faithful in the discharge of its obligations to the pastor. There may be room for increase in spirituality and prayerfulness, but there are many encouraging features. Towards the close of the missionary year, the Church resolved to ask a smaller grant from the Society and to make up the difference to the Pastor, while the contributions to our funds are in advance of any previous year.

MIDDLE DISTRICT.

No change has been made on the reported list of last year. Albion, as announced in last report, having become able to do without missionary help, does not now appear; but with this exception the other chambers remain connected with the Society, and no new stations have been added. The several fields have been visited by delegations from the Local Committee who have held public meetings and have looked after the collections and subscriptions.

BOWMANVILLE.—Patient labour, resulting in spiritual fruit, is not invariably followed by numerical increase in a Church and congregation. This finds illustration in the present instance. The cause in this Town has been kept somewhat stationary in numbers and resources by frequent removals. In such circumstances, to retain position is actual advance. The Rev. T. M. Reikie besides still doing service in the general interests of the churches by editing the "Canadian Independent," efficiently toils as Pastor on this field; and, notwithstanding the depletion referred to, is able to report the cause as no less strong, if not somewhat stronger than the previous year.

BELL EWART.—The Rev. A. Raymond retains the pastorate of this Church. His report for January was a very sad one. The station had been visited by severe sickness, so general that the congregations were almost broken up. His own family had suffered greatly, a loved child had been removed by death, while his own health for a long period continued much impaired. His report for May, represents the congregations as much improved.

BROCK AND MARIPOSA.—The stations under the charge of the Rev. D. McGregor appear on the whole to be in a healthy state. The spirit of prayer has been considerably revived amongst the people. During the latter part of the missionary year two heads of families have been received into the Church; and some of the congregation are known to be anxious about their salvation. Although there has been a pecuniary pressure on the congregation, the pastor has been paid his salary; and the hope is expressed,

“that when the tide of prosperity again sets in, the desire of the Church to support the cause without missionary aid, will be realized.”

CALEDON.—Has extended a call to the Rev. H. Denny, by whom it has been accepted, as it will support its pastor without missionary aid. Caledon will cease to appear as one of our mission stations.

COLPOY'S BAY.—The Rev. L. Kribs remains on this field. It is thoroughly missionary in its character. Some idea of its extent, and general features may be formed from the following extract: “A very large field for missionary work is now opening up in this new country. There are no less than five settlements, containing from one hundred and fifty, to two hundred families, among whom the gospel is never preached except by myself; but in two of these settlements, I have never yet been able to preach, so large a portion of my time being necessarily occupied in other labours. All appear anxious to have the ordinances of religion administered to them: and when the Gospel is preached, the attention is marked.” The settlement at Colpay's bay is rapidly increasing, and the congregations are too large for the room in which they worship. The Pastor mourns the want of conversions; but prayerfully anticipates the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

NEWMARKET.—Remains vacant, there is however a fair prospect that a pastor will be obtained almost immediately.

ORO AND INNISFIL.—No pastor has yet been settled over these churches. Student Sanderson, whose report will be noticed under “Student Labour,” has been preaching for the people.

OWEN SOUND.—The Rev. Joseph Hooper, pastor of this church, writes hopefully in both his reports, in reference to the cause under his pastoral care. The congregations at the Sound, and at the out-stations, are all of them encouraging. The Sabbath-School is in an interesting condition. Besides the regular Bible-class, a class for young people has been formed under very encouraging circumstances. If the spiritual tone of the church is not quite as

deep as it was during the season of refreshing, enjoyed so richly last year; there are still tokens of the Divine presence, the harmony of the Church is unbroken, and the affectionate care of the people for their pastor still continues.

OSPREY.—Nothing of special interest has occurred at this station during the year. The Pastor, the Rev. John McLean has faithfully laboured among his countrymen, preaching in Gaelic, and otherwise doing missionary work. His congregations are large and attentive; and there is reason to believe that his exertions are not without spiritual fruit.

PINE GROVE AND ST. ANDREWS.—At the former place the pastor, the Rev. Robert Hay, has had very much to encourage him. He writes (May 2.) "By the good hand of God upon us" we have added ten souls to the membership of the Church, two males and eight females. These are, with two exceptions, the children of church members. The Church is in a more spiritual state than formerly, and some additions are now being made to our congregation." At St. Andrews the congregations are reported good; but no additions have been made to the membership. The Pastor bears testimony to the faithfulness of the people in meeting their pecuniary obligations to him.

STOUFFVILLE AND MARKHAM.—In connection with these two stations, the pastor, the Rev. Wm. Allworth preaches at Unionville. The congregations at Stouffville and Unionville are on the increase, although at the former place, two other denominations are pressing in. The lecture on Tuesday evenings, held in Stouffville, is also encouragingly attended. Additions to the membership of both Churches have been made during the year.

Besides promptly meeting their stipulated obligations to the pastor, the people at both the principal stations, have made improvements on their places of worship; while their handsome collection to the funds of the society, has made the grant which they receive merely nominal. The field, however, is far too extended for one missionary; and the consequent labour, far too arduous for the physical strength of one man. It is to be hoped that ere

long, the friends of the cause in this region will so enlarge their liberality, that with a slight increase from the funds of the Society another missionary may be stationed on the field.

TRAFALGAR.—The Rev. H. Denny has occupied this station during the year; and reports the congregations good and attentive. His labours at Trafalgar and the connected out-stations will however close with the current year as he has received and accepted a call from the Church in Caledon.

WHITBY.—There is little of interest to report in connection with this Church. The Rev. J. T. Byrne remains at his post, but is sorely discouraged. Three have been added to the Church; but many more have been removed by emigration. The out-stations have had to be relinquished; and the congregations at Whitby are far from encouraging.

EASTERN DISTRICT.

The several stations have been visited by Missionary Deputations as on former years. Cobourg and Lanark first church, having, as noticed in last Report, become independent of missionary aid, do not appear on the list. Brockville still remains vacant.

BELLEVILLE. The Rev. J. Climie retains the pastorate of this church. The year has been one of mingled discouragement and hope. Removals have weakened both the church and congregation, and yet the pastor reports symptoms of spiritual improvement. A place of worship is felt to be of pressing moment to the establishment of the cause; and, probably before the close of another year, efforts will be strenuously put forth to secure a church edifice.

COLD SPRINGS. The venerable pastor of this church, the Rev. Wm. Hayden, continues his ministry among a people to whom, with acceptance, he has long preached Christ. His reports are expressive of hope, and of humble trust that his labour, to some

extent, is acknowledged of God. Increasing feebleness of body does not lessen his faith, nor make him less anxious to lead sinners to the Lamb of God. It is pleasing to find that his last days are cheered by the confidence and love of an affectionate people.

LANARK VILLAGE. During the early part of the missionary year, there were, as during last year, several discouraging circumstances connected with this church, which not a little tried the faith of the people and their respected pastor, the Rev. P. Shanks. One of these, and that one not the least, was the existence of a somewhat heavy debt on their place of worship. The General Committee appointed two brethren to visit the church to have consultation on the matter. The result of this visit was satisfactory; a plan for the liquidation of the whole debt in four years was submitted, which plan was not only accepted, but nobly sustained by the liberality of the friends of the cause. This effort has been, so far, quite successful, and it is also pleasing to notice that there are signs of improvement in matters of still more vital moment.

OTTAWA CITY. This enterprise was undertaken at the instance of our friends in England; and although the Canadian Committee fully endorsed their suggestion, in view of the large expenditure which it necessarily involves, it is right that this fact should be mentioned: immediate and rapid growth cannot be fairly expected. It is however gratifying to be able to report that success more than commensurate with legitimate expectation has already followed the effort. The congregations, considering the small congregational element in the population, and the unsuitable place in which public service has had to be conducted, are larger than could have been looked for, while the infant church has been favoured with internal harmony, and although not large, yet with healthful increase.

During the year the brethren have mainly devoted their efforts to secure a church edifice. Their pastor, the Rev. J. Elliot, has been laboriously and successfully engaged in raising funds. England has handsomely responded to their appeal; and we anticipate the pleasure of being able in next year's Report to announce that the church in Ottawa is worshipping in a commodious and imposing edifice, with only a small debt to be subsequently removed.

LOWER CANADA DISTRICT.

The several stations in this district have, like those in Canada West, been visited by missionary deputations. At the suggestion of the Eastern Township Section, the General Committee, in June, made provision for a thorough exploration of that field. In this way valuable information has been obtained which may ultimately lead to more practical results. Under the respective local notices it will be seen that a change in the pastorate has occurred at Cowansville; that Franklin has been supplied; and that Beebe Plain, Stanstead, has been left vacant.

COWANSVILLE AND BROME. The Rev. A. Duff, during the early part of the missionary year remained on this field, and, from his report, seems to have been encouraged in his work by tokens of the Divine presence; having, however, received a call from the church at Sherbrooke, vacant by the death of our venerable father Robertson, who "had finished his course with joy," and a long and fruitful "ministry which he had received of the Lord Jesus," he felt it his duty to accept it, and consequently removed from this sphere of labour, and from connection with the Society. Providentially, at the very time of his departure, the Rev. J. A. Farrar, arrived from England, and was directed to this field of labour. He soon received an invitation to become pastor; which he accepted, and he is now engaged in missionary work with apparent success.

DANVILLE AND LITTLE WARWICK. For many years, the Rev. A. J. Parker occupied this extensive missionary field alone. As noticed in former reports, other denominations have come forward, if not to encourage and strengthen him, at least to share in his work. He has, however, endeavoured to preserve peace with his new coadjutors; and, to a pleasing extent, has succeeded.

The church has remained faithful to its principles; and the pastor is able to report an increase to its membership, and an increasing interest in the Sabbath school. The following words from one who has toiled so long and faithfully in his master's service are worthy of prayerful consideration by his own people, "If now we could witness spirituality, active benevolence and promptness

in Gospel effort and contribution I would thank God and take courage."

EATON. The cause here, during the latter part of the year, has been blessed with a quiet yet deeply encouraging work of grace. We trust to be able, in next annual report, to give a more full account of it, and to have evidence to furnish that many have found the Lord Jesus. The pastor of the church, the Rev. E. J. Sherill, continues his work of faith and labour of love.

FITCH BAY. The Rev. L. P. Adams remains on this field. Besides discharging the duties of the pastorate, he preaches in seven different places. He writes, "My church appears to be well united. We keep up Bible classes, Sabbath schools, and Prayer-meetings as far as practicable." "It pains me" he adds, "to report, and not be able to speak of more decided prosperity, I hope the Saviour is looking favourably on us, and will pour out his grace in the salvation of the perishing.

FRANKLIN. This church has been without a settled pastor for several years. One of the students, as will be noticed in another part of this report, spent his summer vacation among this people. In the spring of 1862, the Rev. H. Lancashire, having paid the church a visit, received a call to become its pastor, which he accepted; and, after the lapse of several years, for the second time assumed the pastorate of the church on the first of April. So far as we can judge, this arrangement has been providential, and the reunion at once cordial and hopeful.

INDIAN LANDS. We have still to report vacant, but supplied by student labour during the summer.

MAGOG. "Here" writes our missionary the Rev. Levi Loring, "is a thriving village, the centre of a large territory, and now its circumstances are such that all or nearly all its entire Protestant interest may be secured to Congregationalism, if for a little time longer your society can sustain its operations here."

Although the station was only opened in February, 1861, considerable progress has been made. In the morality of the village

there has been decided improvement. During the past fall there was in the congregation a manifest increase of attention in listening to the word, which, in the winter months, deepened into much seriousness on the part of many. The regular Sabbath evening prayer meeting became largely attended, and several publicly asked an interest in the prayers of Christians. Some of these, it is hoped, have found Christ. The Sabbath school is reported as flourishing."

MELBOURNE. Still without a pastor, but had the services of a student during part of the summer.

QUEBEC. The Rev. H. D. Powis, pastor of the church, reports the congregations gradually increasing; the church harmonious and peaceful, receiving an addition to its membership every other monthly meeting. The Sunday school goes on well. The pastor's Bible class meets regularly. The people have made great efforts to pay off all debts, and with a good degree of success. They have also resolved to strain every nerve to do without further assistance from the Missionary Society. This they will attempt, but should they fail, they have *resolved* to ask for help only for one year more. The salary of the minister is always paid with comendable promptitude, who seems really encouraged in his work.

STANSTEAD, BEEBE PLAIN. This station, formerly connected with the church under the pastorate of the Rev. A. Macdonald, as announced in a previous report has formed into an independent station, and the Rev. J. T. Pattison was induced to occupy it. He has laboured faithfully, but amidst very great discouragements up till the end of last year when, it was felt by the Local Committee that the prospects did not warrant a further continuance of the effort to maintain a separate ministry. The Committee, having made local arrangements for its supply, the Rev. J. T. Pattison relinquished the field,—not without regret, yet with the confident hope that his labours had been of spiritual service to some who had listened to the Word of life.

WATERVILLE AND MASSAWIPPI. These stations are still under the charge of the Rev. C. Pearl; who, besides attending to them, has, during the year, devoted a portion of his time to the exploration of certain parts of the Townships. At Waterville the parsonage has been completed at a cost of about \$700, and at Massawippi the Meeting House has also been finished at a cost of about \$1600. On these efforts the small debt of \$224 only remains to be raised. It may be well, however, to state that these buildings have been erected on the "Union Plan," the first right being secured to the congregational body.

A church was formed at Massawippi on the 15th December, 1861; and the 3rd July, 1862 is the time fixed for a similar organization at Waterville. On the whole, the spiritual aspect of these stations appears encouraging and could the efforts of the esteemed pastor be more concentrated on his immediate charge we are persuaded his efficient service would tell still more powerfully on their religious progress. Now that the surrounding regions have been so well explored, this desirable result may be obtained. Mr. Pearl has opened a third station, at which, during the last four months, he has preached once on each alternate Sabbath, to congregations encouragingly large and attentive.

Student Labour for the Summer of 1861.

An arrangement, the same as was made during the last two years, was, this year, again sanctioned by the General Committee. Twelve students from our own college have been doing missionary work during the summer. As before, our statement is drawn from their own reports, and they are here introduced in the order in which their names stand on the college roll.

Mr. Robert Brown.—Garafraxa, with the exception of a few weeks spent in Bosanquet, was the sphere of his missionary labour. His acceptableness to the people was practically evinced by their extending to him a unanimous call to become their pastor. This he cordially accepted at the close of his six month's student labour.

Mr. John Brown.—The first three months of his vacation were devoted to missionary work in Turnbury and its neighbourhood; where, to use his own language, "his labours were pleasant to him-

self, and, as far as he could judge, acceptable to the people." By a singular Providence the following three months were spent in *Eramosa*, the field adjoining that occupied by his brother. This resulted in an unanimous call to the pastorate which he felt it his duty to accept. Twin brothers, who entered life and the college together, are thus placed at once and side by side, to do work for Christ. The church not only nobly met Mr. Brown's whole expense during the three months above mentioned, but has undertaken his support without missionary aid; and in thus early parting from him we would commend him and his people to the grace of the Lord Jesus; wishing both all prosperity, and a long, harmonious, and fruitful union.

Mr. Benjamin W. Day.—Although not next in order on the college list, the last notice makes it desirable to mention here that Mr. Day succeeded Mr. R. Brown at Turnbury. After preaching for three months as a student, he felt it his duty to accept a call from the church to become its pastor. Having been ordained to the work of the ministry he is now hopefully engaged in discharging its responsible functions.

Mr. George Strasenburg.—During the first three months he laboured at Wilkesport and Moretown. It soon became evident that this new field had been too hopefully represented, we however resolved to give it a fair chance. Three months labour were therefore devoted to it, at the close of which period the effort was abandoned; and Mr. S. removed to Chebogue. Here a more encouraging prospect presented itself. The people were cordial, and the congregations large and attentive. His labours were not only highly prized by the people, which was subsequently proven by their extending to him an urgent call to become their pastor; but were evidently of great service, both in strengthening the church, and in enlarging the congregations.

Mr. John R. Kean.—During his vacation laboured at Bosanquet, with the exception of a few weeks spent at Garafraxa. Here he preached the gospel at five stations with much acceptance. Although prepared at once to enter on the work of the ministry, this field was evidently not yet sufficiently advanced to support a pas-

tor, without an expense to the Society, which it was not prepared to undertake. After labouring during the summer months as a student, with commendable zeal and earnestness, he removed to Cornwallis where the people have invited him to become their pastor, which invitation he has accepted.

Mr. John G. Sanderson.—Oro was once more the sphere of his vacation labour. The people pressed him at once to become their pastor; to this the college Board could not give consent. His congregations were large and attentive, and there is good reason to believe that his efforts to bring souls to the Saviour have not been fruitless.

Mr. J. Malcome Smith—Occupied Florenceville during his vacation. He reports good congregations and much kindness from the people. He expresses the confident hope that his labours were not without benefit to the people among whom he laboured.

Mr. Charles Duff.—At the earnest request of the people he again resumed charge of Meaford with its associated stations. His summer labour has been at once arduous, zealous and successful. The congregations were enlarged, additions were made to the infant church, and there is hopeful evidence that souls were quickened under his preaching. To the honour of the people we have to state that his entire expense and remuneration were met by their liberality.

Mr. Alexander McGregor—Was also led to return to his former stations, Martintown, Roxborough, and Indian Lands, at the pressing solicitation of the people. We regret that our space will not warrant the introduction of some interesting incidents from his report. We can only notice that his congregations have been large and attentive, and that both his preaching and private conversation have been honoured of God. His efforts to unite the several stations more cordially, seem also, to a pleasing extent, to have been successful. The people have wholly met his remuneration and expenses.

Mr. Richard Lewis—Laboured in Alton and South Caledon during his vacation. The field was one of considerable difficulty; but at Alton especially, his efforts to revive the cause and bring

souls to Christ were encouragingly successful. Like most, if not all, of his fellow students, besides preaching on Sabbath he sought by Bible-classes, Prayer-meetings, and private conversation to do service for the Master.

Mr. James A. R. Dickson—Was sent at the close of the college session to assist the Rev. A. J. Parker at Danville and in that service spent several weeks. He was then transferred to Waterville and Massawippi to enable the Rev. C. Pearl to engage in the special work of exploration assigned him by the General Committee. He reports satisfaction in the discharge of his duties and encouragement from the people.

Mr. James Douglas.—Was appointed to Inverness as his field. He reports the congregations good, and the attention paid to the preaching of the gospel as most gratifying. The people shewed him much kindness and he has the pleasure of believing that God to some extent has blessed his labours.

Mr. Joseph Bryning.—Although his studies at the college had closed, applied for engagement as a student for the summer. Franklin was open, and he accepted an appointment to that field. His labours were seemingly prized by the people, and from his report he appears to have discharged his duties with fidelity and earnestness.

In exploring the Eastern Townships, the Rev. C. Pearl found several stations, which might at once be hopefully occupied by students, if they could be obtained. Those from our own college having been provided with fields of labour, he sought and obtained the service of three from Bangor. From his general report we present the following brief statement :

Mr. J. Frink—Was stationed at Melbourne and Richmond. Although one of our oldest stations in this region, Melbourne was without pastoral supply. The labours of Mr. Frink were timely and efficient and on leaving, early in November, the cause, in many respects, was much improved. In April he again resumed his mission, and, as the church has invited him to the pastorate, and has applied for missionary aid from the General Committee, we confidently regard his settlement as well nigh certain.

Mr. Georje H. Blake.—Having visited Acton and Roxton, and having supplied the vacant pulpit at Sherbrooke for five Sabbaths three Sabbaths more were spent at other points of the missionary field, the last five were devoted to Troy and Potton. His labours were evidently of considerable service, especially in the places last mentioned; where, through his agency there seems to have been a strong desire awakened among the people for a settled ministry.

Mr. B. T. Sanborn.—Laboured for about four months in Philipsburgh and Bedford. His services were acceptable to the people, and his visit was of benefit to the cause.

Here our review of the Canadian section of our field closes. The number of labourers who have been at work, it will be observed, is unusually large. The churches, on the whole, are in a quietly prosperous state. The missionaries, with very few exceptions, are encouraged in the prosecution of their arduous and self-denying duties, yet both churches and missionaries need the quickening influences of the Holy Spirit fully to prepare them for the Master's service.

NOVA SCOTIA AND NEW BRUNSWICK DISTRICT.

" We have arrived at a period in the religious history of our Churches, which we feel to be most important. Our responsibility—always great—is now immeasurably increased. Some of our Churches which were on the verge of extinction are now in active operation in their respective spheres, making the Word of the Lord "Sound out to the regions round about," and contributing of their substance for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. He who "Walks in the midst of the Golden Candlesticks, holding the stars in his right hand," is disposing these churches and their ministers to fulfill his will, and he is giving them tokens of his presence and blessing. Amidst many discouragements and difficulties, we yet see abundant results to "thank God and take courage."

We hailed with great delight the presence of Dr. Wilkes at our last anniversary, as a delegate from the Canada Union. "As iron sharpeneth iron, so doth the countenance of a man his friend." Union is strength and whatever promotes the former tends to the increase of the latter. We have been repeatedly encouraged in our work by the presence of our respected brother, and to him we are largely indebted, as an instrument, for our present comparatively prosperous state. It is his happiness to labour amongst a warm-hearted people, and he never fails to communicate a portion of their spirit to the churches who are favoured with his visits. He was accompanied by Professor Cornish, who laboured for some time amongst ourselves and who continues to take a deep interest in all our movements. These brethren, by their private counsels and public addresses fanned the feeble spark of the missionary spirit that still exists among us; and were themselves delighted and refreshed in witnessing our improved condition from the period of their former visits. We hope to be favoured in future years with similar delegates from our Canadian brethren. Such visits are necessarily attended with much expense, but the good accomplished is far more than a recompense.

The following reports will doubtless be read with mingled feelings of hope and fear :

CORNWALLIS, N. S.—This church was long without a pastor and the people were much disappointed last year in not obtaining the services of the Rev. E. Barker to whom they had extended a cordial and unanimous invitation. His health would not admit of his undertaking the charge, and he was reluctantly compelled to leave them "as Sheep without a Shepherd. In the good providence of God Mr. J. R. Kean, who had finished his studies at college had his steps directed to these Lower Provinces, and, at the request of our Committee, visited Cornwallis. In his report he says:—"Agreeably to your directions I proceeded from St. Johns to Cornwallis in the beginning of December last. As indicated in last years report I found the cause here in a weak state. Nevertheless the few friends who remained were so warmly attached to the principles and worship of their fathers, that by God's blessing

they had been enabled to preserve an existence as a church through seasons of very great trial, during which other churches in this Province, once equally promising, became extinct."

Mr. Kean commenced his labours under somewhat discouraging circumstances, but ultimately it pleased God to turn these to his advantage. The congregations, which at first were small, gradually increased, and after a short period the attendance at each of the three stations became highly encouraging. He held from the first a weekly prayer meeting, in which a deep interest has been manifested and he also joined with brethren of other denominations in holding union prayer meetings. These meetings have proved refreshing seasons, and the word preached has not been without blessed effects. He says, "the interest manifested by the young in the Bible Class and Sabbath School is by no means the least encouraging feature of the field. We have had thirty-two at our Bible Class, which is held from house to house. The church is united and prayerful, and by God's blessing on the new relations into which we have entered, and by persevering watchfulness and prayer we look forward to an ingathering of souls, for which we labour and pray." Mr. Kean was ordained on the 29th of May. There was a large attendance at the service, and all present seemed deeply interested in the proceedings. May the Holy Spirit copiously descend on pastor and people and speedily increase them with "men as a flock."

CHEBOGUE, N. S.—Mr. Strassenburgh, one of the students, supplied this church with great acceptance during part of last summer. Mr. S. Sykes—who is at present engaged in teaching, and who was formerly a deacon of the church in England, over which the Rev. R. Wilson presided—at the earnest solicitation of the church supplied the pulpit during the winter months. In reference to these services the church writes:—Mr. Strassenburgh's labours in Chebogue were very acceptable to the church and congregation: Many attended regularly that were not in the habit of doing so, and congregations were much larger than usual; and, although there were no additions to the church we believe the benefit of his labors will be long felt among us. He preached twice every Sabbath,

occasionally addressed the Sabbath Schools and paid particular attention to the sick and the aged, who were very grateful for his attentions. Mr. Sykes commenced his labors during last fall. He has preached regularly ouce every Sabbath except when prevented by stormy weather, and often when he should not have come, when we remember that he has had to travel twenty miles. He has manifested much zeal in his work, both in preaching the gospel and visiting the sick, and his services are highly prized in Chebogue.

The people here who have long been in a divided and distracted state, are now happily united. They have given a unanimous and pressing invitation to Mr. Strassenburgh to take the pastoral oversight among them. A new place of worship has been erected, and should Mr. S. or some other faithful man settle amongst them, there is every prospect of this ancient church increasing in numbers, and in strength, and usefulness. May they enjoy something of what was of old thus promised, "and I will make them, and the places round about my hill, a blessing: and I will cause the shower to come down in his season: there shall be showers of blessing."—"The remnant of Jacob shall be in the midst of many people as a dew from the Lord, and as showers upon the grass that tarrieth not for man, nor waiteth for the sons of man."

YARMOUTH, N. S.—The January Report from the pastor, the Rev. G. Ritchie, states:—"Since my last report we have added to our fellowship three by letter and nine on profession of faith. A very interesting young peoples' prayer-meeting, conducted solely by the young ladies of the church and congregation, has added for many months past an encouraging aspect to our cause. In addition to this we have kept up hitherto, a female prayer-meeting, attended for the most part by the elder women. Our ordinary Wednesday evening meeting is usually well attended, at which I give a lecture upon the lesson for the Sabbath School the ensuing Sabbath. Owing to my release from the duties of our former connection with Chebogue, I am enabled to attend the Sabbath School, which keeps up a very cheering appearance, and to instruct a young men's Bible class which promises fruit to the glory of God."

The May Report states:—"We have added none to our church membership since I last reported. We have added fourteen since I reported a year ago. There are a number who at present come to our communion whom we hope to unite to us more closely and permanently in church membership. Our finances are a little troublesome. The incidental expenses of the Tabernacle are heavy. Our furnaces must be replaced also next Autumn, or stoves purchased, which will add another \$150 or more to them during the ensuing year. Under this pressure our church have asked the Missionary Society for the same amount they did last year, which I sincerely hope they may see fit to grant, as, unless they do, I cannot see how I am to maintain the position without great embarrassment. Another year we could do with less, if I am spared to occupy the field: and I think I can say this without doubt from the generally hopeful aspect of our cause."

MILTON, N. S.—The Pastor of this Church, the Rev. G. A. Rawson, in his last report writes:—"The report for the past five months must of necessity be somewhat short, as nothing of special interest has transpired during that time. The Church is united and hopeful, but in no wise strengthened by additions. In this I have been greatly disappointed, as I had fully expected, when I last reported, that some would have presented themselves as candidates for Church fellowship. I am greatly discouraged, having laboured here now two years, and during that time have only received two into fellowship. I have gone on hoping, praying and labouring; but I see no sign of fruit. At times I am hopeful, the Church seems ready to pour out its treasures to enrich the thirsty garden, but it passes and again we languish. We stand in great need of a work of grace in the sacred inclosure, as well as without. May the Lord speedily help lest we sink."

Our friends at Milton have been much pressed down under pecuniary obligations, and there can be no doubt that these have proved hindrances in the way of spiritual prosperity. They are a united and praying people, and withal liberal in their contribution; but Churches, like individuals, may, while they are "fearing the Lord and obeying the voice of his servants," have "a day of darkness and of gloominess, a day of clouds and thick darkness

as the morning spread upon the mountains," as well as their day of sunshine and prosperity. They may, to try their faith and patience, and to try the steadfastness of their brethren's love and liberality, have their severe trials as well as abounding consolations. Many a devoted servant of God needs to be reminded that "the husbandman waited for the precious fruits of the earth and hath long patience for it." May our beloved brother, who now "sows in tears," speedily "reap in joy."

PLEASANT RIVER, N. S.—There is a small Church here which has clung together in the face of the most discouraging circumstances. They have been without pastoral oversight for many years. There is a place of worship, without debt, and a wide field for missionary effort. A most earnest solicitation on the part of the people, backed by our brethren Howell and Rawson, was made this spring, that a student might if possible be got to labour amongst them during the summer. The Rev. Joseph V. Bryning now occupies the field; his services are being greatly appreciated, and it is to be hoped that his visit will lead to a permanent occupation, either by himself or some other devoted brother.

FLORENCEVILLE, N. B.—Here there is no Church, but there are a few who were formerly connected with our Churches in other places, and a few who are of one heart and mind with them in anxiously desiring the full benefit of Christian fellowship in connection with our denomination. They have been visited during the last three summers by students from our College; and through the labours, especially of Mr. R. Brown and Mr. Sanderson, much interest was excited. Had the latter remained among them a Church would have been formed, and a large amount raised towards his support. Owing to the station being left vacant during the winter much of the good was lost, and strenuous efforts were made by other parties to prevent our re-occupying the field. In March, a devoted friend to our cause wrote to the secretary as follows:—
 "I can truly say that to have a gospel ministry established here by our denomination has been one of the most desired objects of my life, and I have been willing to do every thing in my power towards the attainment of that object. I assure you I feel sad at the prospect of giving it up altogether, and seeing our "Holy and

our beautiful house" devoted to some secular purpose. What you said to Mr. Sanderson regarding our wishes was right, and he has received every assurance of this. What you said about raising subscriptions, at all the preaching stations, for the College and Missionary Society is certainly most reasonable; and it was my intention to bring the subject before the people if a minister should continue here. I leave the case with you to do as you think best in the matter." After much prayer and deliberation, Mr. Sanderson has resolved, in the strength of divine grace, to give this station a fair trial, and is expected to enter upon his labours about the first of July. There is a neat and commodious place of worship without debt, and a most extensive field for missionary effort. We hope both minister and people will be under the guidance of the Divine Spirit, and enjoy a large measure of his blessed influence: and that ere long a Church will be formed, and a people found, "walking in all the commandments and ordinances of the Lord, blameless."

CARDIGAN, N. B.—This is a missionary station which continues under the care of our revered brother Rev. G. Stirling, of Keswick Ridge. He has always large and attentive congregations. The Church is united and prayerfully anxious for the descent of the Holy Spirit to render the word effectual in the conversion of souls. They have had to mourn over one that hath fallen, and thereby deeply wounded the cause of God amongst them. During a recent visit Mr. S. dispensed to the Church the Lord's supper, baptized two children, visited the sick, and preached three times. He charged them to re-open the Sabbath school, and to put forth greater effort to sustain our missionary funds. Speaking of his labours generally, Mr. S. says: "Our congregations are as good as ever and apparent attention paid to the word preached, but no additions to our Church since my last report. Some of the young people are coming to me as anxious inquirers after salvation, and of such I conclude that they are not far from the kingdom. Our Sabbath school was re-opened yesterday under very encouraging circumstances."

Two things have occurred during the past year, which must be pleasing to our friends in Canada and England; the former of

whom have furnished us with men and the latter with money. Our immediate wants (with one important exception) as regards vacant Churches have been met. Three devoted young brethren, who had finished their studies at the College, have this spring received and accepted invitations from three of our Churches which have been long destitute of pastoral oversight: and a fourth is supplying, for the summer, a Church which has had no supply of preaching for some nine or ten years.

Other fields ought to be taken up, but in the meantime our attention must be given to the consolidation of the Churches we already possess. This is of essential importance. These Churches have been so long lying waste, that some time must necessarily elapse before we can expect them to be "as the garden of the Lord." This is to be the work not of a day, or a week, or a month, but years of steady and persevering labour. The other fact is, that all our Churches have, during the past year made collections for our missionary funds, and several of them have contributed to the funds of the College. This is altogether a new feature in our history and one for which we have longed, and prayed, and laboured. We are increasingly indebted to the Canadian Congregational Missionary Society and to the Colonial Missionary Society; but the sympathy and aid extended to us by these brethren we must regard as given to stimulate our own people to increased liberality. "Them that honour me, saith God, I will honour." "Bring ye all the tithes into the store-house, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of Hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it." This is one of the best tests by which to estimate our prayers: and it will be well for us to test ourselves by it;—by the willingness and extent of our practical response to *his* demands upon us, to whom we lie under obligations so incalculable, and whose it is to say, with the authority of universal proprietorship, "The silver is mine and the gold is mine." We prosper just in proportion as there is increase of missionary spirit, the spirit of missionary prayer, missionary contribution, missionary effort.
