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
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### Introduction.

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To the Members and Adherents of St. James Square Church:

It is with feelings and words of sincerest congratulation that I greet you, my People, in the opening pages of this Report.

There is a fitness, it seems to me, in my writing annually a brief introduction to the official statements of the congregation. It affords me as your pastor opportunity to commend, or perchance sometimes to admonish, as occasion may appear to require.

In the present instance this introduction is pre-eminently fitting. Our Annual Report commences this year a new series. Considerably enlarged, altered in form, and improved in appearance, it is more than ever worthy of being published, perused and preserved. The admission of a few items of historical data, and the compilation for the first time of a full list of those who are in any way attached to the congregation, will be welcomed by all of you.

One of the most memorable events during the past year was the election of those four of your number, who have since been regularly inducted into the office of the Eldership. Already they have proved themselves to be true yoke-fellows in Christ; cheerfully and zealously, with those who previously constituted the Session, they have labored with me in the Gospel. This addition to our strength has made possible, and convenient, a much needed rearrangement of the boundaries of the Elders' Districts.

The publication of our little quarterly *Life and Work*, begun with the commencement of this year, has seemed to many like the resurrection of a long-lost friend. It is hoped that, like its predecessor, it may serve a useful purpose in conserving and promoting the widely varied interests of the congregation.

But I must not pause to particularize. The year, just closed, God has indeed crowned with His goodness. It has been a year of growth. There has been increase alike in our numbers, in our unity, and in our confident Christian courage. Even in things financial, notwithstanding the severe stringency from which our city and country still suffer, we have made gratifying progress: both the ordinary revenue of the congregation, and the allocations which we have been able to make to missions and education, indicate a long advance upon the similar returns of 1893. But the same remark holds true of all the departments of our congregational activity. The subjoined Reports tell their own story of work remembered, resumed and rewarded.

As regards my own labors among you, the past twelve months have seemed to slip away very rapidly. Yet they brought to me much which, happily, they have left behind them. They have been fruitful in a host of pleasant recollections. Moreover, they witnessed our union as pastor and people: and now, allied in the promotion of a high and sacred enterprise, we rejoice to continue to be workers together. I shall not deny that I have often found my duties to be exacting as well as clamant and constant: but the cases have been rare indeed in which such service has not been accompanied with an abundant compensation.

With at least some regrets, we must all make retrospect of the year now closed. For my own part, I am sorry that I have been unable, in my visits, to overtake all the families of the congregation: the claims of sickness have been too numerous and urgent. Then, some who were with us when the year began have passed from our view. Possibly they are with us still! Certainly they are not forgotten. Still further: there are some of your number, who trust in Christ, who yet hesitate to make open confession of that trust. Do I make a needless or unexpected confession when I declare that, concerning some of these cases, I cannot but feel decidedly discouraged.

If however some hopes have been blighted, and others appear to be far from their fulfilment, we can still rejoice together,—and increasingly rejoice,—because of God's unfailing bounty. The divine promises, though exceeding great and many, never disappoint. At least our higher hopes have been realized, and more than realized. May our Father inspire us for service, qualify us with all necessary spiritual gifts, and establish every one of us in every good word and work.

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### The Annual Meeting.

The forty-first Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held in the lecture room on Wednesday evening, January 23rd, 1895.

In the absence of the pastor, devotional exercises were conducted by Principal Kirkland, at the conclusion of which Mr. Alexander A. Allan was appointed Chairman and Mr. John Paton, Secretary.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting having been printed and distributed among the members of the congregation were taken as read, and were confirmed.

The minutes of five special meetings of the congregation, held during the past year, were read and confirmed.

The Managers' report and Treasurer's statement for 1894 were then read; and, on motion of the Chairman, seconded by Mr. H. W. Nelson, these papers were adopted.

Mr. Joseph Henderson, Treasurer of the Missionary Association, announced that the contributions from members of the congregation to missionary and other benevolent schemes amounted for the year to over \$7,100.

The election of sevon Managers was then proceeded with, the Chairman requesting Messrs. James Buik, Archibald Y. Blaine, Robert Rodger and Chris. B. Robinson to act as scrutineers.

The vote was taken by ballot, with the result that the scrutineers reported the following persons elected: Messrs. Robert M. Gray, John Watson, Alexander A. Allan, Robert Carrie, Thomas A. Bain, Robert A. Grant and Thomas Woodbridge.

Votes of thanks were passed to the Managers and to the members of the Choir for their services during the past year.

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The following communication from St. John's congregation, Toronto, was read:

Extract Minute of the Annual Congregational Meeting of St. John's Presbyterian Church, Toronto, held 9th January, A. D. 1895.

It was moved by Mr. James Traill, and seconded by Mr. John Gay, and carried unanimously:—

"That, in surrendering the last of the financial help this church has been receiving from St. James Square congregation, this congregation would place on record a declaration of the deep obligation under which it rests to the Mother church.

"In the earliest days of the work here, all the expenses were borne by St. James Square: and as the cause grew and took shape, our humble contributions were augmented so as to meet all the necessities of the work.

"At the call and induction of our pastor, a generous supplement to the stipend was given, subject to a gradual reduction, year by year, till it should cease altogether, which it did in 1893.

"In addition to supplement of stipend, the insurance and interest on the mortgage-indebtedness was borne by the Mother church, with the kindly assurance that this would be continued until such time as St. John's should feel itself able to bear this additional responsibility.

"As we surrender the last of this kindly assistance, we would do so with very deep gratitude to St. James Square for all the thoughtful aid that has been given.

"We would also make mention of the invaluable help given in the Sabbath School; and, in the earlier days of our existence, in other departments of the congregation's work.

"We have, all along, been greatly aided and encouraged by the genuine sympathy and goodwill of the friends of St. James Square; and as we seek now to dispense with the aid, hitherto so willingly given, and to assure them of our gratitude, we express the hope of the continuance of their kindly interest in us still.

"It is moved, therefore, that this statement be inserted in the minutes of this meeting, and that a copy of it be sent to the Clerk of Session of St. James Square Presbyterian Church."

Another communication from St. John's congregation was read, viz., that permission had been obtained from Presbytery to appoint Trustees of the church property and to assume the existing mortgage-indebtedness; also that, in accordance therewith, Trustees had been appointed, and were now ready

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e. the ar. to accept a transfer of the church property from those members of St. James Square congregation who had hitherto acted as Trustees.

Mr. R. Clarke Steele moved, seconded by Mr. Campbell, "That the Secretary be requested to acknowledge the receipt of these communications, and to convey to St. John's Church the congratulations of the members of St. James Square on the prosperity which has attended them in the past: also, to state that, while financial aid is no longer required from St. James Square, the sympathy and goodwill of the latter would be continued; and that Messrs. John Y. Reid, William D. McIntosh and Alexander Nairn, the acting Trustees, be authorized to transfer the church property to the Trustees appointed by St. John's congregation." Carried.

Mr. Charles S. McDonald, the Superintendent of the Sabbath School, made a short statement on its behalf, asking for the teachers the sympathy and co-operation of the parents. He urged that as many as possible of the children of the congregation should regularly attend the School.

Mr. W. E. Long, Treasurer of the Poor Fund, read his statement for the past year,—showing receipt (including balance from 1893 of \$37.18) of \$180.28, with disbursements of \$123.49, leaving on hand at end of 1894, \$56.79.

On motion of Dr. McPhedran, seconded by Mr William E. Long, the pastor, together with Messrs. Kirkland, Henderson, Gray and Paton, were appointed a committee to attend to the printing of the Annual Reports of the congregation.

The meeting was then brought to a close.

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# ANNUAL REPORTS.

### The Session's Report.

A kindly providence has brought us again to that period when we are accustomed to review the way along which God has been pleased to lead us. It is not hard to discover evidences of the divine faithfulness. The Session, in making survey of the events which have marked the history of the past year, desire to draw attention to the following particulars.

#### AN INDUCTION TO THE PASTORATE.

In our last report, regret had to be expressed that our Moderator's chair still remained vacant. The supply of the pulpit continued to be regularly maintained, but no decision could be reached as to the filling of the pastorate. seemed as though the affections of the people had become so firmly attached to the ministrations of Rev. Dr. Kellogg that they felt it to be an extremely difficult thing to find a suitable successor. However, in March last, a call was addressed to Rev. Louis H. Jordan, B.D. This call having been accepted by Mr. Jordan and sustained by the Presbytery, our present pastor entered immediately upon his work. He had already supplied the pulpit since the preceding December, and so did not come among us wholly as a stranger. In the interval, he has ceased to be a stranger to any of us. Towards securing the filling of the vacancy, the Session feel not a little indebted to Rev. Principal Caven, D.D., Moderator pro tem. They cannot express too warmly their appreciation of the courtesy, and the unfailing cheerfulness, with which he diligently discharged the duties of a somewhat difficult office.

### AN ENLARGEMENT OF THE SESSION.

At the beginning of the year, it was felt that it would be desirable to increase the strength of the Session. The withdrawal subsequently of two or three of our number made this necessity only the more evident. An election of Elders was

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accordingly held on Sept. 30th; and on Sabbath morning, October 21st., Rev. W. D. Ballantyne, and Messrs. Joseph Henderson, William P. Rodger and Charles S. McDonald were regularly installed in office. The wisdom of the action thus taken is already abundantly manifest. And, among other results gained, it has become possible to revise the boundaries of the several Elders' Districts, and so to distribute more evenly the responsibility of visitation and general oversight.

#### THE ORDINANCE OF THE LORD'S SUPPER.

This Sacrament has been dispensed four times during the past year, viz., in January, April, June, and October. It is gratifying to be able to report the accession of 91 new members, who were received as follows:

Attention is drawn to the fact that, in the statistical table printed on page 52 of the last Annual Report of the congregation, the membership was stated to be, at that date, 643. This was manifestly an error,—due in part to the non-revision of the roll during the vacancy. But no sooner did the printed statement referred to make its appearance than a careful examination was made of the Communion Register,—with the result that the statistical return already furnished to Rev. Dr. Torrance was immediately recalled and corrected. Hence, in the Minutes of the last General Assembly, we are represented as beginning last January with a membership of 520,—a figure which itself proves to have been an unintentional overstatement. The number given should have been 512. The present membership, after revision of the roll, is as follows:—

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The pastor's "Communicants' Class" was held for several weeks prior to three of the annual Communions. It was exceedingly well attended, the number present reaching sometimes 50 and sometimes even 80. Beyond doubt these studies of an ordinance, so sacred and precious, have been fruitful of much good. The Session cordially recommend the adherents of the congregation, and more especially the young, not to miss the advantage of attendance at these meetings.

In this connection the Session have to announce that, in view of several considerations, the dates at which the Communion is dispensed have been changed. In future the ordinance will be observed in March, June, October and December. Thus the ecclesiastical year, and the congregational year, will be made to terminate at the same time.

#### THE SABBATH SCHOOL.

The year 1894 has been a very momentous one in the history of our Sabbath School. An unusual number of vacancies occurred among the office bearers, with the result that much perplexity and anxiety have quite frequently had to be faced. Happily these difficulties are now a thing of the past. The resignation of Mr. William Kerr, and the more recent withdrawal of Mr. T. M. Higgins, left the two important posts of Superintendent and Assistant-Superintendent to be filled. Likewise the sudden death of Prof. Thomson, who had greatly endeared himself to the whole congregation, deprived us of our teacher of the Young Men's Bible Class. This series of vacancies has led to the complete re-organization of the School, which, at the present time, is in a very hopeful condition. Mr. Charles S. McDonald and Mr. Wallace Anderson agreed to undertake the duties of Superintendent and Assistant-Superintendent, and they are now devoting themselves to their work with ardor and success. Rev. W. D. Ballantyne temporarily conducted the Young Men's Bible Class until Mr. Robert W. Murray was placed in charge of it. Mr. Chase still conducts the Bible Class for Young Women. Through the kindness of the Managers, the Infant Class-room has been entirely transformed, bei an exceeding youngest m scholars we

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#### ATTENDANCE AT THE PUBLIC SERVICES.

In this respect, the Session believe the congregation have every reason to feel gratified. On Sabbath days, the attendance at the house of prayer,-particularly at the forenoon services,-is exceedingly good; and the attendance is steadily increasing. Many strangers continue to worship with us; these we are ever ready to greet with a cordial welcome. Our Pastor's stated monthly sermons to young men are very highly appreciated, and are not failing to reach those for whom they are specially intended. The Prayer Meeting service continues to be well maintained, but there is abundant room for improvement in this particular. The average number present is 150; but, although occasionally 200 are found in their places on Wednesday evenings, our average might easily be brought up to that figure. The importance of this service for securing growth and strength in the Christian life cannot possibly be over-estimated. Hence the Session very strongly commend it to the thoughtful attention of the whole congregation.

#### REMOVALS BY DEATH.

Death has been busy amongst us during the past year. Eight of our membership have in this way been removed from us: we shall miss them sorely, and yet we shall ever rejoice because of them, when we assemble to "remember" Christ around His table. In addition, our Pastor has conducted seven burials in connection with families which belong to the congregation. Those who have been called away represent both the very young and the very aged. The youngest was less than four years old: another, spared through many days, was able to look back over a period of seventy-five years. One of the number, the late John B. Smith, was the oldest surviving member of the congregation, his name having

been entered upon our roll on August 9th, 1853. Another, Professor R. Y. Thomson (already alluded to), was cut off in the middle of life, and apparently at the very summit of his usefulness. We can but bow before an inscrutable providence: we know that God's wisdom never errs. The Session extend to all who have been in scrrow, because death has visited their homes, an assurance of united and heartfelt sympathy.

#### CONCLUDING WORDS.

It will be admitted, in the light of the survey just made, that the past year has been an important one in our history. It has been a year marked by a succession of changes. But these changes have not been capricious. They denote the steps of a transition. They reveal the stages of an advance. Both in temporal and in spiritual things, there has been progress; and there is already the promise of even greater progress, in days that are not far distant. Many have been the hands ready to lend help, and so the Lord's work has been carried forward with vigor. No wonder that a spirit of harmony and energy and hopefulness seems now to animate the whole congregation.

The Session therefore desire to give unfeigned thanks to Him who has so inspired His people to abundance in good works, and who has already so richly rewarded their labours with His gracious benediction.

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### The Managers' Report.

The Managers have pleasure in presenting their report for the year 1894, and desire to congratulate the congregation upon the unity and harmony which prevail, and the measure of prosperity which has been enjoyed. This they believe is due to the happy fact that, in March last, the vacancy in the pastorate of this church was filled by the induction of the Rev. Mr. Jordan, and that since that time the congregation has again enjoyed the services of a settled pastor. Mr. Jordan had endeared himself to the congregation by his work here for some months prior to his induction, and a hearty welcome was given him on his assuming the full charge of the congregation. The services he has since rendered, both in the pulpit and in the homes of the people, have been greatly appreciated.

The Managers are pleased to report that there has been an increase in the ordinary revenue of the congregation over that of the previous year. The revenue for the two past years was as follows:—

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The expenditure for the past year was so much more than that of 1893 that, although the Treasurer had \$323.00 on hand at the beginning of the year, he finds at its close that the congregation is indebted to him to the extent of \$162.91. Hence the revenue was about \$500 less than it should have been.

In the beginning of November, the Managers appealed to the members of the congregation for increased contributions, in order that the year might close without a deficit. This appeal was regarded by a few, but not sufficiently to meet the end in view: and so a second statement was made a few days ago, pointing out the necessity of considerably increasing the revenue during the coming year. The Managers hope that this last appeal will be so liberally responded to that, at the close of 1895, they shall have the pleasure of announcing that all requirements have been met, and that the present adverse balance has disappeared. In order to accomplish this result, a revenue of about \$7,800.00 (or \$150.00 per week) is required.

In connection with the new Subscription List, asked for in the circular referred to, it is suggested that the Treasurer issue each quarter a statement to each contributor, showing the amounts credited to him during the quarter. Contributors will thus be enabled to see that their givings have been properly entered in the Treasurer's book, and will be reminded of any omissions that may have occurred.

During the year, over \$400 have been expended in repairs and improvements, chiefly in the choir gallery, pulpit, and infant class room.

The Managers have much pleasure in announcing that the St. John's congregation, in this city, is now in such a position that no further financial aid from this congregation is required; also, that Trustees have been appointed by that congregation to receive a transfer of the church property. It must be highly gratifying to every member of St. James Square congregation to know that, in the brief interval since its establishment as a Mission Station, St. John's Church has not only reached the position of being self-sustaining, but has been able to contribute liberally to the Schemes of the Church.

The Managers whose term of service has expired, but who are eligible for re-election, are Messrs. Alexander A. Allan, Thomas R. Bain, Robert Carrie, Robert A. Grant, Robert M. Gray, Joseph Henderson and John Watson.

The past year has been marked by an unusual number of changes in the teaching staff of the school.

Early in the year Mr. William Kerr, who for a long time has faithfully guided the work of the school, resigned the position of Superintendent. From that time until the appointment of the present Superintendent, (viz., in November,) Mr. Thomas M. Higgins filled this post, and discharged its duties with great devotion and success. The teachers and the congregation feel greatly indebted to him for the service which he so cheerfully rendered,—as also for his unfailing faithfulness during the whole of his connection with the school. Later in the year, however, owing to the distance at which he lives from the church, Mr. Higgins felt himself compelled to withdraw from the work.

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In the death of Prof. Thomson, the Young Men's Bible Class lost a devoted friend and an unusually competent teacher. Rev. W. D. Ballantyne kindly took charge of this class for a time, until the position came to be filled by the appointment of Mr. Robert W. Murray.

It is cause for much gratitude that, during a year in which there have occurred so many changes, the numbers in attendance have remained practically the same as during the previous year: and now, with a full staff of teachers and officers, united in their devotion to this work, we have reason to look forward to the future with confident hope. During the year, the Managers very kindly refitted our Infant Class room,—which is now very bright and pleasant and inviting to all who enter it. The attendance has already grown to be almost twice as large as it was last year, but we hope soon to see the room quite full every Sabbath afternoon.

The teachers, with others of the congregation, meet on Sunday mornings for the study of the day's Lesson: and once a month, at the close of the Prayer Meeting, they meet for the transaction of business and the presentation of reports in connection with the school.

We hope that, during the coming year, we may be able to make some considerable addition to our Library. It is not at present as much used as it would be, if new and attractive books were added to it from time to time.

It would be of great benefit to the school, and a real encouragement to the teachers and scholars, if parents and others would frequently visit the school during its sessions. In view of the great importance of this work, we ask that this evidence of interest in the school may be manifested by members of the congregation generally.

The numbers in attendance at the close of the year were as follows:—Infant Class, 32; Intermediate Classes, 100; Bible Classes, 40.

The Annual Missionary Sermon was preached by our Pastor, on Sabbath morning, the 10th February, 1895.

The Annual Meeting of the Missionary Association was held in the Church, on Monday evening, the 11th February, at 8 o'clock.

The chair was occupied by Rev. Louis H. Jordan, B.D., the pastor of the congregation.

The Annual Report, presented herewith, was read; and, on motion of Mr. William Macdonald, seconded by Principal Kirkland, it was adopted, and its recommendation as to the allocation of the funds was approved. The Report was as follows:—

#### ANNUAL REPORT.

In presenting the Report of the Missionary Association for the year 1894, it gives the Committee pleasure to state

that the total amount contributed exceeds considerably the similar contributions for 1893. The amount received by your Treasurers, from all sources, was \$4,782.28.

In response to an appeal made by our Pastor in March last, the congregation contributed the sum of \$273.95, to assist in reducing the deficits then existing in the following schemes of our Church in Canada, viz.: Home Missions, Augmentation of Stipends, French Evangelization and Foreign Missions.

It is gratifying to the Committee to report that your Treasurers have remitted to the Foreign Mission Committee the usual amount of \$750 for the support of Rev. D. MacGillivray, who is doing such earnest and effective work in Honan, North China. The contributions to this fund amounted to \$763.30.

Since our last Annual Meeting, we have had with us two of our Missionaries,—Rev. Mr. Goforth, of the Honan Mission, North China, and Rev. Mr. Wilkie, Principal of the College at Indore, Central India. Mr. Goforth gave us a very earnest address on Missions in China, while Mr. Wilkie spoke to us on the condition and prospects of the work in Central India. The sum of \$800.75 was contributed by members of this congregation towards the Building Fund of Indore College, which amount was handed to Mr. Wilkie shortly before his return to India.

We have also had a series of most interesting addresses from our pastor at the monthly Missionary Prayer-Meetings. They have dealt with many of the phases of missionary activity, and have been much appreciated by those privileged to hear them.

In addition to the sums which have been contributed by the congregation through this Association, we have pleasure in referring to the work being done by the Murray-Mitchell Auxiliary of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, the Hopeful Gleaners, and the Wayside Gatherers Mission Bands, the Sabbath School and its Bible Classes, and the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor,—all of which assist in increasing the missionary revenues of the congregation. 



# Historical Notes.

The date of the publication of our first Annual Report has not yet been conclusively ascertained. An effort was begun, about a year ago, to collect a few complete sets of the Report; but the attempt has been only partially successful. However, two full sets beginning with 1865 have been secured. It is hoped that copies of the still earlier Reports may soon be discovered, and that the entire collection may then be bound and made available for reference.

The congregation of St. James Square was formed by act of the U. P. Presbytery of Toronto, June 23rd, 1853. This step was the outcome of a Petition, already favorably considered at a meeting of the Synod of the United Presbyterian Church, whereby the Presbytery was urged to organize a second U. P. congregation in Toronto. The Presbytery granted the prayer of the petitioners, and at the same time it agreed to sanction the invitation extended to Rev. John Taylor, M.D., to act as stated supply of the new congregation.

At the beginning of its history, the congregation was known as the "Gould Street U. P. Church." For about twenty-five years it worshipped in the structure now occupied by the adherents of the Catholic Apostolic Church, corner of Victoria and Gould Streets. In 1877 the original property was sold for \$10,000,—which sum, by the way, was exactly the amount paid for the Gerrard Street site. The present structure was at once commenced. On November 17th, 1878, the new church was formally set apart for the worship of God, Rev. Dr. Taylor, of New York, and Rev. Dr. Jenkins, of Montreal, preaching the opening sermons.

The Rev. Dr. Taylor spent his later life in Edinburgh, Scotland, where he died not many years ago. The Rev. Dr. Burns died in Toronto, August 19th, 1869. The Rev. Dr. King is still a trusted leader in our Church in Canada, occupying the important post of Principal of our College in Winnipeg. The Rev. Dr. Kellogg has returned to his missionary labors in India, where, at the same time, he is assisting in the re-translation of the Scriptures into Hindi and Urdu.

A complete list of those who, in the history of the congregation, have filled the office of Ruling Elder, together with the dates of their induction and withdrawal, will be carefully compiled from the *Minutes* of Session and printed in the Annual Report for next year. Other information, pertaining to the growth of the congregation, will be collected and published at the same time.

Members changing their place of residence should immediately notify the Elder of the District which they leave, and also the Elder of the District into which they may remove. Members leaving the City, or for any cause withdrawing from the Congregation, are particularly requested to intimate their intention to the Minister or to the Elder of their District.

Persons willing to engage in any department of Christian work are urged to make known at once their desire, either to the Minister or to one of the Elders:

Cases of Sickness should be reported to the Pastor without delay. The briefest note, or a personal intimation, would invariably be deemed a service.

It is particularly requested that the regular worshippers of the Congregation show uniform and kindly attention to all Strangers, accommodating them with seats and supplying them with Hymn Books.

The Pastor is at home every day (save Saturday) between 1.30 and 2.30 p.m.: also on Friday evenings, from 8 to 10 p.m., when he is glad to receive calls from friends or strangers.

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### Ordinary Revenue.

"Upon the first day of the week, let EVERY ONE of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him."—1 Cor. xvi. 2.

The Managers derive no revenue from the pews. All the sittings are free, no pew-rent being charged to any one.

Contributions for the Support of Ordinances in St. James Square Church may be made in one of three ways:—

(1) Weekly Offerings, enclosed in special envelopes, and placed on the collection plate each Sabbath.

(2) Quarterly Subscriptions.

(3) Open Contributions, placed upon the collection plate.

The first method has been adopted by the greater part of the congregation; it ought to be adopted by all.

The necessary envelopes are given out at the beginning of each quarter, as well as upon the allocation of sittings. Anyone not now receiving envelopes, but desiring to contribute in that way, is requested to give his or her name to any of the Managers; and the matter will at once be attended to.

All who occupy sittings are expected to contribute, according to their means, towards meeting the current expenses of the congregation. All alike derive the benefit which accrues from the expenditure of the congregation's funds: All therefore should aid in raising these funds. All cannot give amounts equally large,—this is neither asked nor expected: but all can give something. Every one who is in receipt of a regular income, be it small or great, is in a position to dedicate a portion of it to the Lord. "Let each man do according as he hath purposed in his heart: and not grudgingly, or of necessity, for God loveth a cheerful giver."

Perhaps it may not be amiss to say that, in order that the current expenses of the congregation may be promptly met, an average of fully \$150 per Sabbath is required.

### The Schemes of the Church.

The Lord has taught us plainly in His Gospel that we must not, in our work for Him, rest satisfied with caring for the needs of our own Church, or of those more immediately about us; but that, if we would be loyal to Him, we must send the Gospel to the destitute, both in our own land and in all nations. For practical purposes our General Assembly has divided this work, committed to our trust by Christ, into several departments, each of which is under the charge of a special Committee. Each department is commonly spoken of as a "Scheme of the Church." The obligation to contribute to the support of these great enterprises, as the Lord may prosper us, rests upon Christ's command; and from the responsibility to obey that command, no member of Christ's Church can possibly be absolved.

These "Schemes," as organized by the General Assembly, are as follows:—

#### I. - FOREIGN MISSION WORK.

Our Church sustains Foreign Missionary Work in Central India, in Trinidad, in the New Hebrides, among the Indian tribes of our North-West, in Formosa and Honan in China, and in Palestine.

The amount asked for the current year for these different Missions is \$153,000. This includes the amount expected from the W. F. M. S.

#### II.-HOME MISSION WORK.

This Scheme has to do with the spiritually needy in our own land, and is conducted under the four following departments:—

1. The Home Mission Committee seek to supply with the ordinances of religion those of our Protestant fellow-country-

men who, living in unable without our

The amount a is \$73,000.

2. It is the system of Stipends to Church to a minima certain degree of the congregations

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men who, living in thinly settled and destitute regions, are unable without our help to maintain a settled minister.

The amount asked for the current year (Western Section) is \$73,000.

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2. It is the special object of the Fund for the Augmentation of Stipends to raise the salaries of the Ministers of our Church to a minimum of \$750 and a manse, on condition of a certain degree of liberality being shown by the members of the congregations who need such help.

The amount asked for the current year is \$31,000.

3. The work of French Evangelization seeks to give the Word of God to the large French-Catholic population in the Province of Quebec; and, by giving them the open Bible, to deliver them from the bondage of error.

The amount asked for the current year is \$47,500.

4. The Church and Manse Building Fund, as the name indicates, is intended to aid weak congregations in the purchase or erection of houses of worship and manses.

### III. - EDUCATIONAL WORK.

Under this head is included the sustentation of our various Divinity Colleges. It can easily be seen that no work is more important than the providing of an educated ministry for the Church, both at home and abroad. It should need no argument to commend *this* work to the sympathies of all our members.

The amount asked for the current year is \$46,000.

IV.-THE FUNDS FOR

AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS,

AND FOR

MINISTERS' WIDOWS AND ORPHANS.

These funds have been established to meet the undeniable claims of those of our ministers who, receiving often very scanty incomes, have given their lives to the work of our Church. By contributing to their support when (by sickness or old age) they are disabled from longer service, or by the

payment of annuities to their widows and orphans who have been left in many cases almost destitute, unmeasured suffering may be relieved and removed.

The amount asked for the current year is about \$30,000.

#### V .- THE ASSEMBLY FUND.

The collection of this amount should be shared by all the congregations of the Church. Besides the expenses immediately connected with the Assembly, this fund has to bear all expenses connected with Committees which have no fund of their own,—e.g., Sabbath Observance, State of Religion, Sabbath Schools, Statistics, etc. There is also a charge on account of the general expenses of the Presbyterian Alliance.

The amount asked for the current year is \$5,000.

For the support of these various departments of Christ's work, there have been formed in St. James Square congregation the following organizations:—

1. The ladies' Murray-Mitchell Auxiliary, aiding the work of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Western Branch of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

2. The Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band, an organization of the young ladies of the Church, working for and contributing to the funds of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society.

3. The Wayside Gatherers' Mission Band, a Guild of the girls in the congregation, associated together for the same purpose.

4. The Missionary Association of the congregation, a Society whose work it is to secure and collect contributions to all the Schemes of the Church, by appealing to all the families and adherents of the congregation. Systematic contributions are invited. Collectors are appointed for each Elder's District, and these visit each month all the families and individual communicants and adherents of the congregation, and receive their subscriptions. It is desired that each one should decide, as in the presence of Christ, how much he

ought to give each month to these purposes; and then act accordingly. Where no intimation of the contributor's preference is given, the funds received by the Collectors are annually allocated to the several Schemes, in the relative proportion suggested by the General Assembly. But whenever a contributor expresses a desire that his special gift should be assigned to a particular object, the wish will be regarded in the distribution of the funds. If any who wish to contribute chance to be passed by in the Collector's calls, they will kindly intimate the fact to the pastor, or to Mr. Joseph Henderson, 66 Wellesley Street.
