

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

"I am led to conclude," said Mr. Bell, 'that the danger to us will not be serious, and I will tell you why. In the first place, the Maritime Provinces are almost unique in the variety of their resources, they get their income from many different things; particularly is this true of the Province of Nova Scotia. In the second place, it so happens that such things as we have to sell abroad this season are bringing unusually high prices, owing to short crops in other countries. I find that from salt, pickled, dry and fresh fish, lobsters, oats, potatoes and apples, we will get much more than our usual return in these provinces, partially, as I have said, because of shortage elsewhere.




