One St. John Man, Pte. Manford McNutt, Has Given His Life

Lieut. Ernest Welch is Slightly Wounded--Several More City Soldiers Among the Wounded; Maritime Province Troops Have Suffered Severely

Before enlisting Private McNutt was employed in the I. C. R. grain elevator here. He was prominent in local athletics and took an active interest in the East End Baseball League. The number of friends who will mourn his loss is a tribute to his popularity.

Petrograd, Oct. 2, via London—The fighting along the southwestern front has reached another of its periodic climaxes, which has turned in favor of the Russians, yielding them a large number of prisoners, and has again threatened Lemberg from two important directions—along the main railway from Brody to

London, Oct. 2—The steamers Hafnia and Hekla, both Norwegian, have been sunk by a German submarine, according to a Reuter despatch from Vadsoe, Norway. The crews were landed in their own boats, which were towed by the submarine.


