THE WAR NEWS.

The great struggle between Russia and Germany was marked yesterday by a further advance of the Germans in the north, but a Russian victory farther south, which is said to be of considerable importance.

In Serbia the situation appears to be somewhat critical for the Allies. The Bulgarians have been winning some successes and have driven a wedge between the Serbian and Anglo-French forces.

IT CALLS FOR VENGEANCE. A cultured English woman, Miss Edith Cavell, head of a training school for nurses in Brussels, was dragged before a file of German soldiers and shot to death.

What had she done? Her crime was that she had helped some English and French soldiers and Belgian young men to escape out of Belgium, believing they would be shot if they remained in that country.

Words in which she expressed every man and woman out of Germany and the territory of her murderous allies must feel on reading the story of this atrocious crime.

AMERICAN COMMENT. In a notable article in The Hibbert Journal for October, on The Effect of the European War on Higher Learning in America, Dr. Charles Franklin Thwing, President of Western Reserve University, whose medical school was the first in the United States to send a medical unit to the seat of war in Europe, says that in the States "the sympathy of at least nineteen-twentieths of all academic people is with the Allies."

Lord Derby's appeal to the young men of England comes with equal force to the young men of Canada. "May I, as the director-general of recruiting, beg you to consider your own position. Ask of yourself whether in a country fighting as ours is, you are doing all you can for its safety, and whether the reason you have hitherto held valid as one for not enlisting holds good at the present crisis.

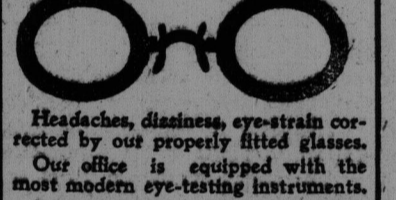

BOXING MATCH BROUGHT RECRUITS

Thirteen Signed Yesterday, Most of Them After Sporting Event and Addresses in St. Andrew's Rink

Recruiting yesterday in St. John was in keeping with the spirit of Trade Day, and many applied to be taken on the roster of the 88th Battalion. Thirteen volunteers were accepted, the majority signing at the recruiting meeting in St. Andrew's rink, when an exhibition of physical culture by some of the pupils of John T. Power was given, with speeches on the call of empire. Besides those whose names were published in

yesterday's Times, the following joined: Harry Allingham, W. J. Joyce, E. R. Joyce, J. A. MacDonald, Wm. McKell, Charles Henderson, Donald Walsh, and Charles W. Hughes all of St. John, and John Rowan of Liverpool.

The Canadian militia department will continue to recruit in the dominion, in anticipation of authority to enroll more men being received. A total of 164,000, the full number authorized, has been enrolled, but it may be increased to 200,000.

There were also several applications for the siege battery which, however, is now full. H. A. Powell was the chief speaker at the meeting and he also presented the long service medal to Bandmaster F. W. McNichol, of the Temple Band, for twenty-one years' service in the artillery militia, and who is going to Sussex shortly as bandmaster of the band to be raised for the 64th battalion, taking possibly some of the bandmen with him. Other speakers were L. P. D. Tilley, M. P. P.; Rev. M. E. Fletcher and Lieut. tenant C. F. Sanford. A. R. C. Clark, of

West St. John, gave \$50 as pocket money to be divided among the recruits who had been already taken during the evening. There were three three-round bouts arranged under John T. Power, to whom perhaps the real success of the gathering was due. They were between Arthur Garnett and E. McCann; George Camel and Frank O'Leary, and T. Barrett and Hugh McHugh. These bouts were well balanced and some of the work shown as first class sport. The innovation was timely.

Mr. Tilley, in the course of his remarks, stated that he had offered his services to the government for whatever time they should think suitable, but he mentioned the fact that he thought that the incidence of recruiting ought to be that of compulsory service by which the single young men should go first and that the married men should not be called upon until the single ones had done what they could. (Applause.) H. A. Powell.

Mr. Powell told of the astonishment of a Canadian representative of one of

the big steel manufacturing plants who was in Essen, the home of the Krupp gun factory, some years ago when he was shown a complete plan of the whole position and size of the Canadian steel factories that could be used for making munitions of war. That preparedness of the Germans was nothing else than a proof of their desire to take possession of this part of the world if they could. He then went on to show that Germany was jealous of the colonies that the English race had established while they were laying at home.

"Great Britain is responsible for the war, but not in the sense that Germany wants the world to believe. If it had not been for the care of England and her sending her sons to fight Napoleon there would be no Germany today, for Prussia would have been swiped off the face of the earth a hundred years ago. The British saved Prussia and Bavaria from demilitarization then, and this is Germany's gratitude now. Then after that England opened her markets in the world to Germany free and untraded, but Germany took advantage of her position

to raise against Great Britain the highest protective tariff that the world has ever known. In that way England is responsible for this war today." (Applause.)

Fight for Men's Freedom

Mr. Powell went on to say that a few years ago he was traveling to Vancouver with an educated German who then paid the highest tribute to the British navy since Napoleon by saying that all through that time its chief work had been in looking after the black races when other nations wanted to take them as slaves.

Our fight with Germany was the fight for men's freedom; whether men should rule themselves or be ruled by absolute monarchs.

Mr. Powell then told the opinion of an American general with whom he had

conversed in Washington, who said that any other army but the British would have been wiped out in the retreat from Mons. The general said that that was a feat of arms in which the retreat of the ten thousand mentioned by Xenophon was not to be mentioned in the same day, and he estimated the value of the British soldier as equal to two and a half Germans. (Applause.) And among these the German officers were of the belief that the Canadians were the pick. (Applause.)

Rev. Mr. Fletcher made a strong appeal for recruits, and Lieut. Sanford followed the appeal up by pointing out the advantages the Canadian government gave in pay and pensions.

Bandmaster In Khaki. Bandmaster McNichol, in replying to the speech in which Mr. Powell presented

the medal, said that in the 21 years he had not before had the opportunity of enlisting for active service as during the South African war he was in the United States, but now he hoped soon to be in khaki. (Applause.) He could not understand how young men with British blood in them could read of the atrocities like that of the murder of Miss Carvell in Belgium, and remain calmly at home. They should get into khaki and send some of the German swine where they belonged.

COLONEL FOWLER'S BATTALION IS TO BE NUMBERED 104TH

The 88th Will Be a Western Unit—Some Further Rumors Affecting the Wintering of Soldiers in St. John

There is still no further word as to whether or not the 64th battalion will be quartered in St. John. Lieut.-Col. Fowler was in the city today on his way to Sussex from Ottawa, but had no authoritative information on the subject. He said the battalion, of which he was to have command, known up to now as the 88th, was henceforth to be known as the 104th, the former number being given to a western unit.

What Will Come Here

The O. C. of the latest New Brunswick battalion had no word as to what unit would be quartered here. So far as the 104th was concerned, he said, the instructions were that one company was to be stationed in Woodstock, one in Fredericton, and two in Sussex. This would mean that none of the 104th, at least would be here, and, according to Lieut.-Col. Fowler, the siege battery now being organized here and practically filled, will be sent to Fredericton for winter training.

These announcements have been heard with mixed feelings of surprise and protest about the city by those who have been active in recruiting as well as many of those who have joined the colors. They are of the opinion that the lack of further word from Ottawa with regard to a battalion coming here, signifies much in favor of Halifax, where there are already two battalions of infantry, an artillery unit, members of the permanent force, besides the naval officers and men.

Ready to Go

Word from Sussex by men who have come to the city within the last few days says that the 64th is about ready to strike camp, and that there is a firm belief among officers and members of the unit that Halifax will be their destination.

The Siege Battery

The first announcement as to the siege battery's period of training was that they would go to Woolwich, Eng. That this will be carried out is the view of some military men here. If it is not followed, they are asking why should it be necessary to send the unit, which will be composed of 200 men, almost every one a St. John man, to Fredericton, when they can be quartered here comfortably. It is not thought if the battery is to receive most of its training on this side that it will be taken from the city for the purpose, and furthermore, it is the belief that the unit will be sent overseas very soon after its training is completed.

Recruiting

Several applications for service with the 104th were made at the Mill street office this morning, but only three men succeeded in passing the medical examinations. One of these does not wish his name published at present, while the other two are Alex. Graham Brown of this city and Philip Capinsky, a Russian. Two recent recruits with the siege battery are I. C. E. employes, James Harrison, of the freight office staff, and Phillip Leo McBride, a brickman, both of whom enjoy the best wishes of their associates for success with the colors.

HIS WOUNDS SERIOUS

ST. JOHN SOLDIER NOW IN ETAPLES HOSPITAL

Information received from Ottawa today by Miss Mary Birmingham, 149 Brussels street, tends to show that the wounds received by Private Duncan James Grey, No. 69,335, of the 29th Battalion, as reported in yesterday's casualty list, are quite serious. Friends here will hope for his recovery from his injuries. Official word received this morning by Miss Birmingham from the adjutant general, Ottawa, said that Private Grey had been admitted to hospital at Etaples, France. His wounds were described as including a gunshot wound in his left side, and the severance of his right hand. Further particulars were promised when received at headquarters. Private Grey is a native of Scotland, but has resided for the last sixteen years in St. John, and was employed with J. Rodrick & Son, woodworking factory.

CAPTAIN SAYS LIFE THREATENED

Seaman of Bark Rakel in Police Court This Morning

"If I had a knife I would see what your blood looks like," was the statement which Captain J. A. Lindholm, of the bark Ethel, attributes to Wans Myrman, a member of his crew who is in custody on a charge of assaulting him and also with being drunk on board the vessel. Captain Lindholm said that Myrman went to his room under the influence of liquor, also with a bottle of brandy, which is contrary to the rules. He began to drink and the captain took the bottle and threw it overboard. The sailor, he said, leaped on him and threw him to the deck and then made the three other vessels of the crew of the bark. The captain put the defendant in irons and later had him arrested.

Captain Lindholm said that he had a suspicion that the man was not normal. He said he would not take him back as he feared he would cause more trouble. When it was arranged that the sailor be detained and shipped on board another vessel the captain asked that he be kept in jail as he feared he would go on board ship in the middle of the night and stab him.

Magistrate Ritchie suggested that it would be a good thing if the defendant to enlist and he would then have an opportunity of seeing what the German's blood looks like. He held the prisoner that he was liable to a long term in jail for threatening the life of his captain.

ST. PHILIP'S CHURCH AFFAIRS

K. I. Hamilton writes to the Times protesting in behalf of the colored people of St. Philip's church against a charge made by Rev. J. H. H. Franklin in the appeal by him published in the Times on Tuesday. Mr. Franklin said: "I found petty grafting and many things unbecoming in a church, and I have vigorously fought them and by so doing have incurred the ill-will of some of the congregation."

Mr. Hamilton says he is sure that accusations of this sort unsupported by evidence, do not or should not bear much weight with the public. He adds that they are an injustice to the colored people, and especially to those who have supported the church in the past but will do so no longer under the present pastor.
