

It is said three Russian aviators flew over the city, dropping sev-eral bombs which are believed to have caused extensive damage. The message says also, that the Russian Black Sea fleet bombard-ed the Turkish forts on the left bank of the Bosphorus on Wednes-day. Several Russian shells fell within about ten miles of Constan-tinople.
