RUSSIANS SAID TO HAVE DROPPED BOMBS ON THE TURKISH CAPITAL

Black Sea Fleet Also Reported To Have Bombarded Forts on the Left Bank of Bosphorus—Allies Make Progress at Dardanelles

Paris, May 7.—The first attack of the war on Constantinople is reported in an unofficial despatch from Athens. It is said three Russian aviators flew over the city, dropping several bombs which are believed to have caused extensive damage.

ALLIES ADVANCE AT DARDANELLES

London, May 7.—A Chronicle despatch from Mytilene says that certain forts at Chanak and Kilit Bahr in the Dardanelles have been silenced, while some of those of both sides of the water are being shelled by the British fleet.

London, May 7.—An Athens despatch to the Daily Mail says: "The allied troops after short engagements which caused heavy losses to the Turks, captured the heights facing Souain Dere fort, four miles west of Kilit Bahr. This promises the speedy reduction of Souain Dere, which covers Kilit Bahr."

The allies later continued their successes, turning their attention to the section of the peninsula between Gabatepe and Sedid Bahr. The artillery exchanges between the warships of the allies and the shore positions of the Turks continued yesterday. Some vessels were firing from the Gulf of Saros, making use of incendiary shells. The town of Malde was set on fire.

COSTLY, BUT THEY MOVE ON

London, May 7.—The Daily News says: "Fighting on the Gallipoli Peninsula has been of the fiercest possible character. Up and down the rugged coast the tide of battle has ebbed and flowed with the net result that the allied troops have driven the Turks before them from Sedid Bahr and captured the peninsula along the line of trenches some ten miles from its tip."

Further west they have dug themselves in near the sea at several points. They have also forced their way six or eight miles inland, and attacked Turkish fortifications.

These operations have been costly for the ground is extremely difficult. The Turks are employing the best German trained and led troops, but the degree of success achieved warrants very high hopes for the immediate future.

Germans Sink Giant Liner Off Kinsale, Ireland

Left New York on May 1 With Nearly 1,500 Passengers—Report Confirmed by London and the New York Office.

Queenstown, Ireland, May 7.—The Cunard Line steamer Lusitania has been torpedoed and sunk.

London, May 7.—Sinking of the Lusitania confirmed. She was torpedoed.

New York, May 7.—Cunard office confirms the sinking of the Lusitania.

London, May 7.—The Lusitania was sunk off Kinsale, Ireland.

New York, May 7.—Many wild and conflicting reports were in circulation here today. One was that the Lusitania had been torpedoed at 8:30 o'clock this morning. Another was that the liner had been torpedoed at 9 o'clock this afternoon, and had sunk in thirty minutes.

The Cunard officials immediately transmitted by cable to England, the full passenger list of the Lusitania.

The Lusitania left here on May 1 with nearly 1,500 passengers.

China Likely To Concede All That Japan Has Demanded

Peking, May 7.—There is good reason to believe that China is prepared to concede everything demanded by Japan, realizing that the situation is hopeless.

Tokyo, May 7.—The Japanese foreign office has informed the Associated Press correspondent that Eki Hiroko, minister to China, has been given instructions regarding the presentation of Japan's ultimatum to China, probably on Friday.

The Japanese government is said to believe that neither Great Britain nor the United States will interfere with the course of events in China.

World Avoids Rupture. Tokyo, May 7.—A despatch to the Nichi Nichi from its Peking correspondent, says China last night informed Japan that it is willing to accept the terms of the ultimatum.

Red Cross Funds GET READY FOR SEIZED BY GERMANS

Belgian Head of Work so Reports—Organization Also Deprived of Its Powers

London, May 7.—A Havre despatch to the Daily Telegraph says that Prince De Ligne, president of the Belgian Red Cross, reports that General Von Bissing, German governor of Belgium, has dispossessed the Red Cross of its powers and seized funds amounting to \$40,000.

Kit Bags Issued to the Men of 55th—Some More Maritime Province Men Wounded

Preparations were in progress this morning for the movement of the 55th battalion to Sussex. Colonel Kirpatrick returned after inspecting arrangements there and Quarter-Master Sergeant Richardson and a few men will leave this evening to clear the way for the main body.

Austrians and Germans Have Little Hope That It Will Be Averted—Vatican Said to Have Advised German and Austrian Ecclesiastics to Leave Italy

Paris, May 7.—A Havre despatch from Rome says the Austrian ambassador is reported to have handed to Foreign Minister Sonnino the Vienna embassy's final proposals to Italy.

INVOLVE ITALY WITH TURKEY? Paris, May 7.—Reports are current here that an official report to the ministry of war regarding the attack on Colonel Miani's Italian forces in Tripoli, contains proofs that Turkish officers commanded the rebels, says a Petit Parisien despatch from Turin, and that the Italian government will ask the Porte for an immediate explanation.

FORMER GREEK PREMIER WANTED Paris, May 7.—A special despatch from Rome says that former premier Venizelos of Greece, who is now at Cairo, has been recalled suddenly to Athens in view of events which are impending.

MINA GERMAIN WAS ODD OF WATER AND PROVISIONS Yarmouth, N. S., May 7.—The schooner Mina Germain, Barbadoes for Moncton, arrived off Cape Forchu yesterday, with provisions and water, thirty-three days out from Barbadoes. She is loaded with molasses. She had encountered heavy gales and lost her jibboom and several sails. After obtaining supplies from Yarmouth Bay she proceeded.

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MAY BE MADE PART OF NEWFOUNDLAND

Miquelon Islands Likely to Be Annexed at Close of the War

St. John's, Nfld., May 7.—The Miquelon Archipelago, the last North American possession of France, may be annexed to Newfoundland at the close of the European war.

The town of St. Pierre, where most of the colonists live, is now inhabited only by the aged and children. It is considered probable that such of the colonists as survive the war will be reluctant to return to a struggling existence in the colony, and will seek wider opportunities in France.

The French official report says the Miquelon Islands are now being visited by the French in large numbers, and will be made a part of the Miquelon Archipelago.

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CHILD SLAYER

KILLS SECOND

New York Stirred By Work Of Murderer

WROTE THAT HE WOULD DO IT

Commits Another Crime to Show the Police They Had to Wagon Man-Double Tragedy in Apartment House

New York, May 7.—A New York child murderer is sought by scores of detectives for slaying 8-year-old Lenore Cohn. He gave warning by letter, it was reported that he would find a new victim and now has kept his word by murdering 4-year-old Charlie Murray, in a hallway near his home in First avenue.

A Pittsfield resident decided to build a new house, so repaired to his spacious estate to put the house together. He was especially proud of the splendid structure he built, so called his wife to admire it. She surveyed it with an approving eye, and remarked that it was a beauty, but as she thought it included "that hole" she was going to get it out of the cellar.

The first girl five generations, of almost 100 years, was born in the family of E. G. Randall of Parsons, Mass. The baby's great-great-grandfather on the father's side had five sons; her great-grandfather had seven, her grandfather, and she has four brothers.

He was rabbi of the congregation Adath Israel that he introduced into Judaism in Boston. While occupying the pulpit of the congregation he attracted much attention by his lectures, which were widely published, many of them appearing in the Boston Sunday Globe.

During his occupancy of his pulpit he saw his congregation grow to be one of the principal reform congregations in this country, and since leaving the pulpit he had been heard many times by members of his own congregation in Columbus avenue and Commonwealth avenue.

Besides being a lecturer of note he was also a writer, and to him belong credit, although he was not successful, in trying to give New England a Jewish newspaper of its own. While he occupied the pulpit of the temple in Columbus avenue he wrote and published a book which contained his lectures given there under the name of "Messianic Expectations."

He contributed to many magazines, and one of his marked successes in the line of literary work was "The Holyoke Blanket." This last work of Rabbi Schneider was republished throughout America and in England, Australia and Germany.

Rabbi Schneider was elected to the Boston School Board in 1888 and re-elected again in 1891. He was one of the active members of the board and introduced many important measures. He was active as the superintendent of the Federation of Jewish Charities of Boston. His services as the superintendent of the Leopold Morse Home at Mattapan, where he remained for upwards of ten years, were cut short by the illness of his wife.

In April, 1912, the New Century Club tendered Rabbi Schneider a reception and dinner on the occasion of his 70th birthday.

During the last year he had been one of the several speakers of the Associated Young Men's Hebrew Association of New England, his series of lectures just closing. He continued his writings, many of which appeared in the Boston Herald, and he was still in vogue in many of the congregations throughout New England.

The report that an operation on the twins was planned, but that Mr. and Mrs. Gibb objected to having it witnessed by a gallery of professional spectators, and so took away their little ones from the hospital, is not taken seriously by physicians who should know. The hospital authorities will say nothing about the matter.

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LUSITANIA TORPEDOED?

Startling But Unconfirmed Rumor—Left New York on May 1 With 1,500 Passengers

Two messages were received this afternoon over J. M. Robinson & Son's brokerage wire reporting the loss of the giant steamer Lusitania, which left New York on May 1 with nearly 1,500 passengers bound for Liverpool.

The first message was unconfirmed and undated, and said merely that a report was current that the Lusitania had been torpedoed and sunk.

The second message was dated at London, and was part of the Dow Jones financial news service. This message said that a report received by Lloyd's said that the Lusitania had been sunk off Kinshasa, Ireland.

No definite confirmation, and no further particulars are obtained at this time.

This report was current in Montreal two days ago, and was at that time, of course, untrue.

This may be an echo of the old report, or, it may not.

EXPECT THOUSAND MEN

AT SUSSEX NEXT WEEK

Getting Ready For Mobilization—Mounted Rifles Would Like to Be Transferred to There

(Sussex Record.)

Capt. Hendy, of the Army Service Corps, was in Sussex on Tuesday, getting 'tenders for supplies and making other arrangements for the reception of the troops which are expected to commence coming in on next Tuesday. The tents when put up will be provided with floors and all possible provision made for the men's health and general comfort.

There are at the present time sixty-five tents stored at the armory, the property of the militia department, and some forty-five more can be hired until such time as new ones can be procured. Connection will be made with the town water system so soon as the water in the river goes down, as it is too high at present to insure a proper laying of the pipes.

On account of the prolonged spell of wet weather the camping grounds will not be so comfortable to commence tenting as they otherwise would have been, but a few days sun will dry things up and greatly improve conditions. It is expected that there will be in the vicinity of 1,000 men under canvas by this time next week.

Sergeant Wiles, caretaker of the military grounds, has been busy taking stock of the military equipment stored here and making an inventory for the militia department, and active preparations will at once begin for the accommodation of the troops. There will be no outsiders allowed to run carts on the camp grounds; regimental caissons, for example, will be used for military purposes, however, will be in evidence.

The officers and members of the 6th Mounted Rifles are very anxious to be transferred from Amherst to Sussex. They say the training camp there is practically useless, and as Sussex has more sheds and all necessary buildings, that this is the proper place for them.

There has just come to The Times from London, from the National Committee for Relief in Belgium, an appeal signed by the Lord Mayor of London, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Cardinal Bourne, Lord Lansdowne, Lord Rosebery, Lord Bryce, and a long list of other prominent men, asking the people throughout the British Empire to help the Belgians.

"Unless we get more assistance hundreds of thousands of the 7,000,000 people still in Belgium will actually starve. At least a million and a half Belgians are now entirely destitute. With the rapid exhaustion of the war and the heavy supplies there will probably be before harvest time 2,000,000 people in Belgium who must be fed and clothed solely by charity."

"This war is doing an enormous amount towards encouraging tea drinking all over the world, and it looks as though in countries where tea has up to now been more or less an experiment or a luxury it will in the near future be a fair way of becoming a national beverage. Once attract a taste for tea and it will come to stay."



### HOMES IN THE WEST FOR 2,000,000 JEWS

Jacob H. Schiff Says That The Land Awaits Them—Proposition That Jewish Sufferers From War Should Emigrate

New York, May 7.—Jacob H. Schiff's suggestion that at least 2,000,000 Jews from abroad should emigrate to the country beyond the Mississippi River created enthusiasm among those interested in the movement to aid Jewish sufferers from the war. He declared that the west was ready to welcome them and after that a land of plenty awaited them there.

Mr. Schiff's proposal was made in an address to the Educational Alliance on his return after a trip to San Antonio, San Francisco, Kansas City and Chicago, undertaken in part to discover the sentiment toward the Jews in the west.

**THE REVENUE QUESTION.**

Editor Times:—When prohibition is enforced the revenue question settles itself quite readily with a good balance on the credit side. That has been the experience of Maine, Kansas, N. Dakota, Russia, Norway and in our own country, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and the many municipalities that have prohibition by local option.

The finance minister of Russia explains it in a very pithy manner. He says:—

"When we sold vodka the people were poor. The money for the drink went into the treasury, but the human machine that made that money became weaker and weaker. So the nation was really cutting off the revenue at its source."

"When prohibition began the doctors found all sorts of complaints superinduced by drink. Now at the end of this very short period the new armies are of a healthier sort of men. And what is the result financially? There is money in the saving banks. If the country is a little poorer, the people are already a good deal richer. If the people are poor we tax them without results. If they are rich we levy on them by its direct taxation as we are doing now."

In the coal regions we have sent thirty per cent of the men to the war and yet the output of work is greater by thirty per cent because everybody is sober. I have received delegations of former drinkers and their wives and families thanking the government for the new conditions and asking that they continue. Delegations have come from employers all over Russia asking that we never again sell vodka.

"A large number of men cannot break off drink without some help and it is hard to tempt them with the open bar and store instead of helping them in their struggle."





MARITIME PROVINCES TAKE LEAD IN TOWN PLANNING

(Special Bulletin from the Commission of Conservation.)

A town planning act has been passed in Nova Scotia which will revolutionize the methods of developing real estate and controlling building operations in that province. The act is a large extent compulsory and is in advance of anything of the kind in the world.

Under the act a local town planning board must be appointed in every urban and rural municipality, and a town planning controller has to be appointed for the whole province. No street can be created or laid out, nor any subdivision

made unless the plans are approved by this board. Within three years every board must either prepare a town planning scheme or a set of town planning by-laws with the following minimum requirements—

(1)—The distance between buildings to be not less than 60 ft. and up to 100 ft. on opposite sides of existing streets, both in respect of new buildings and reconstructed buildings, and to be not less than 80 ft. on new main thoroughfares, whatever the width of the street.

(2)—Land to be reserved for new main thoroughfares not less than 60 ft. in width, and provision made for allowing narrow streets of from 24 ft. to 40 ft. where not required for through traffic.

(3)—The number of dwellings to be limited on each acre, all windows of dwellings to be prescribed for dwellings, factories, stores, etc.

Property is not to be deemed to be injuriously affected for purposes of compensation by reason of the following restrictions on its use, if the commissioner of public works is satisfied that they are reasonable for the purpose of securing amenity—

(1)—Prescribing spaces about buildings.

(2)—Limiting the number of buildings to be erected.

(3)—Limiting the height of buildings.

(4)—Prescribing the use or character of buildings, i. e., whether the land shall be used for dwellings, factories, etc.

(5)—An essential part of the act that there shall be co-operation between municipalities and counties and between adjacent municipalities. Ample safeguards are provided to prevent any person erecting buildings or subdividing land so as to contravene a proposed scheme or by-law, while either is being prepared. The local board has power to buy land up to 200 feet in depth on the frontages of new roads. The price of any land to be expropriated must be the market value and an extra allowance is to be made for compulsory purchase. The act has been drawn up in consultation with the Commission of Conservation and the medicine steps will be taken to put it into force in the province.

New Brunswick

Although Nova Scotia has now the longest record of town planning in the Dominion, the city of St. John has appointed a commission to prepare a scheme and steps are being taken to lay it with an area of 10,000 acres.

The institution is doing excellent work with its present limited facilities, but of those now there, even at that age, two have been before the supreme court, and the task of the staff of the Home is therefore not at all an easy one. Of the twenty-one girls now there two are from New Brunswick, three from P. E. Island and the rest from Nova Scotia.

**PROGRAMME FOR EMPIRE DAY IN PROVINCE SCHOOLS**

The suggested programme for this occasion prepared by the St. John Women's Canadian Club in the hands of the printers, and it is hoped a copy will reach every teacher in the province by Wednesday of next week.

It consists of an oration upon the extent, activities and glory of the British empire, to be read by an orator chosen from the school, by a visiting speaker or by the teacher.

This is interspersed with short poems suitable for recitation by the pupils, and appropriate to certain points of the text. It closes with a short reading on "The War," and several selected poems of an inspiring and patriotic character.

**STREET RAILWAY WORK HELD UP**

City Cannot Pave Market Square This Year

**SOLUTION SUGGESTED**

Company Can Lay Tracks if They Repair Street—One Mile House Connection up in the Air—Water Assessment For 1915 With One Reduction

Street railway matters occupied the attention of the common council at a special meeting at noon today. After some discussion of the cost of paving Market square, it was decided to let this work stand over until next year. As the plans for the new connection at the One Mile House provided for a level of fourteen inches above the roadway, this matter was held up also for an agreement with the company regarding the leveling of the road.

Water and sewerage rates for the present year, with but one change the same as last year, were approved.

The council was called to order at twelve o'clock with all members present.

Com. Potts submitted the road engineer's estimate for paving the northern half of Market Square. The estimate was for asphalt macadam with concrete rail sections, enlarging the grass plot on the northern side with a fourteen inch curb on that side, at a cost of \$7,467, and two new catch basins, costing \$200. The commissioner moved that the report be received and considered.

Mayor Frink said the only way to meet the cost would be to borrow the money, a bad piece of business, unless the commissioner would meet it out of his own pocket.

Com. Russell favored in amendment, seconded by Com. Wigmore, that the work be over until next year. Com. Potts concurred, but suggested that if the street railway company wished to proceed with the change in rails they might be allowed to do so at their own cost for any street repairs involved.

The assessment, as changed, carried.

Speaking of conditions on the One Mile House and Kane's Corner loop, Com. Potts said that while the street railway paid \$1,500 towards the cost, the city already had spent \$2,500 on the Marsh road and the total cost would be from \$6,000 to \$10,000. He submitted plans and profiles for the One Mile House corner, pointing out that the connections at one place these would be fourteen inches above the road level. He would not approve the resolution to allow the work to proceed unless the company would build the road to the same level. The matter was referred back.

**Water Assessments**

Com. Wigmore submitted the water assessment rates for 1915, no change being made except in minor charges. In the past one cent per 100 gallons was charged on all accounts using up to 200,000 gallons a quarter, above that one half cent. The new rate will allow the city a loss of revenue of \$4,000 a year, but he considered the present rate excessive.

Com. Potts asked if the household rate was not excessive.

Com. Wigmore said that they were lower than in almost any other city in Canada.

The rates were approved.

The application of S. McDermid for permission to erect an electric sign in King street was granted.

As Com. Potts and Com. Wigmore are to be out of the city next week, the mayor and Com. Russell respectively were authorized to act in their places.

The committee arose and reported and the council adjourned.

**EDWARD SPEIGHT IS REPORTED MISSING**

North End Man With First Connection—Had Come Through Battle of Neuve Chapelle Safely

Mrs. Ellen Speight of 622 Main street received the following telegram from Ottawa today:—  
"Sincerely regret to inform you 22787 Private Edward Speight 14th Battalion, is officially reported missing. Further particulars when received will be sent you."  
Private Speight wrote to his brother on April 10 from France, saying that he had been in the battle of Neuve Chapelle and came through safely. He went from St. John with the 12th Battalion and was transferred to the 14th, which apparently included quite a number of New Brunswick men. He is 25 years old and was employed in the Portland Rolling Mills. Besides his mother he has two brothers, James and William T. Speight and three sisters, Mrs. George D. Philmy, Mrs. Richard McLennan and Miss Annie Speight. His relatives and friends await with the deepest anxiety further news concerning him. It is hoped that he may be alive as an officer.
