Not only are all the facilities in better shape now to handle a rush of goods, but the fruit arrivals will not be as heavy as those of cotton in the cotton season.

JOBS THAT SPELL DEATH

The lives of many civilian workers to-day are fraught with far more danger than are those of soldiers or sailors, or even airmen. Civilization demands that men should engage in coal mining, lead working, file cutting and quarrying, for example, and every year many lose their lives from these causes. Science has for a long time been trying to find a way in which the stone-cutter may carry on his work without inhaling mineral dust. These workers, through constantly breathing in an atmosphere-laden with fine particles, rarely live to see their fortieth year, while consump-tion , again, carries off scores of file cut-ters, grindstone makers, and others sim-ilarly engaged at a comparatively early age.


age. Many needle grinders suffer from what is termed "grinders' asthma," while polishers and grinders of cut glass are extremely liable to contract a disease similar to lead poisoning, the first symp-toms of which are evidenced by decaying

toms of which are evidenced by decaying teeth and gums. Diamond cutters are frequently at-tacked by "wrist-drop," a disease which is the outcome of the use of solder—con-taining lead—in the cutting process. Miners and sewermen suffer from the effects of the impure atmosphere in which they work, while glass blowers are invariably affected by the extremes of heat which are inseparable from the task of shaping molten glass.
