
The remarkable case caused much comment today, both in Woburn, where the Cochranes reside, and in Dorchester, where Mrs. Robbins lives with her husband.

The Cashiering of Army

Mix together two well-beaten eggs, one half tablespoonful of melted butter, one quarter cupful of flour, one pint of sour milk, one cupful of stale bread crumbs, one half teaspoonful of salt and one half teaspoonful of soda.

Soak the bread crumbs in sour milk half an hour, add soda, salt, melted butter, flour, and eggs well beaten. Fry on a hot greased griddle. Serve immediately after taking from the pan with maple syrup, or butter and sugar.

Steamed puddings may be made entirely of bread crumbs if mixed to the proper consistency. This pudding is most satisfactory. If it should seem too thin add a small amount of flour.

Two cupfuls of bread crumbs, one half cupful of suet or butter (melted), one half cupful of molasses, one egg, one cupful of milk, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one quarter teaspoonful of salt, one half teaspoonful of soda, one cupful of raisins and one half teaspoonful of cloves.

Soak bread crumbs one half hour, then mix as for other steamed puddings. Steam three hours.

WHOLESALE PRICES IN CANADA WERE HIGHER THAN IN GENERATION

A Study of Trade Matters in 1911 By the Ottawa Department of

he report is by R. H. Coats, B.A., edi tor of The Labor Gazette, and is based resentative of the entire field of Cana presentative of the entire field of Canadian production and consumption. The list is sub-divided into groups, including grains and fodder, animals and meats, dairy products, fish, fruits and vegetables, miscellaneous groceries, textiles, hides and leather, metals, and implements, fuel and lighting, lumber, miscellaneous building material, paints, house furnishings, drugs and chemicals, furs, etc. Numerous charts illustrate at a glance the various movements in these and other groups, as well as in more important single articles, the bulk of the report being given up to tables of quotations and comments on the more important changes shown.

The general conclusion arrived at is that

prices were approximately 24 per cent higher in 1910 than in the decade named, and rose during 1911 to a point over 27 per cent. higher. Compared with 1897, the lowest year in the past generation, a rise is shown of about 40 per cent.

Of the articles covered by the report, 124 advanced during 1911, while 67 remained stationary, and only 82 showed declines. An appendix of the report contains an analysis of retail prices and rentals in some 48 Canadian cities throughout 1910 and 1911 based on monthly records obtained by the department.
