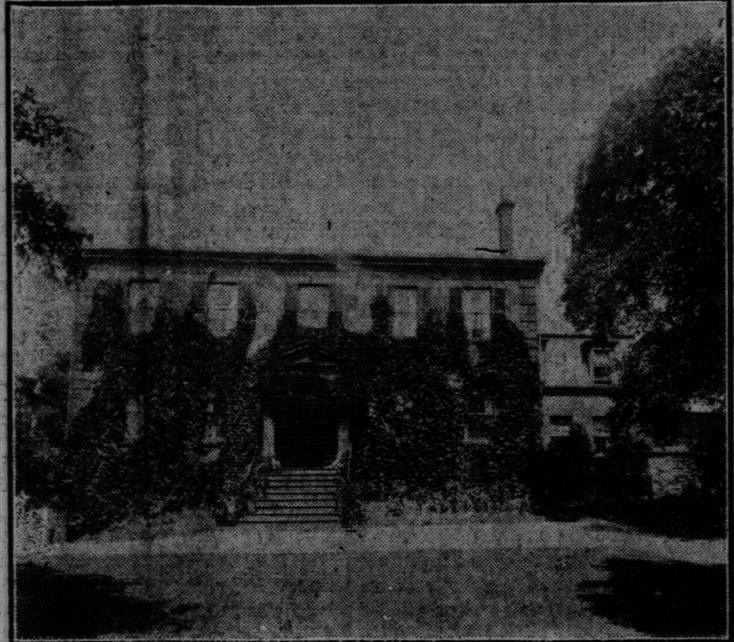

PRINCE OF WALES IS TO TOUR EMPIRE

It is Said He Will Begin By a Visit To Canada

AFTER CORONATION

British Army Horses to Calgary For Stock Purposes—Compulsory Service in Army—Tariff Reform and Other Topics of Interest in Old Country

(Times London Correspondence.) So young a man as the Prince of Wales, Wales will, of course, have his father and grandfather as examples, and the grand tour of the empire, details of which are already being considered.

The Canadian Rifles at Aldershot are winning the admiration of their British colleagues for their grit and cleverness in the military manoeuvre.

The timely visit of the Canadian volunteers to the Aldershot Camp should give a fillip to the territorial recruiting and the Canadian enthusiasm should be an answer to some of the hysterical newspaper cries out for "concentration" and make little of the territorial volunteer scheme.

There is something of irony in the fact that following upon the Canadian demonstration at Aldershot, the Imperial Parliament in the coming session is to be asked to debate a motion by Lord Roberts, in favour of compulsory military service.

The temporary popularity of the tariff reform movement which had its origin in the depression of the late '90s, is now being checked in this country by the wave of enthusiasm for free trade in Western Canada.

The depression in trade and unemployment for a few years had spread discontent and a decrease to the extent of 17,000, and the number of unemployed to whom relief has been granted in the same period, show a decrease of 49 per cent.

The very elaborate preparations for the great Town Planning Congress and Exhibition are now complete, and the promoters expect that a great impetus will be given to improved inexpensive houses.

Manchester, which was one of the worst built towns in England is being roused to join the town planning movement. Under the Town Planning Act a district outside the city, near Middleton comprising eight square miles is to be opened up and model residences built—some twelve to the acre.

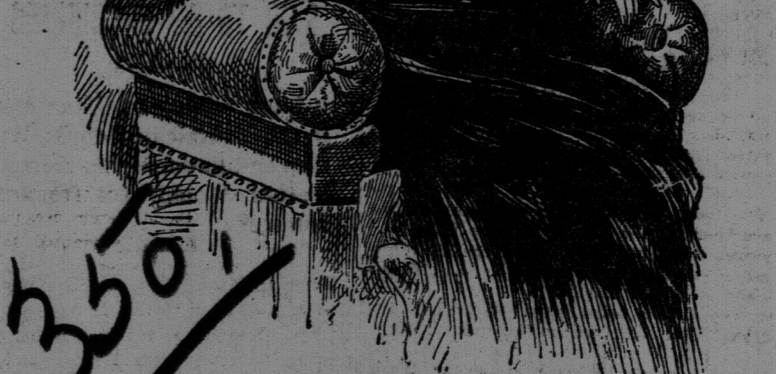

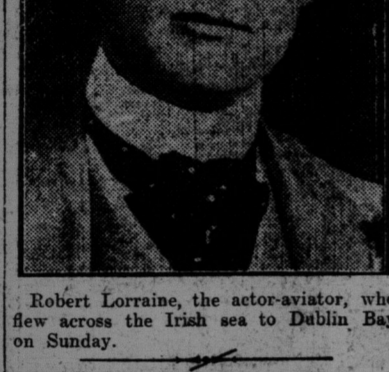

CANADA'S NAVY NOT IN PT ONE

Fu'l Report of Speech in Ottawa by Commander Roper, British Naval Expert to Assist in Government's Programme

(Ottawa Journal).
Charging that the new Canadian navy had been received by a large section of the Canadian people as "the tin-pot navy," Commander Roper, one of the British naval experts, who has come to the Dominion to assist in the carrying out of the government's naval programme, made a strong protest and a defence of the navy at the luncheon of the directors of the yesterday afternoon.

Commander Roper spoke as follows:
The amount of money available to meet the existing situation, keeping in mind the amount of money available to the government. These cruisers and destroyers will also be a useful addition to the Imperial navy in the case of necessity. Dreadnoughts cost a lot of money, they also take a large number of men to man them, and docks of the largest capacity to hold them. If therefore a policy including Dreadnoughts was embarked on, a very large sum of money would be involved and probably considerably more than Canada can at present afford.

"If I were asked as to the relative importance of the various items composing a navy I should place them as follows: Men, ships, docks. Personally I do not believe that we take sufficient account of the personnel. The wear and tear of a future naval war on the human being will be terrible and in my humble opinion cases will arise where the personnel will be beaten whilst the material is still available.

The purchase was made by The Knights of Columbus Property Co., an incorporated body, and the building and grounds will be utilized for the purpose of the local council. ST. JOHN ATHLETE WINS IN CALGARY

C. R. Merritt Capture Prizes in Calgary Sports and Nearly Equalled a Record

That St. John athlete can hold his own and even better abroad is instanced by the fine showing made by Cecil R. Merritt formerly of this city but now of Calgary, Alberta, in the Labor Day sports under the auspices of the Trades and Labor Council and Y. M. C. A., of that thriving city. Previous to going west a few years ago he was prominent in amateur and did not enter the ranks of the Algonquin Athletic Club of which he was a member, and then gave promise of a bright future on the track and in field events.

Not only did Mr. Merritt carry off a large share of the honors in the Calgary meet but, previously had been successful in the Alberta championships which were held at Lethbridge, on Dominion Day, winning the 440 and capturing third place in the 220 and 100 dash.

At the Calgary Labor Day sports he was the runner up, coming within a few inches of the Alberta record and won the 220 and 440. He lost the 100 yards dash to E. McLean by three yards. The Morning Albertan, of Calgary in its account of the sports says: "The 100 yards went to E. McLean, while three yards behind him was C. R. Merritt. The time was very good considering that the conditions were not favorable in these events. C. R. Merritt added another to his list in the running broad jump. He covered 18 feet 9 inches which is only a trifle short of the Alberta record."

The following from the programme shows that Mr. Merritt also did well in other events in which he was entered. In all he carried off prizes to the value of \$250 made up as follows: Running broad jump, 1st, medal valued at \$7.50, 2nd, 1st valued at \$10; 440 yards, 1st, medal valued at \$15 and second place medal in the 100 yards dash, valued at \$7.50. 220 Yards—1, C. R. Merritt; 2, H. B. Murray; 3, E. McLean, 18 feet. 100 Yards—E. McLean; 2, C. R. Merritt, Time 10 2/5 seconds. 220 Yards—1, C. R. Merritt; 2, H. B. Murray, Time 23 1/2 seconds. 440 Yards—1, C. R. Merritt; 2, S. J. Phillips, Time 56 seconds.

In a letter to a friend in St. John, he says, referring to the events in the Alberta championships at Lethbridge, "These events I ran faster than ever did before and the track was poor. It must be the difference in the air out here as I can compete much better than I did not seem to but me as it did in St. John."
