### FEWER MEN IN JAIL.

London, March 17—(By mail)—Eng-iand today is supporting fewer poor persons and fewer prisoners than at any time since 1911. Thirteen years ago there were 117 indigent persons to each 10,000 of population living at the ex-pense of the state, compared to seventy boday. In 1911 the inmates of prisons and reformatories averaged 13.6 per 10,000 pulation, as against 8.3 at the pres-t time.
