CHICAGO, June 5 - At least 140 ersons have died throughout the United States in the last few days, due to the heat wave, drownings and storms. Of this number, 71 were in the territory east of Ohio, and 69 were in several states from Ohio to Mon-

NO RELIEF IN SIGHT. The weather bureau today predicted no relief from the high temperatures for at least two or three days.

NEW YORK, June 5—Prospects for another day of record-breaking heat for New York, were indicated by early official temperatures. At nine o'clock the mercury, at 81, was three degrees higher than at the same hour yesterday. Two heat prostrations were reported in the early morning.

Conference Hears of Anti-Tuberculosis Battle In Province

New Official Tells of Work-Care of Feeble-minded and Other Questions.

The New Brunswick Health Conference continued this forenoon, with Chief Medical Health Officer Dr. G. G. Melvin presiding. Dr. Loggie of Chatham, of the staff of medical school inspectors, submitted two resolutions, one dealing with the filling out of educational data on the reverse side of the medical report card, so that some idea may be gleaned of the child's progress as perhaps affected by its ailment. A second resolution suggested that before sites and plans for school bodies they should first be vised by the medical school inspector of the district.

FEEBLE-MINDEDNESS.

Dr. Mabel Hanington, medical school inspector for Saint John, told of a \$500 grant available from the National Committee on Mental Hygiene for educational propaganda. She suggested a committee to discuss and draw up a propaganda programme for part parts. propaganda programme for next year.

Dr. Hanington briefly sketched the position of the feeble-minded issue in New Brunswick, and felt assured that in another two years a proper insti-tution might be the outcome. ANTI-T. B. DIAGNOSTICIAN.

ANTI-TOXINIS 75 Planes Start 9-Day Air Race; 19 Down, 1 Wrecked, 4 Lost

BERLIN, June 4.—The most extensive endurance flying contest ever arranged in Germany is now on. It is a nine-day airplane match. In the course of this flight all Germany, except eastern Prussia and the occupied western area will be traversed.

With twenty-four hours' intermission between each start, groups of airplanes will be sent away on five consecutive days on a different loop from Berlin over a distance of 650 miles daily. There are 75 contestants. Prizes aggregating 400,000 marks have been offered by newspapers and business men.

The planes are divided into three classes, up to 40, 80 and 120 horse-power respectively. The chief purpose is to awaken German interest in aeronautics and test the endurance and relability of German motors.
