Get your spring suit made with the tailors' label on it.

Sixteen million union label cigars are the output of the Toronto factories last year. Keep it up, boys, and make it twenty this year.

The Boot and Shoe Workers are forcing their label upon the attention of the public. They are using an extensive supply of printer's ink in order to do it.

There will be no need for 50,000 Italians upon the Grand Trunk Pacific if the natives are all given a chance to work at good wages.

All building trades workmen are warned to stay away from Salt Lake City, Utah; Springfield, Mass.; Jacksonville, Fla.; Sioux City, Iowa, and Denver, Colo.

Five hundred weavers are on strike at Dartmouth, Mass., cotton mill because of a demand that they scrub the floors once a week, in addition to their other work.

At San Juan, Porto Rico, a conference was held of all the labor unions in the islands, which was attended by Samuel Gompers, upon whose suggestion the delegation voted to amalgamate under the American Federation of Labor.

A union of farm hands has been organized in Ohio, and a schedule of wages adopted which provides that all able-bodied workers over 16 years of age shall receive not less than \$275 a year, with board, mending and the privilege of keeping a driving horse.

The following resolution has been passed by the Transvaal Miners' Union: 'We condemn the unreasonable and unmanly action of the managers of the different mines in trying to force the miners to sign a petition in favor of the introduction of Asiatics. We will oppose the importation of Chinese with all our power.'

Leavenworth, Kan., painters have settled their strike on a basis of 2 1/2 cents an hour advance, and the open shop.

Pennsylvania State Federation, in convention at Erie, voted to discontinue the legislative committee at the State Legislature, nearly all the labor laws having been declared unconstitutional, and it was considered a waste of money to continue the futile. Strong resolutions were adopted advising the working people to support the labor press.

Surprising Interest Taken in Recital of Evidence Before Special Examiner Bruce.

375. Q.—When were the Finlanders and Polar brought out here? A.—We had quite a number of them this spring, 1903.

376. Q.—Are they working for you today? A.—Some of them are.

377. Q.—How many were brought out? A.—I do not know. First there were two came to us, and then there were three or four; they would write back for each other.

378. Q.—Were they brought out on contract? A.—No, we did not bring them out at all.

379. Q.—When the apprentices made this amount has been laid back during the different years of the employment is retained by the company? A.—No, we give them one-half back of what is retained as a bonus.

380. Q.—What have you been able to get for me in the way of productions? A.—There was a letter to Mr. Samuel Gompers, and we have a letter press copy of that, but that letter was not written by Mr. Carrick; it was written by Mr. Edward Gurney himself, but we produce it. We also produce the original letter of Mr. Gompers and we also produce his acknowledgment of the receipt of our letter. (Copy of Mr. Gompers' letter to the Garney Foundry Company, dated March 17th, to be put in instead of the original.)

381. Q.—Have you a copy of the contract with the Scotchmen? A.—Yes, I will not produce that.

382. Q.—In the subpoena served upon you, you were asked to produce all papers, letters, cards, circulars, copies of letters, newspapers or other documents or things in your possession, etc. Now, have you made complete production of everything you know about? A.—I think so.

tion of continued steady growth'—You would not contradict that? A.—Not if Mr. Gurney said it, because the country had opened up very much within the last four or five years, and prior to that we did not have a house there, and the demand for our goods would have been great if we had been able to supply them.

393. Q.—You wrote to Mr. Strohman on April 16th, 1902, and this letter is an exhibit in the case? A.—Yes.

394. Q.—You state there that 'our apprentices have no right to join a union, especially in time of peace'—Do you recognize their right to join a union at any time? A.—Yes.

395. Q.—Was it not in connection with the stove mounters that Mr. Studholme came to see you? A.—Yes, he saw Mr. Hickey.

396. Q.—Then it would not be quite correct to state, as your letter states, that twelve or fifteen of your stove mounters quit work with the two boys, without any explanation, notice or any demand to take them back? A.—Yes, there was no demand to take them back—that is quite correct.

397. Q.—Not by Studholme? A.—No, Studholme simply interviewed Hickey in reference to it, and there was no demand. After hearing Hickey's explanation he promised to see the stove mounters and come back again, which he never did.

398. Q.—Wasn't his presence there of itself an effort to have them reinstated? A.—I do not think he had any right to come away between our men; he was an outsider and an entire stranger.

399. Q.—That is another story—wasn't his presence there a sufficient indication of his desire to have the men reinstated? A.—I object to the question, that it is not as to fact, but as to drawing an inference from Studholme's presence there.

400. Q.—Where had the two apprentices gone to work? A.—I was told Detroit.

401. Q.—Did they remain away long? A.—I do not think I have ever seen either of them since.

402. Q.—I suppose you were not angry when you wrote this letter? A.—No.

403. Q.—Now, did you think, as intimated in that letter, that they would hang you if they had the chance? A.—I would not trust them—men that would make the threats they did.

404. Q.—The threats of Mr. Banbury mean A.—Yes, in that letter.

405. Q.—Those are the only threats you refer to? A.—Yes.

406. Q.—And you say you would not trust a man that would write this letter? A.—No.

407. Q.—And is that your attitude towards union men generally? A.—No.

408. Q.—But you thing anything said in that letter is a departure from what you said before? A.—I have just forgotten what his letter was, but I remembered it at the time.

409. Q.—Referring to this letter of January 30th from to Messrs. R. B. Norton & Co., of Charlotte, Mass.—what was the general tenor of the letter? A.—It was to convince them that we were not going to close up, that we were running our business no matter what it cost us, and we would continue to keep our place open.
