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## REPORT.

At the Annual Meeting held at Norton's Hotel, on Wednesday, 10th January, the following Report was read by the Secretary :-

Your Committee, in sulbmitting the Annual Report, connot but adopt the language of former years, and congratulate the Members on its continued prosperity, for although its Prize List has been largely increased, a reserve fund still remains, and numerous additions have been made to its List of Members.
They also refer with pride to their June Exhibition, as surpassing any other Exhibition of this Society, and contrasting it, with the first Spring Show of this Society, they feel confident in asserting that this Society has been both useful and profitable. The July Show, on the contrary, owing to the prevalence of Cholera and to the unfavourable season, was a comparative failure ; and your Committee recommend it as a matter for grave consideration, if the June Show should be continued.

The Fall Show was fully equal to those of former years, in Peaches there was not quite so spirited a competition as formerly, but in other Fruits, particularly Pears, it far surpassed any former Show. Vegetables were also numerous and of good quality, the proceeds of the Evening Exhibitions surpassed our most sanguine expectations.

The thanks of the Society are due to the varinus Exhibitors, particularly to those who sent articles for Exhibition only; to the Judges, particularly Professor Croft, of Toronto, who has often favoured this Society with his valuable services.

Your Committee cannot close their Report without deploring the loss of one of the founders of this Society, as well as of one of its most active and efficient Members the late Daniel MacNab, Esq.,-his loss is to us no common one, and deeply and sincerely do we sympathize with his family under the sad calamity.

Your Committee recommend their successors to give a limitted/number of prizés, open to the Province, and to spare no pains to ktep up the interest of the Evening Exhibitions.

## REGULATIONS FOR THE SHOWS.

The Committee will be in attendance from 8 to 10 o'clock, on the days of exhibition, to receive the articles, none of which will be admitted after the last named hour, and all are requested to be sent as early as possible.

Competitors are notified that every article must be delivered in a clean and proper state for exhibition; those requiring it, must be made up in neat and suitable packages, and all articles must have their names attached.

- It is absolutely necessary that no article on cxhibition be touched or handled, as the Conmittee wish to deliver the specimens to their respective owners in the best possible condition.

The Committee cannot be accountable for the redelivery of any article, if not claimed within the hour specified by the Committee, from 8 to 10 , the morning after the show.
The Judges to have the liberty of cutting any article that has to be decided by the taste, and to have the option of refusing Premiums for any article they do not consider worthy.

It is not competent for the Judges to rectify errors in entering articles for exhibition.
Parties entering articles under the wrong class must suffer the loss of their prizes.
Discretionary prizes are fixed ; first, at 5s., second at 2 s . 6 d .
